## Sanders Will Seek The District Attorney Job

County Attorney J. Reagan Sanders, Brady, authorizes the Santa Anna News to make the following announcement today concerning his candidacy for the position of District Attorney of the 35th Judicial District.

Mr. Sanders States: In making my announcement to the office of District Attorney of the 35th Judicial District, composed of Brown, Coleman and McCulloch Counties, will state that I am a native of this district, my father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. (Jim) Sanders, were among the early settlers in the Burkett community, later moving to the town of Coleman where my father served the town and county in several official capacities, including that of Sheriff for a number of years. I attended the Public School in Coleman and attended the public school at Echo where we lived on the farm in the Echo community and at that time my father was commissioner of that precinct.

I have lived in all three counties, born in the town of Coleman 39 years ago, married a Brownwood girl, Elsie Lee Sandlin, eldest daughter of J. L. Sandlin, retired chief of industry of the Santa Fe railway, and at present chief deputy sheriff under Jack Hallmark of Brown county. We lived in Brownwood for a number of years, and are the happy parents of two boys and two girls.

My education was interrupted on account of the World War, and my health was impaired thereby, on account of wounds received in action; however, I managed to struggle through high school, a business school, two years college and law school—most of it since I have been a married man—and attended night school to finish my education, and believe that I have a common education, natural ability by inheritance, and a common understanding of my fellow man, and enough common sense to listen to the wise counsel of those folks who have passed the half century mark in age and experience, and with the cooperation of the entire citizenship, I promise a just and efficient administration of the duties of the district attorney's office, as law enforcement depends largely upon public sentiment.

At the present time, I am prosecuting Attorney for McCulloch county, engaged almost daily in the trial of some criminal law violation; assisting the district attorney with his many duties in my county, and in the trial of all criminal law violation from capital offenses down to the smallest offense; I have never had a criminal complaint thrown out of court on account of errors or mistakes on my part during my tenure of office, and I have had the good fortune of meeting and trying cases with some of the best legal talent in this district.

Some of my recent activities while doing my duty in this county has been used in other parts of the district successfully.

My father has been a peace officer off and on for over fifty years and I was brought up under the fine influence of law enforcement, and with the study I have given the subject of criminal law in the past 12 or 15 years, added to the actual experience as a prosecuting attorney, I feel that I can render this district a fine service in the District Attorney's Office.

I am a member of the Elson Lodge, Methodist Church and the Elson Legion and other organizations, inconsequential at this time.

It has been my ambition to become the district attorney of this district, and I assure the citizenship that I will do my duty without fear or favor. I expect to meet the voters and discuss my candidacy personally and in the meantime I respectfully solicit your vote and influence.

Mr. W. S. Bryant, 74, one of the pioneers of the southern part of Coleman county and of the Rockwood community, passed away at the Seely Hospital here late Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Bryant was living in his 75th year, and had lived in the Rockwood community 42 years. The following data was furnished the Santa Anna News.

William Samuel Bryant was born September 16, 1859 in the state of Tennessee. He came to Texas with his parents at the age of two years. He married Ollie Josephine McIlvain September 18, 1887. She preceded him in death one year and ten months. To this union were born twelve children, two of them dying in infancy. He is survived by seven sons, Melvin D; Finis M; Thomas S; Josh B; Frank; Lewis Lee and Bill B Bryant, all of Rockwood; and three daughters, Mrs. Dink Snyder, Mrs. Hilton Wise and Mrs. J. P. Hodges, Jr. all of the Rockwood community. All of the children, together with the 19 grand-children were present for the funeral.

Two brothers, John and Bob Bryant of Jean, Texas also survive.

Funeral services were conducted at the home Sunday afternoon, and interment was made in the Rockwood cemetery.

## To The Voters of The 125th Legislative District

In announcing my candidacy for Representative of the 125th District, I desire to make the following brief statement as to some of the major measures that I shall favor, if elected.

1st: I will undertake to secure the submission of a constitutional amendment reducing the membership of the House of Representatives from 150 to 93, which will be the equivalent of three Representatives for each senatorial district. This amendment, if adopted, will save the state thousands of dollars in mileage fees, legislative employees and \$570,000 per day in per diem, and even greater benefits will result from better legislative personnel and quality of legislation enacted.

2nd: Nearly two years ago, the highway policy of the state was changed by an act of the Legislature and the state assumed payment of interest and sinking fund on bonds voted by the county to aid in the construction of state highways and allocated one cent of the gasoline tax for that purpose. This one cent tax was insufficient to enable the state to pay the full amount assumed and the counties affected have been compelled to make good the amount of the state's default. It is estimated that the state will continue to default in part payment of what it assumed for two years more. This situation particularly affects Brown and Coleman Counties and their tax rate. At the end of the four year period, during which the state will probably fall short of its payments, these two counties will have paid a large sum which the state held expressly agreed to pay. It will be my purpose and effort to secure a refund to the counties of this district of the respective amounts which they are compelled to pay for the state on their highway bonds.

3rd: The paid lobby that infests each and every legislative session has become an unmitigated evil. In many instances, through the use of money and other agencies, it has corrupted and controls many members of the Legislature and has defeated legislation calculated to benefit the state as a whole. This pernicious and insidious influence ought to be curbed by appropriate legislation.

4th: The Executive custom of granting pardons and paroles to criminals committed to the State penitentiary is making enforcement of the criminal laws increasingly more difficult and is turning loose many hardened criminals who become repeaters in crime. They are not only a menace to society, but add enormously to the cost of the criminal courts. I believe that all repeaters in crime should be prosecuted under the habitual criminal statutes, be given adequate sentences and automatically become ineligible for pardon or parole. Certain types of first offenders might well be added to this class.

5th: I believe in the principle of rigid economy in all governmental units, whether prosperous or depression conditions prevail. All graft, waste, duplications in operating expense and all unnecessary expenditures should be eliminated. I have applied this principle of economy to county affairs since my election as County Judge of Brown county, and I believe that a careful study of the various units of the state government by the legislature will disclose avenues of economy through which the operating expense of the state government may be reduced several million dollars each year. I pledge my best efforts, if elected, toward the minimizing of all state operating expense.

6th: It is generally conceded that our system of taxation in Texas for the support of the state government is a sort of patchwork. The constitutional provision is that taxation shall be equal and uniform. But in actual practice, much of the wealth of the state escapes taxation altogether and much of it is not bearing its just proportion of the tax burden. I am a subscriber to any and every measure of taxation, but I do believe that a certain number of automobiles will no longer bend the front axle now they will merely bend a "knee".

## 4,282 Pay Poll Tax In Coleman County

516 in Santa Anna

There were 4,282 poll tax receipts issued in the county, thus making the voting strength of the county at that figure plus about 500 exemptions.

Famous Birthdays in February

Abraham Lincoln was born in Hodgeville, Kentucky February 12, 1809. All of Lincoln's schooling would not amount to twelve months. He grew up in the backwoods and knew only the primitive manners. His own mother taught him to read, then his step-mother encouraged him to study. Lincoln, as a boy, read and re-read the few books he could get, the Bible in particular. He was elected sixteenth president of the United States in 1862 and was assassinated in 1865 by John Wilkes Booth, an actor.

George Washington was born in Virginia, February 22, 1732. Washington's early life was not unusual. The story of the hatchet and cherry tree and similar tales are undoubtedly apocryphal. His education was elementary only. Washington's military career was above reproach. He served two terms as president of the United States and could have served a third but he absolutely refused to do so.

4. Study at least one book on journalism.

5. Prepare conscientiously all parts on programs assigned to you.

6. Read the "Scholastic Editor" at every available opportunity.

7. Make at least eighty on English. Any scribbler failing to make as much as B minus more than two six weeks during the year will not be eligible for the honor "S."

The following are the requirements for eligibility in the sweater contest.

1. Comply with all of the requirements of a scribbler.

2. Submit a scrapbook containing such things as outlines or summaries of topics of journalism studied; examples clipped from newspapers to represent the types of news stories, headlines, leads, and so forth; your own articles clipped from the Santa Anna News; and anything else dealing with scribbler work which you see fit to submit.

3. Co-operate willingly and cheerfully with the editor of the Mountaineer in writing articles assigned by her.

GRANDMOTHER HAMILTON BURIED MONDAY
