them realize that a person's them realize that a person's time
and skills are valuable and that and skills are valuable and that
some jobs may pay better because some jobs may pay better becaus
of the time and expense incurred to gain those skills. A summer job

skills. Ask them what their goals are and help them save and plan for the future, whether it's buying
