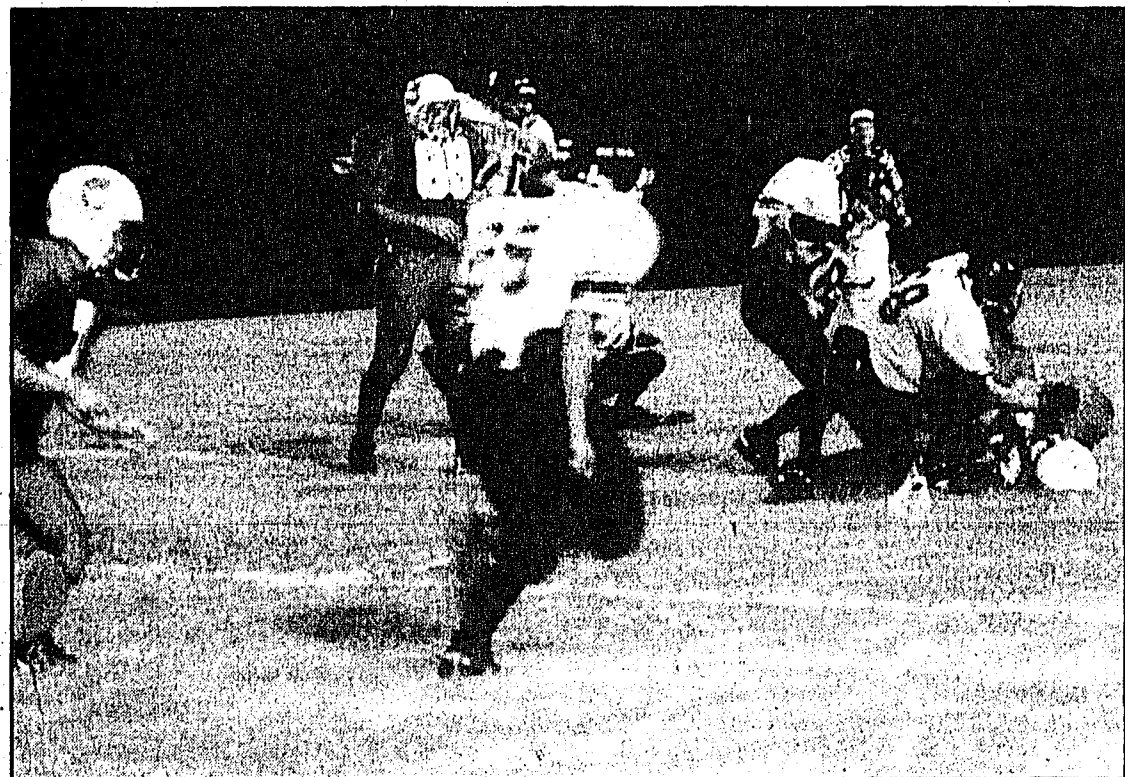

Mountaineers Lose Close One; Host Rising Star In First Home Game Friday

The Mountaineer defense brings down a Christoval ball carrying Cougar in last Friday's game. J. P. Salazar (68) makes the tackle with David Coyle (78) right behind him. Others pictured coming to assist are Albert Zepeda (25) and Jesse Goodman (70). All four of these Mountaineers are seniors.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers traveled to Christoval last Friday evening to take on the Cougars in a hard fought contest coming up a little short on the score board. The final score was 27-21.

With neither team scoring in the first quarter, the fight was on to see who can put the first seven points on the scoreboard in the second quarter. The Mountaineers scored first with 8:56 remaining on the clock on an 18 yard run by Chris Boyet. Adam Garza added the PAT. Christoval answered with a TD and PAT with 6:48 remaining in the quarter. Then with 4:08 left Brent Beal scored on a 53 yard pass from quarterback Jesse Castillo. Garza kicked the extra point. The score at the half was 14-14 after Christoval scored just before the end of the quarter.

Christoval scored again in the third quarter.

Beal scored on a 40 yard pass from Castillo in the fourth quarter with Garza adding the extra point. Christoval scored with 51 seconds remaining to end the game 27-21.

The Mountaineers quarterback Jesse Castillo threw for 132 yards including two TDs. He completed 6 of his 12 passes.

Football coaches named Brent Beal as Offensive Player of the Week and Jesse Goodman and David Coyle received honors as Co-Defensive Players of the Week.

Athletic Director and Head Coach David Robinett said on Tuesday, "I

am very happy with our passing game against Christoval. We were able to get open to receive the ball."

He also said the Mountaineers received no serious injuries.

This Friday evening the Mountaineers will host their season opener when the Rising Star Wildcats come to Mountaineer Stadium with kick off set for 8 p.m.

The Wildcats have previously been in our district but due to realignment have moved to a new district and in addition to that change also have a new head coach. Due to a schedule problem, the Wildcats had an open week last

week to begin the year. Their weakness is listed as lack of numbers and experience.

Robinett believes the Wildcats are a decent team but should not be able to move the ball against our defense consistently.

The Santa Anna Junior High football team will travel to Rising Star on Thursday with play to begin at 6 p.m.

Coleman First Methodist Holds Services On Lawn Following Devastating Fire Wed.

Santa Anna Volunteer Firemen Help Battle The Blaze

Over 170 people gathered under a tent while others were outside of the tent under umbrellas Sunday morning when services were held at the First United Methodist Church in Coleman. Wednesday night a large portion of the church was destroyed by a blaze which has been determined to be arson. Also destroyed was a vacant house just a few feet from the church.

The fire destroyed the Fellowship Hall, over 25 classrooms, the kitchen and halls leading the church and chapel. The sanctuary, chapel and library were saved but received water and smoke damage.

The State Fire Marshall along with Coleman Police Department, Coleman Fire Department, and a team from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms were on the scene Thursday and Friday picking

through the charred remains looking for the cause of the blaze. Friday a statement was released which stated the fire had been ruled arson although the church was not the target of the arsonists. The target was the abandoned house next door which was completely destroyed making the church fire what officials called an "exposure fire".

The original call was received Wednesday around 10 p.m. and when fire fighters arrived they found the old vacant house burning. Smoke was also seen coming from the vents and rafters of the church and soon after flames were visible from a portion of the church.

Approximately thirty Coleman firefighters along with two trucks and six firemen from Santa Anna, a truck and three firemen from Brownwood, a truck from Bangs with air packs; and a truck and a fireman from Valera battled the

blaze until 2 a.m. Thursday. Coleman Fire Department remained on the scene throughout the day Thursday putting out hot spots and smoldering embers.

Church pastor Rev. Reed Justus said after viewing the damage Thursday morning that church would be held Sunday as usual. Church had always been held at this same location on North Neches since 1889 when the lot was purchased.

There were science fiction books, Larry McMurtry, John LeCarre', Robert Ludlum and a box of 15 children's books. We are truly grateful to receive such books.

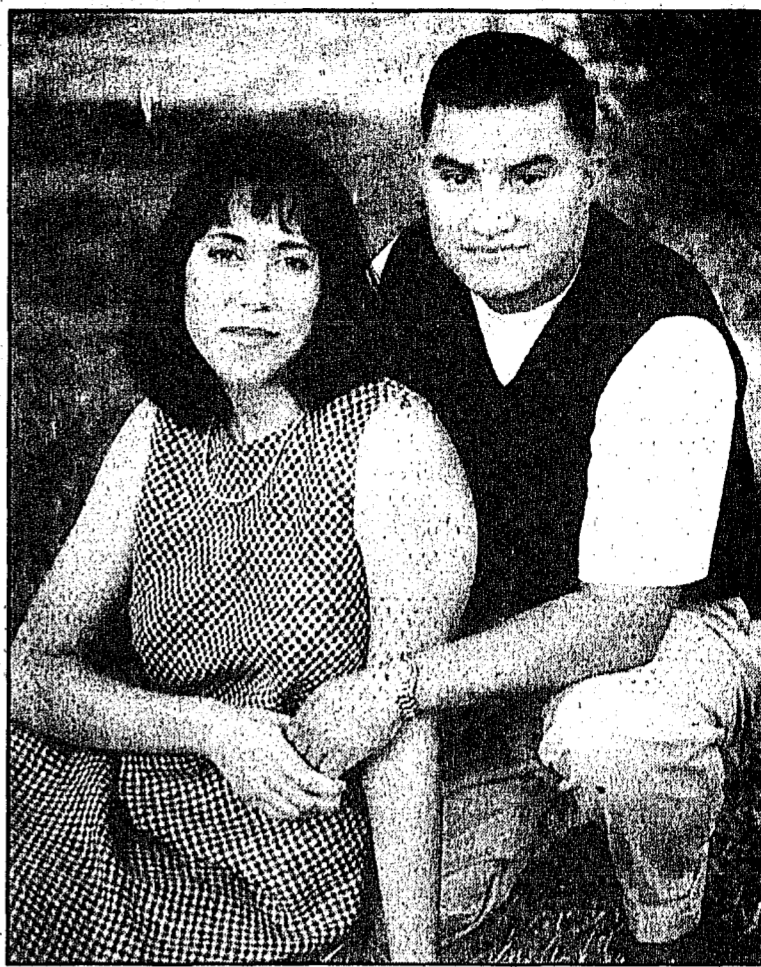
Did I mention that Helen donated two Dick Frances mysteries? Thanks for the help.
