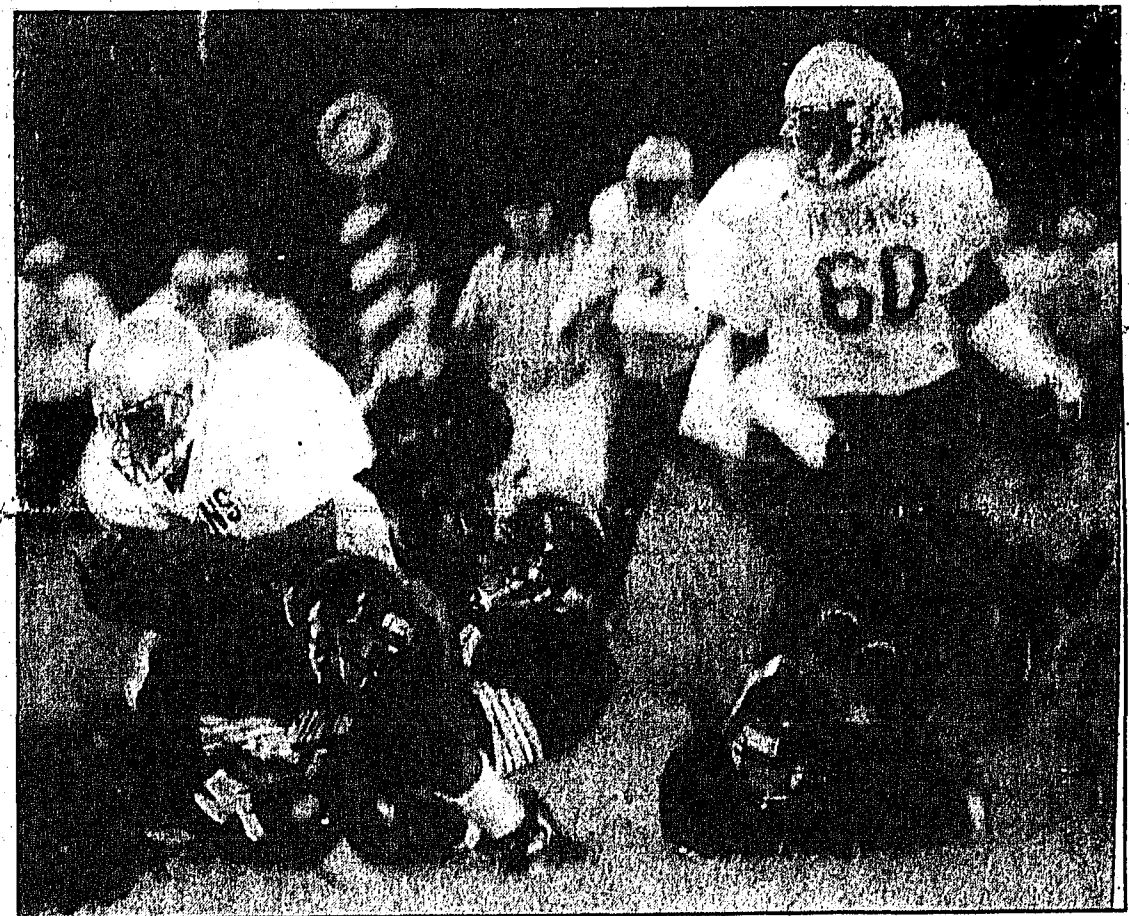
There will be living history exhibits including lye soap making, candle making, black powder rifle

The Santa Anna Mountaineers played fell in a close game Friday to the Giddings State School Indians 27-23.

The Mountaineers racked up 355 totaled yards with 90 of these being passing yards, but four fumbles during the game make the scoreboard show the loss.

Jesse Castillo scored on a quarterback sneak and threw to Chris Boyet for a 28 yard TD. Dustin Maedgin also scored during the game with the Mountaineers taking a safety from the Indians.

Bass Appeals School Board Decision; Hearing To Be Set

Santa Anna school superintendent Dean Bass filed an appeal with the Texas Education Agency on Thursday, October 1 to appeal a decision by the Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees.

The appeal comes as a result of a board vote on September 17 to relieve Bass of his duties. The proposed termination came as a result of alleged misconduct with a student.

Bass' attorney, John McCormick of Fort Worth, has said that the request for a hearing was filed within the time limit set by law.

The appeal will be heard by a hearing examiner and at this time no date has been set. The law re-

quires the hearing be held within 45 days unless both parties agree otherwise.

Last week a Coleman County Grand Jury handed down four indictments alleging a total of 20 counts of indecencies with two

young women under the age of 17.

Leifeste Takes Strong Stand For Property Rights

Randy Leifeste, Republican candidate for State Representative, has announced he would protect private property rights from further erosion by the government. "The freedom to own and use property is a fundamental right in this country. Property rights are the backbone of the free enterprise system and, as such, must be protected from government intrusion," Leifeste said.

Leifeste, a life-long rancher in Llano and Mason counties, said, "You know things have gotten out of hand when a small lizard or insect prevents a man from developing his property. The best way to protect endangered species is to keep our farms and ranches from being subdivided."

"Texans should manage Texas. We all want clean water and rivers. When appropriate, we want to protect insects and other wildlife. But Texans should make these decisions. We don't need federal intrusion," Leifeste said.

Leifeste said the federal government should perform a cost and benefit study before a species is put on the endangered list. "The costs to property owners and other taxpayers should be compared to the benefits derived by putting a species on the endangered list. The overall social value should be determined."

Leifeste said. Leifeste suggest the government should compensate property owners if government rules cause a reduction in land values. "When politicians have to spend tax dollars to fairly reimburse property owners for losses caused by the government's own regulations, I think we'll begin to see some changes," Leifeste said. "This is just like unfunded mandates. Both practices need to be stopped. If the government wants it, then the government because of environmental restrictions. These very same rules can cause a property's value to decrease."

Klussman, former Chairman of the Wildlife and Fishery Science Department at Texas A&M University, pointed to the need to have legislators who understand property rights. "The Legislature is dominated by members from urban areas. We need strong conservative leaders from rural Texas. We need members that understand, first hand, what it means it own and operate a farm and ranch."

Leifeste and his family, have been ranching in Llano and Mason counties for nearly 150 years. Leifeste is a former three-term Llano County Commissioner. He and his wife Jody have four children.

and out of the critical care unit. It is expected she will be released from the hospital in about a week, but, according to a family member, will have to continue bed rest for another few weeks.

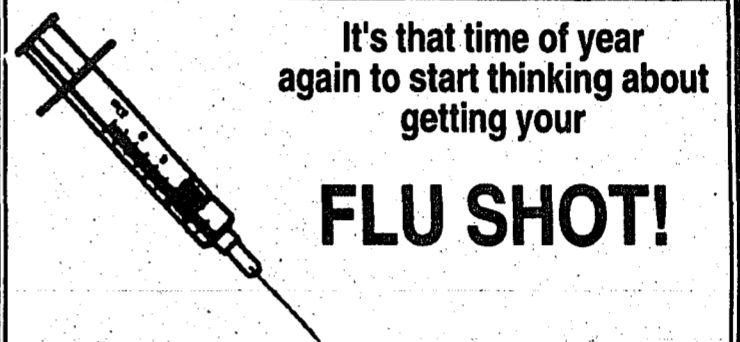

Here's Looking Ah-choo! It's Time For Your Flu Shot

Now is the time to get your flu shot, especially if you're older than 65. The ideal time to get the inoculation is from October through November to give your body time to build up antibodies to the virus which usually strikes Texas around Christmas and lasts until February.

Preliminary reports say that this season's outbreak is expected to be more severe than in previous years, according to the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga.

"The shots may help prevent you from getting influenza, or at least may minimize your symptoms if you do catch it. In other words, you can still get the flu, but typically, it will be a milder case," said John Carpenter, M.D., Scott & White physician specializing in treating infectious diseases and profession at the Texas A&M

University Health Science Center College of Medicine.

"If you wait until the end of December to get your flu shot, it may be too late. The vaccine needs about two to three weeks to take effect," Dr. Carpenter said. "The month of October is the best time because it allows your body time to build antibodies (natural defenses) to the virus before you are exposed. The shot helps prevent influenza in 70 to 80 percent of the population and minimizes its symptoms and duration in others."

The immunity lasts from six months to a year. Influenza strains change each year, which is why most people need annual shots. This year, the vaccine will have antigens for three influenza strains—A/Sydney, A/Beijing and B/Beijing. Last year, type A accounted for 99.5 percent of the influenza isolates reported by the World Health Organization, according to statistics released by the Centers for Disease Control.

Unlike colds, which can occur at any time during the year, influenza is usually a winter ailment. Symptoms include rapid onset of high fever (102 to 104 degrees),

chills, mild shortness of breath, severe muscle aches, fatigue, severe headache, congestion, chest discomfort, dry cough and sore throat.

Medical researchers have found no antibiotic that will cure the flu although medical researchers have developed medicines that can shorten the duration of Type A flu decrease the severity of symptoms. High-risk persons with chances for prolonged exposure may even be candidates for the medicine as a preventive measure once the flu season begins. These people should talk to their physicians about this medication.

Most other medications—either by prescription or over-the-counter—attack only the symptoms associated with the flu. Cough medicine and decongestants are frequently used by patients to manage the symptoms. "Thus, the best treatment is prevention of high-risk persons

"Some patients should not receive the vaccine," he added. "These include people who are severely allergic to eggs and those with a current illness that produces fever. Women who are pregnant or who think they may be pregnant should consult with their doctors before getting the shot."

The flu shot usually produces minimal side-effects, such as soreness at the injection site. Some people who receive the shot may experience mild flu-like symptoms such as slight fever and muscle aches from six to 24 hours after getting the vaccination, but these symptoms fade away. "It is certainly easier to put up with that than being sick with the flu for a week or more," Dr. Carpenter said.

Flu can also lead to such complications as pneumonia, sinus infection and other related conditions, he said. "A common cold, on the other hand, occurs year round, is less severe and develops more slowly than does influenza," Dr. Carpenter added.
