## City Council Accepts Resignation Of Police Officer, Discusses Parking On Narrow Streets

The Santa Anna City Council met for their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 13 with Mayor Karen Morris and council members Kay Yancy, Jean Findley, David Powell, Bobby Morgan and Jim Spillman present.

Others attending the meeting were Sharon Woodcox, Billy Delgado, Joseph Cardenas, Bonnie Owen, William Franklin, Buddy Spikes, Charlie Fry, James Peacock, Gayland Miller, Brother Marty Reed, Police Chief Carlos Torres, Court Clerk/Assistant City Secretary Cindy Pelton, Municipal Judge Bill Worley, Wayne Robbins, Rusty Wells, Director of Public Works Doug Watson and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

Sharon Woodcox introduced Boy Scouts Billy Delgado and Joseph Cardenas. The boys were attending the meeting as part of their leadership award.

Brother Marty Reed informed the council of the prayer letter the First Baptist Church has prepared. The Church is planning to take an active part in the community and Reed and someone from the church will be attending the city council

meeting to help, if needed, and show their support of the community.

Charlie Fry spoke about some concerns he had with the police department. It was a simple misunderstanding between some local citizens and the police department. Mayor Morris encouraged more communication in the event more problems arise in the future.

Two requests have been received for street lights. Francis Cobler asked for one at Pine and Jefferson and Lodema Jones has asked at the corner of South 6th Street and Willis for the nutrition center area. Director of Public Works Watson will check both locations and if he feels lights are needed, will request West Texas Utilities to install lights at these locations.

Chris Bennie was on agenda to discuss the National Geographic Explorer doing a study on rattlesnakes in this area. He was not at the time and will reschedule.

The police report was reviewed and accepted. Police Officer Wayne Robbins announced that he is resigning immediately. The Council regretfully accepted the resignation. A called meeting set for October

27 to review applicants for another officer.

Bids for a copy machine to be used by City Hall, and the Court and Police Departments were reviewed. Turner Office Equipment's bid was for a Xerox 5624/5626 analog copier at \$137.00 for 42 months plus a \$15.00 service fee, supplies not included. The Xerox 5820 analog bid was \$108.17 for 42 months plus service fee supplies. Gayland Miller representing Print Solutions in Brownwood presented a bid for a Lexmark Optra S1255 laser printer/copier at a cost of \$164.00 per month for 48 months or \$141.00 for 60 months. Service and supplies fee after the one year warranty would be \$.0395 per copy with a monthly minimum of copies billed at 1,000 per system. Also received was a bid for a Minolta CS/PRO at a cost of \$220.00 per month for 48 months or \$190.00 for 60 months with the same service and supplies fees.

The Xerox bid was with a trade in of all three of City's current copiers, and Print Solutions was without trade-ins. The Lexmark copier will hook up to the City's computer and reports from the computer can be sent directly to that printer/copier eliminating a step in getting multiple copies of a report. The Council will lease/purchase with a \$1.00 buyout of the Lexmark printer-copier from Print Solutions.

The City Council discussed discontinuing services with the Texas Municipal Retirement System and ordinance was presented. The ordinance states that the City will no longer be involved in the TMRS with newly hired or rehired employees. Current city employees would have to quit and rehired with the City in order to transfer their funds into the new simple IRA plan. If a city employee decided to quit for the reason of receiving the retirement funds they would be rehired with their current benefits being reinstated after 30 days employment. Employees would have to be rehired within 30 days. Mayor Morris will be responsible for the rehire of all employees.

Some items needed are:

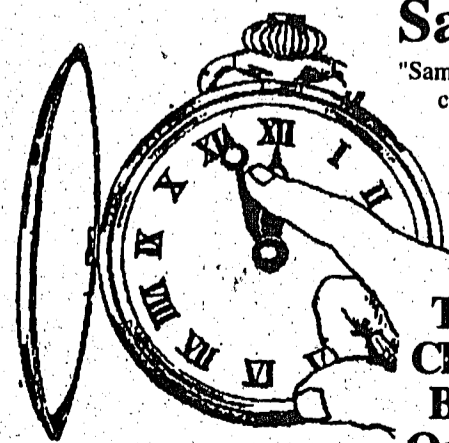

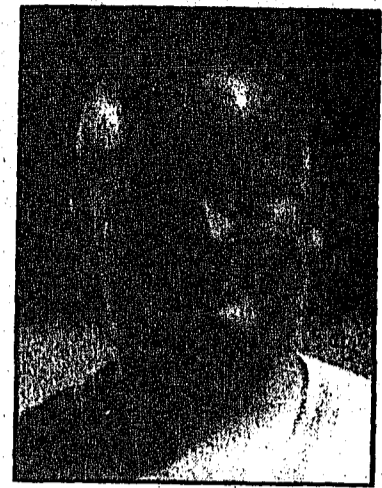
**Editors Note:**

This Friday evening the team will travel to Baird for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff. The Bears have a lot of size. They run the option and use a lot of passing plays.



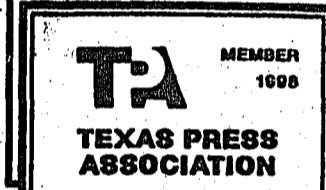
Mountaineer quarterback Jesse Castillo (10) is evading two Miles Bulldogs on one of several carries he made during last Friday evening's football game.

police department uniform patches. A Touch of Class in Santa Anna bid \$247.00 for 36 patches including a set-up charge. Hickman Advertising Specialties of Coleman bid \$1,576.00 for 150 patches include a set-up charge. A Touch of Class was awarded the bid provided that a guaranteed delivery date would be within six weeks.

Parking on Avenue C between South Houston and South Lee Street was discussed. Avenue C is too narrow for parking and two lane traffic. Persons living on Avenue C are unable to back from their drives when cars are parked on either side of the street. When a car is parked at the curb there is only one lane of traffic and emergency vehicles can not get through. Ordinance will be presented allowing no parking in that area.

Director of Public Works Doug Watson reported 21 water leaks with a water loss of 21.5%. Watson has met with the Brown County Water Improvement District and Brookesmith Water Supply about pumping treated water from Lake Brownwood. Brookesmith Water will be laying a line to the west of Bangs for treated water and the City could tie into that line. The cost of treated water would be \$.99 per 1,000 gallons. Watson estimated that it is currently costing \$2.10 per 1,000 gallons to pump water from Lake Brownwood and treat it. He said if the City purchases the treated water he would like to see the minimum water usage go back up to 3,000 gallons or possibly higher.
