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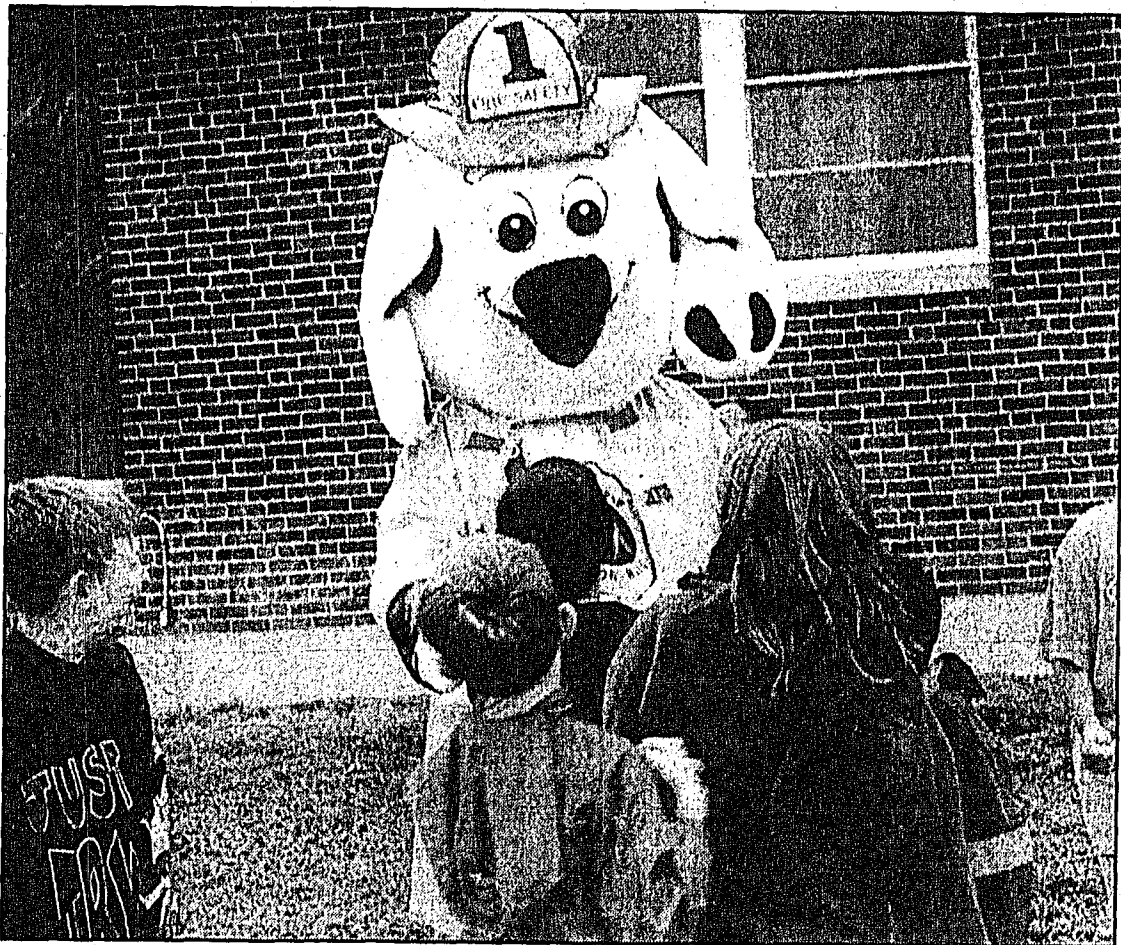

Santa Anna native Guy Allen has won his 13th PRCA World Champion Steer Roper title after competing in the National Finals Steer Roping last weekend in Guthrie, Oklahoma.

Guy, the son of James and Ann Allen of Santa Anna, went to the Finals after earning over \$87,000 in the event this year. He won more than \$12,000 in the weekend competition, making over \$99,000 and a record payment for the event.

Trevor Braziel was overall winner of the Finals, and is second place in the event for 1998. He is also a contender for the All-Around title with earnings in more than one PRCA event.

Allen and his wife, Crill, and two daughters now make their home at Lovington, NM.

Commissioners agreed to continue holding their meetings on the second Monday of each month and

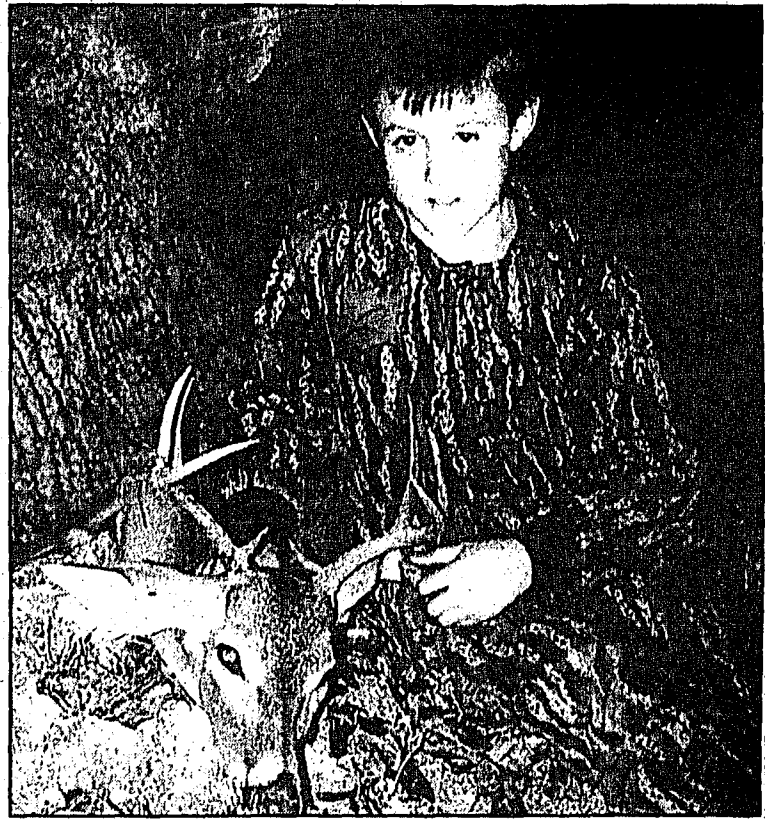

Hunting Season Opens Sat. Ben McIver Gets 8-point Buck In Youth Season

Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Coleman County will open Saturday, November 7 and continue through Jan. 3, 1999. The legal bag limit in Coleman County is 4 deer, no more than 2 bucks. No special permits are required for harvesting antlerless deer, however both bucks and antlerless deer must be properly tagged with an appropriate tag from a valid hunting license.

Deer populations vary from area to area even from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows landowners and hunters the flexibility to harvest antlerless deer on his/her property in order to keep deer numbers in balance with available food supply. It does not automatically mean that a heavy antlerless deer harvest is needed. The recommended harvest rates for both bucks and antlerless deer, provided by the department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer. If more intense management is desired, we suggest that landmanagers survey their own properties. This will allow for a more accurate representation of deer numbers on their ranch. Please note that in most cases the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested than bucks.

The recommended guideline for harvesting antlerless deer throughout most of Coleman County is 1 antlerless deer per 100 acres. The recommended harvest rate on bucks is 1 per 300 acres.

Independence Fighter Remembered By Daughters Of Republic Of Texas

Editors Note: The following article appeared in the Austin American-Statesman on Nov. 11, 1991. It was submitted to us by Mildred Cammack. The veteran, honored in this ceremony was the great-grandfather of her and her brother Lee Ray Huggins.

At 17, John W. McHorse fought for Texas independence at the Battle of San Jacinto, helping Gen. Sam Houston defeat Santa Anna's Mexican troops in the decisive battle.

On Sunday, 155 years later, the Daughters of the Republic of Texas and McHorse's descendants gathered around his grave to honor him on a clear November day.

"It's good that we come back to remember our past," U. S. Rep. Jake Pickle told a crowd of about 60 Sunday at the State Cemetery, near Seventh and Comal. "It's through these kind of events that we recognize what was sacrificed before us."

The ceremony was organized to commemorate today's Veterans Day holiday, the 100th anniversary of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas organization and the addition of two bronze seals to McHorse's tombstone from the Daughters of the Republic of Texas and the San Jacinto Descendants groups.

"We would hope that every veteran of the war for independence would get one of these bronze seals," Pickle said in his speech. "We are here today to recognize one of those who came before us and gave us our freedom."

McHorse not only was a soldier, but also a Baptist minister and land trader.

He came to Texas in 1836 from Alabama at age 17, in time to help defeat Santa Anna. He returned to Alabama to join troops fighting the Seminole Indians in Florida and later fought for the Confederacy in the Civil War. He lived in

Alabama and Arkansas until the 1870's when he moved to Milan County and later Falls and Williamson counties. He died on Jan. 19, 1897 in Leander.

During the ceremony, a banner made from the designs of the flags of San Jacinto, the United States, the United States in 1837, the Confederacy and Texas was draped over his headstone. When it was peeled away, the new seals were revealed.

A musician sounded taps and four members of the Sons of the Republic of Texas dressed in period costumes fired a round from replica muskets of the era. The men carried replica single-shot .50-caliber Hawkin rifles, .50-caliber pistols and Bowie knives.

"The purpose of the Sons of the Republic of Texas is to preserve the memories of the founders of the Republic of Texas," said Martin Jansen, 44, of Florence. "So many people who live in Texas don't realize Texas was once an independent nation. We try to keep the memory alive."
