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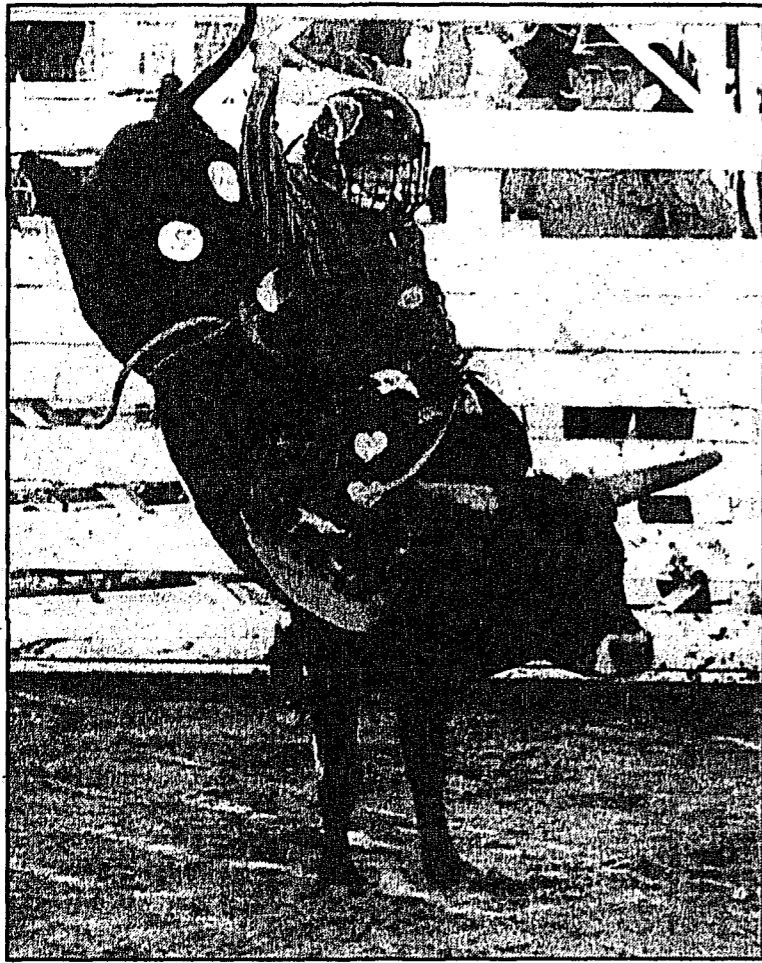

School Board Accepts Bass Resignation

The Santa Anna school board met in special called meeting on Monday night and unanimously accepted the resignation of Superintendent Dean Bass.

Bass said in his letter of resignation to the school trustees, "After 18 years of faithful and loyal service to the Santa Anna Independent School District as teacher, coach, principal and

superintendent I am hereby tendering my resignation as superintendent and as an employee effective November 30, 1998."

Bass who has been on administrative leave since late August also stated in his letter, "This decision is made in part because of my strong and continuing commitment to the Santa Anna Independent School

District, its students and patrons, as I recognize the need for the District to dedicate its resources to the education of children rather than costly employment disputes."

Bass said in his letter that he had already planned to resign at the end of this school. He also said "I remain committed to clearing my good name and reputation in another forum".

The school board voted in September to propose termination and Bass' attorney had filed an appeal of this action. According to School Board president Roddy Dean this resignation is final and will end the appeal.

The board hopes to decide by the end of the year what direction to go in filling the post. District Principal Lee Coffman is currently serving as interim Superintendent.

Lapin Enters U. S. Army Delayed Entry Program

Joshua P. Lapin has joined the United States Army under the Delayed Entry Program at the U. S. Army Recruiting Station in Brownwood.

travel by at least 50%." Travel for patients can be inconvenient, uncomfortable and may cause added stress to a patient and family, he said.

Drs. Mathur, Reynolds, Jones and Tyson of Coleman Medical Associates agree. With the new clinic, they plan to work in cooperation with Dr. Patel to provide services. Together the physicians will bring a cancer outreach site to Coleman County.

Michael Morris, CEO, Coleman County Medical Center, feels that this service will meet a vital need for the members of the community. "Experts tell us that survival rates are tied directly to early detection of cancer. Coleman County Medical Center wants to provide this much needed service to the community," he said.

"We also know that patients prefer to see a physician locally rather than travel long distances. It can be burdensome to patients and families, and we want to provide high quality care locally," he said.

In addition to the clinic, Coleman County Medical Center nursing staff are currently in the process of receiving training toward certification in administration of chemotherapy agents through Hendrick Health System's

Education Department to increase skills and knowledge.

Morris stated, "the increase of services that we are providing will be a way for our staff to grow professionally, and provide a much needed service close to home. We are looking forward to working closely with Hendrick Cancer Center, M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and the physicians."

?STENHOLM?

Mr. Stenholm obviously does not believe in TERM LIMITS! America does NOT need CAREER politicians, we need new statesmen. 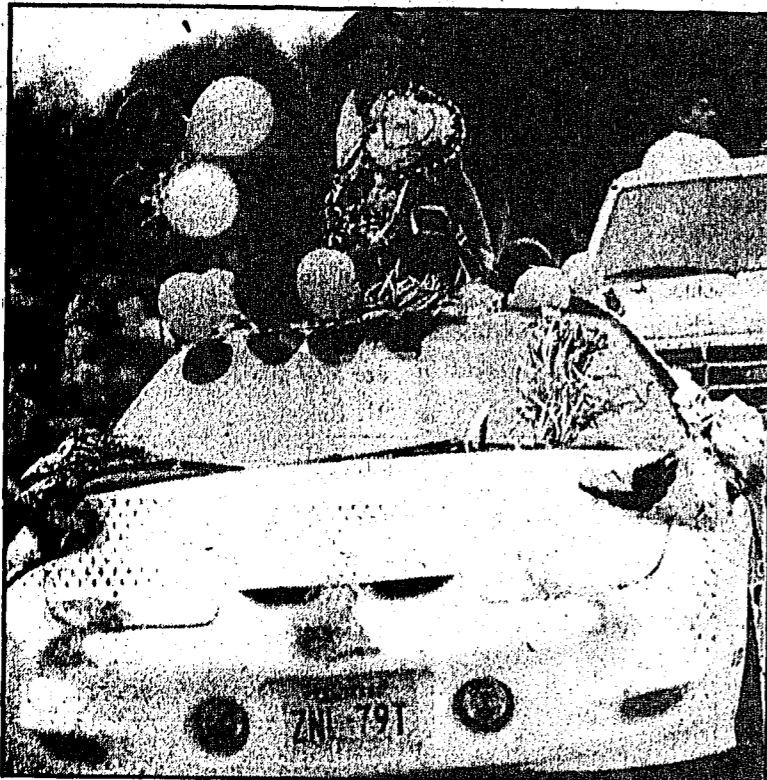

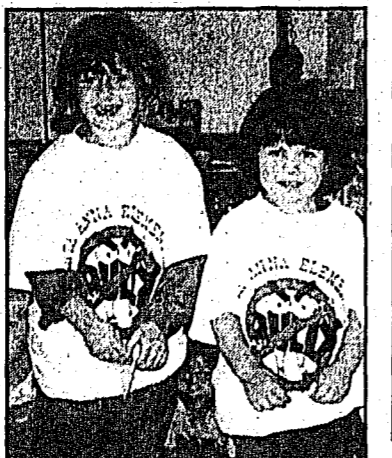
