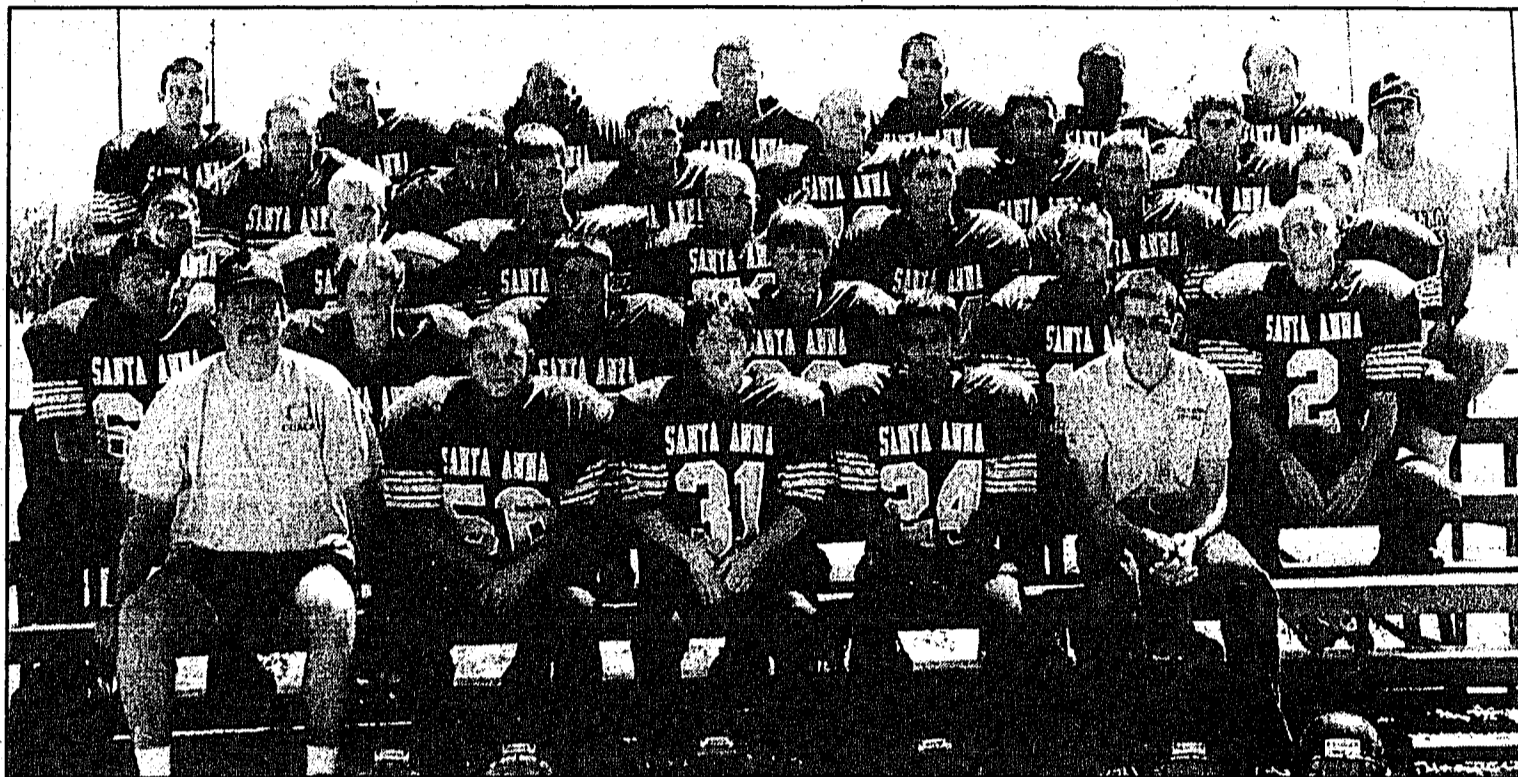

Council Looks At 1998 Audit Report General Fund, Utility Fund Report Loss

The Santa Anna City Council met on Tuesday, September 8 with Mayor Karen Morris and council members Bobby Morgan, Kay Yancy, Jim Spillman and Jean Findley present.

Others attending the meeting were Director of Public Works Doug Watson, City Secretary Alys Pelton, Assistant City Secretary and Court Clerk Cindy Pelton, Municipal Judge William Worley, Chief of Police Carlos Torres, Police Officer Wayne Robbins, city employees Richard Watson, Thomas Watson, Tommy Davis and Rusty Wells, and visitors Dub Franklin and Bonnie Owens.

Collier Watson, city auditor, presented the 1998 Audit Report. The general fund revenues were \$180,932.97 with expenses \$220,898.20 and transfers of \$39,416.70 for a loss of \$548.53. The utility fund revenues were \$436,444.43 with expenses of \$399,003.50 and non-operating ex-

penses of \$50,000.76 for a loss of \$12,559.83. The audit was accepted as presented.

The property tax rate was set at .6519 per \$100 evaluation.

Santa Anna High School Principal Lee Coffman submitted a letter asking the council's permission to have a homecoming bonfire. The bonfire will be permitted as long as it is coordinated through the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department.

City Secretary Alys Pelton presented a bid for a new copy machine. The City will be trading three old copiers for a new copier. It is decided to get more bids and allow Director of Public Works Doug Watson make the final decision.

The second reading of the Utility Rate Ordinance was accepted.

The bond note and police car note at the Santa Anna National Bank were renewed.

The title to the senior citizen van was signed over to the City of Bangs.

The City will cast a vote for Gary Butts for the TML Group Benefits Risk Pool Board of Directors.

The personnel and law enforce-

ment policies were discussed. Animal Control will be handled by the police department. One police officer and one city employee will be sent to Animal Control School. The city maintenance department will be in charge of pickup, care and disposal of dogs with the police department responsible for paperwork, start to finish. It will also be the responsibility of the police department to be sure all dog cases are handled properly.

The new 12-hour police department schedule was presented. This schedule will enable the City to have an officer on call 24-hours a day and one who is on call each day of the week. Each officer will work 12-hour shifts and be on call 12-hours. They will rotate being on call 36 hours one week and 48 hours the following week. Vacation requests will be submitted to the Coleman County Sheriff's Department one month prior to the time requested. No compensation will be accrued.

Each officer will be required to complete the duties of their shift

School Board Amend Items On Dress Code

The Santa Anna School Board met on Monday, September 14 and discussed some changes to the current school dress code.

The dress code is revised to read as follows concerning the articles of clothing described:

Any blouse or shirt which reveals cleavage, muscle shirt, tube tops, strapless tops and tops with less than a two (2) inch width at the shoulder seam.

Shorts and split skirt shorter than five (5) inches from the crotch seam of the garment to the edge of the garment hem.

Fleece, bicycle and wind shorts (with the exception of nylon shorts that are fully lined and meet the appropriate length and fit requirements.)

Several members of the board and faculty met with the students to discuss the dress code and these changes were agreed to by all parties.

The group is a non-denominational non-profit Christian Youth Group. The goal of the organizers is to lead all youth to Jesus Christ

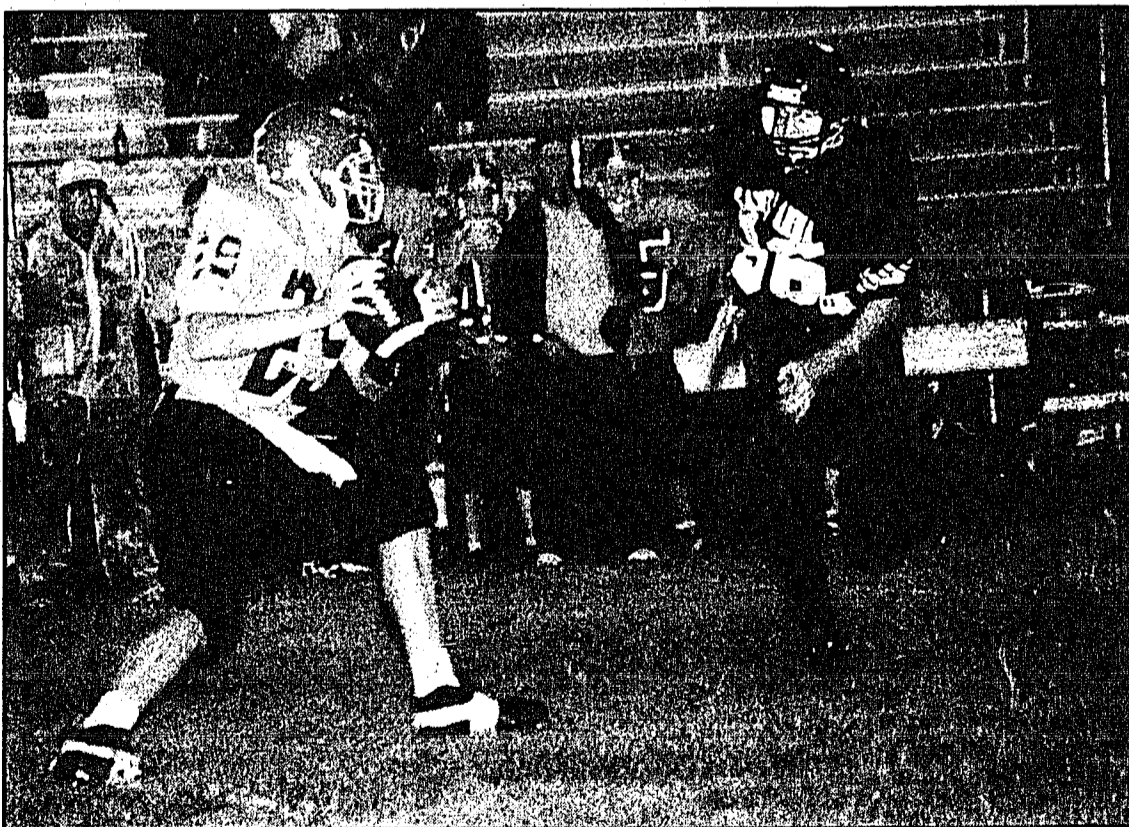
and to provide activities that teach them to respect their community, to respect themselves, and to educate them on the resistance of peer pressure, alcohol and illegal drugs.

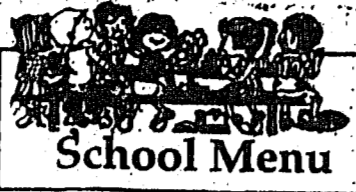

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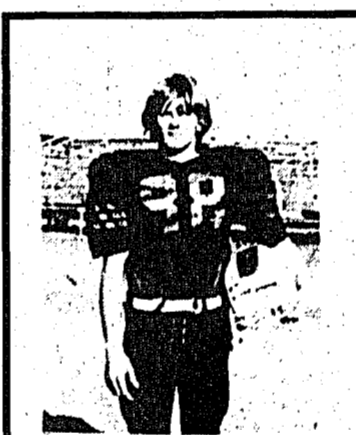

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Stenholm Announces District-Wide School Survey Results

WASHINGTON, D. C.—During a Back to School Week tour, Congressman Charlie Stenholm announced results of a School Modernization Survey which he sent to all 403 public school principals within the 17th Congressional District. The Survey investigated the physical status of area schools, including the age of the schools, school safety and threats to learning, availability of Internet and computers in the classrooms, and an evaluation of the physical conditions of the physical plant including floors, roofs, windows, lighting, etc.

"Having recently read government reports about the state of some of our Nation's schools. I wanted to find out if we in the 17th District are prepared to continue providing our children with a safe environment and the appropriate learning tools," Stenholm commented. "This report indicates that the physical conditions of most of our schools are not dire, and in fact some schools represent model facilities. Unfortunately, though, approximately a third of the principals rated their schools' conditions as only fair, poor or very poor."

In addition to District-wide results, Stenholm's report provides county-by-county figures for the 17th Congressional District. A majority of the District's principals

responded to the survey, with 31 of the District's 32 counties represented. All results reported reflect answers provided by those 203 principals completing and returning the survey by August 26.

"I would like to see the federal government do more to help local schools modernize, improve the safety of their buildings, and reduce class sizes," Stenholm said. "With the results of this survey in hand, I am better armed to ensure that our area gets its fair share of federal education funds," Stenholm said.

Some of the survey results reported by Stenholm include:

- *Approximately one-quarter of the responding schools are 50 years or older.
- *Threats to learning mentioned included: the environment (such as traffic surrounding the school)—13%; drugs—12%; violence—9%.
- *More than a third of the respondents currently face an overcrowding problem; an additional 13% anticipate further crowding in the next 10 years.
- "With the under-18 age group now exceeding the number of Baby Boomers, it's clear that our education systems will be pressed to meet new demands," Stenholm noted. "I have full confidence that the educators, students, parents, communities and governments will rise to the challenges."

Census Bureau Is Hiring In Coleman County Field Workers and Office Workers Needed Immediately

The U.S. Census Bureau is gearing up now for the Census 2000 by updating its maps and address lists in counties and communities throughout the state. Locally the Census is looking for people who can work at least 20 hours a week. The hours are flexible, and some of the work can be done on weekends and during evening hours.

Census field workers drive through communities and rural areas, even walking street by street, to check the accuracy of Census Bureau maps and addresses. They get reimbursed 31 cents a mile for using their car. The census clerks handle a variety of standard office tasks, like answering phones, filing documents, and managing supplies.

"We're looking for people who are out of work, who are retired, or who want to schedule census work around their current employment," explains spokesman Frank Newton. "The hours are flexible and the pay is good."

In Coleman County the Census pay for field workers is \$6.75 per hour and the office clerk pay is \$5.50 per hour.

To qualify, applicants must be a U.S. Citizen and be 18 years old (or 16 and have a high school diploma or GED). They should not have a conviction (other than minor traffic violation) and they should not be currently working as a tax collector or law enforcement official. All Census employees must pass a security and employment reference check.

Applicants for the field worker and clerk jobs must pass a 30-minute exam of basic work skills. For details about the exam dates or to get more information about these opportunities, call the field office in San Angelo at (915)486-2403 or the Census Bureau's Recruiting Department toll-free in Dallas at 1-888-325-7733.

Applicants should be assured that the U.S. Census Bureau is an Equal Employment Opportunity employer and all qualified applicants will be considered regardless of age, race, color, sex, creed, national origin, or other non-merit factors.

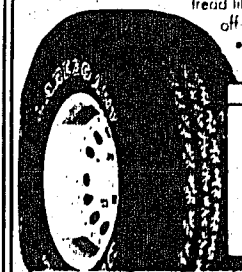
