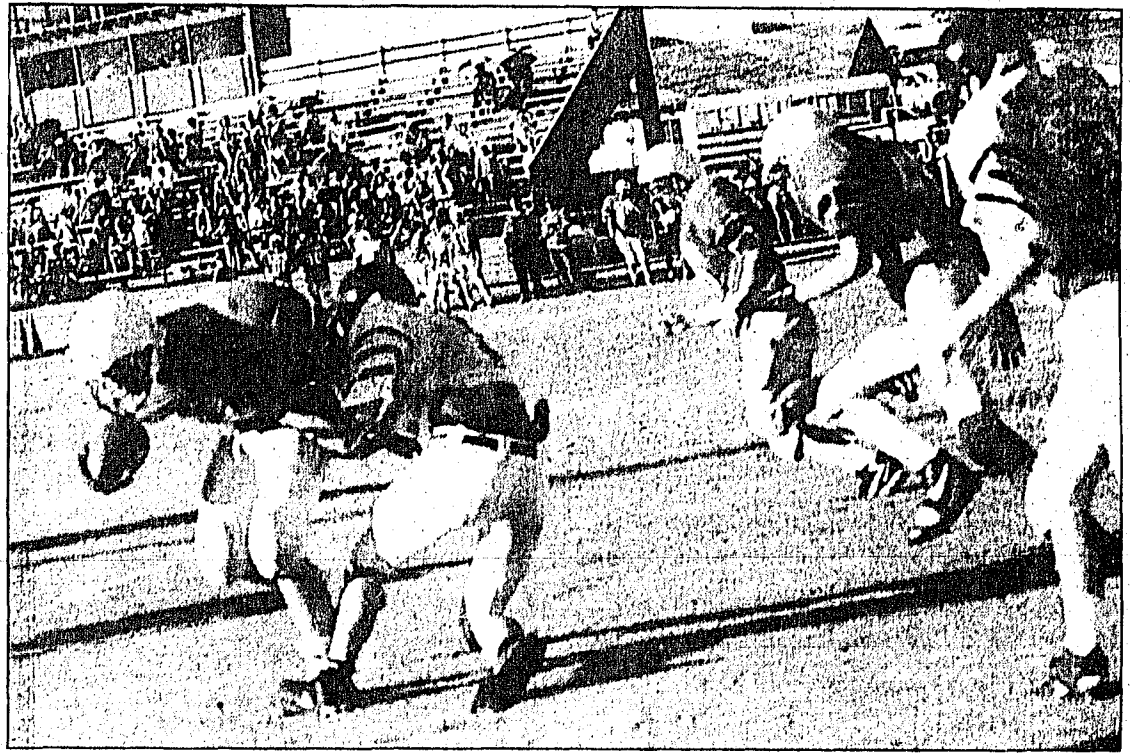

Aspirin And Reye's Syndrome

Epidemiology research has shown an association between the development of Reye's Syndrome and the use of aspirin-type products for treating influenza-like illnesses, chicken pox and colds. The National Reye's Syndrome Foundation, the U. S. Surgeon General, the Food and Drug Administration, and the Center for Disease Control recommend that aspirin and combination products containing aspirin not be given to children or teenagers who are suffering from one of these illnesses. Some medication labels may use the words acetylsalicylate, acetylsalicylic acid, salicylsalicylic, salicylamide, phenyl salicylate, etc., instead of the word aspirin. While there is not data as to whether other forms of salicylate other than aspirin may be associated with the development of Reye's Syndrome and until further research has answered this question, we recommend that products listing any of these substances not be taken by individuals during an episode of a viral illness. Products may be reformulated from time to time to add or remove ingredients. Always ask your doctor or pharmacist before taking any medication and be sure to NEVER exceed the recommended dosage.

Stenholm Encourages Students To Apply For Academy Nominations

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that he is currently seeking applicants for nomination to the United State Service Academies. Applications for nomination to the U. S. Military Academy in West Point, New York, the U. S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado, the U. S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland and the United States Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, New York may be

obtained by writing to Congressman Stenholm's Washington, D.C. office.

Nominations are available to young men and women who will be at least 17 years of age, and not past their 22nd birthday, upon entry into the academy in July 1999.

Nominees are selected by a competitive process, judged on scholastic aptitude, moral character, leadership ability, and community involvement.

The academies offer a four-year degree in a variety of areas ranging from Civil Engineering and Physics, to American Studies and Behavioral Science. While attending the academies, cadets and midshipmen will earn an annual salary from which expenses for books, uniforms and incidentals are taken. Tuition, room, board, medical and dental expense are paid for by the

academies. Upon graduation from the academies, the cadets and midshipmen will serve as officers in the service for a minimum of six years.

Any persons who may be interested in applying for a nomination, or who would like to obtain additional information, should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, 1211 Longworth House Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20515. Applications must be submitted, and files completed, no later than December 1, 1998. Nominations will be made toward the end of December.

Coleman County Commissioners met on August 31 for their end-of-the-month meeting. A bid was opened for equipment on sale in Precinct 3. Smith Diesel Service of Coleman County bid \$250 for a dump truck bed and it was accepted. County Treasurer Kay LeMay informed commissioners of a number of changes possible in the present retirement plans which is with Texas County and District Retirement System of Austin. After discussion, it was approved to maintain the present plan with no changes. The donated right of-way easements for FM 1026 was tabled due to additional documents being required. County Auditor Shirley Sansing present bills for the General Fund \$1,575; Road and Bridge \$44.87 and Precinct 1, 2, and 4 totaling \$663. A public hearing will be held on September 14 on the proposed budget and tax rate. The proposed budget is approximately 42,062,899 with the proposed tax rate at .5913. The present tax rate is .5797.

ELDER ABUSE

ABUSE OF AN ELDERLY person, whether by a family member or health care provider, is a tragedy. In many cases, the abused elder is dependant upon the abuser for care and is afraid to complain for fear of reprisal.

Fortunately, state authorities can intervene and investigate reports of abuse, neglect or exploitation of the elderly or disabled. The Office of the Attorney General becomes involved when the Texas Department of Human Services refers substandard nursing homes for legal action.

I encourage everyone to report suspected abuse of an elderly or disabled person. State law requires you to do so.

Who are the victims?

Elder abuse happens to both males and females. Elderly females, however, make up the majority of victims. For both men and women, the abuser is often a male, usually a family member or health care provider.

Elderly people who are medically frail and who have mental impairments are especially at risk as targets for abusers. Often these victims are powerless to stop the abuse and are dependant upon the very people who are abusing them.

Many times, the abuse happens gradually, starting as inappropriate comments and then escalating to physical and sexual assault.

Nursing home reforms

In an effort to combat abuse of nursing home patients, the federal Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), which oversees state nursing home inspections, is initiating tough new measures.

HCFA will post the names of nursing homes with repeat offenses on the Internet. Data from inspections will be put into an automated system that will assist inspectors by providing early detection of potential problems.

Additionally, state inspectors will replace predictable annual reviews with surprise visits. Nursing homes or care centers with poor records will be subject to additional inspections.

Signs of abuse

Signs of physical abuse include frequent injuries such as bruises, cuts, or black eyes; frequent complaints of pain without obvious injury; burns or bruises in unusual patterns; passive, withdrawn, and emotionless behavior; lack of reaction to pain; and reports of physical abuse.

Indications of sexual abuse include malnutrition, lack of personal cleanliness, habitual dressing in dirty clothes, obvious fatigue and listlessness, begging for food, needing medical or dental care, being left un-

tended for long periods of time, and reports of neglect.

How to report a complaint

Texas law requires anyone who suspects abuse, exploitation, or neglect of an elderly or disabled person to report the abuse. Failure to report these crimes is a Class A Misdemeanor. If you suspect abuse of an elderly or disabled person, report the abuse to the Texas Department of

Protective and Regulatory Services at (800) 252-5400.

Anyone who has complaints about a nursing home can also call the Texas Department of Human Services (Long-Term Care) at (800) 458-9858 or, if the facility is a Medicaid provider, the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Hotline at (800) 252-8011.

If you call to make a complaint, you should be prepared to provide the name and address of the nursing home, name and room number of the patient, brief statement of the complaint and your own name, phone number and address.

Citizens over the age of 60 can also call the Legal Hotline for Older Texans at (800) 622-2520 for legal assistance.

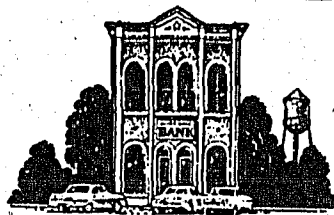

New \$20 bill features anti-counterfeiting devices

Don't be alarmed when the bank teller hands you \$20 bills that look like play money. September 24 marks the date the new Andrew Jackson will be showing up around the country.



Tips from Your Community Banker

But beware of counterfeiters who may try to take advantage of those who are not familiar with the bill's new design.

Designed to improve the security of our currency, the Series 1996 \$20 note is the first widely used bill to be redesigned. New \$50 and \$100 notes already have been introduced, but it's the twenty that is given most often in change at banks, retail outlets and through ATM machines.

The new note is the result of a five-year study focused on staying ahead of the counterfeiting threat. In addition, the new U.S. currency incorporates features that will make it more readily identifiable, especially for the visually impaired.

The first noticeable change on the new \$20 bill is a larger and off-center portrait of Jackson, the nation's seventh president. The larger portrait incorporates more detail making it difficult to counterfeit and easier to identify.

Federal Reserve Indicators: The entire Federal Reserve System is represented by a new seal. The letter and number under the left serial number identify the issuing Federal Reserve Bank.

Fine Line Printing: Behind the portrait and around the historic building on the back, there are fine-line printing patterns. This makes the line structure appear normal to the eye but difficult to replicate.

Serial Numbers: An additional letter is added to the serial number.

Watermark: A watermark identical to the portrait is visible from both sides against a light.

Color-Shifting Ink: The numeral on the lower right corner of the face of the note changes from green to black when viewed from different angles.

Security Thread: Each denomination is positioned with the use of a unique security thread. This is a type of thread or ribbon that runs through a bank note substrate. The new \$20 bill features the thread to the far left of the portrait and glows green when held under ultraviolet light. The words "USA Twenty" and a flag can be seen from both sides against the light.

Microprinting: "The United States of America" is on the lower edge ornamentation of the oval framing in the portrait. On the front of the note, "USA 20" is repeated within the number in the lower left corner.

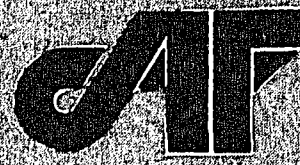

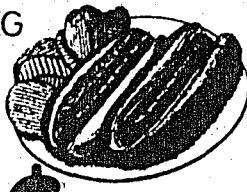

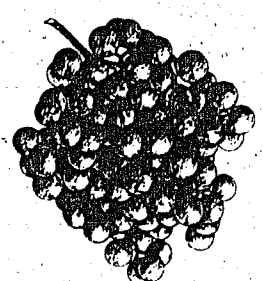
