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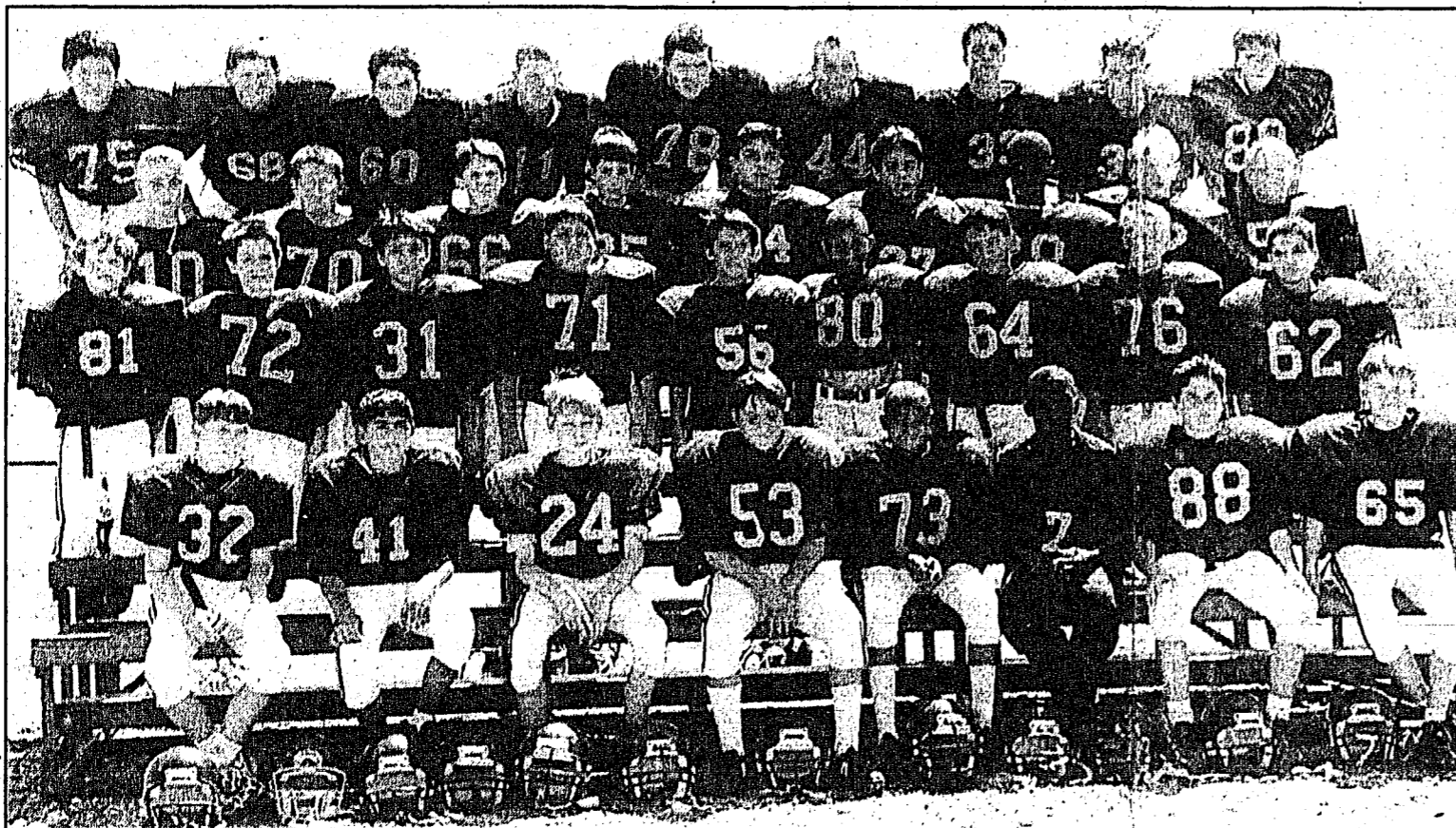

## Update On Deer Hunter Missing In Coleman County

As an update on the story of the "missing" hunter in Coleman County who thought his hunting companions had returned to Dallas leaving him behind, it is now believed he spent the night in the wilderness near Novice.

Bill Hairgrove, 38, was reported missing by his three companions who were hunting approximately 4 to 6 miles south of Novice this past Sunday afternoon.

As a result of their report, an all-out effort was made by Coleman

County law enforcement to locate the missing man. They were assisted in the search by tracking dogs and a helicopter with infra-red equipment. The search began Sunday afternoon and continued until noon Monday when it was discovered the man had spoken with a land owner near Novice Sunday afternoon. He had told the land owner his companions had left him behind and he was going to find a way to return to Dallas.

According to a release by the Coleman County Sheriff's office Tuesday, it is now believed the man spent Sunday night in the wilderness. A man fitting his description was picked up by a man from the Novice area Monday morning around 9 a.m. and brought to Coleman. He was let out at the Tradewinds Motor Inn located just north of the city of Coleman and was told how to get to Dallas from there on Hwy 206.

All this was happening Monday morning while the search went on near Novice and while the man's companions remained in Coleman County. It is reported the three men did not leave the area to return to Dallas until Monday afternoon.

According to information from Coleman County Sheriff's department late Tuesday, it appears Hairgrove was last seen in Coleman County Monday morning.

The case continues to be treated as a "missing persons" case.

## Council Hires Police Officer Passes Ordinance On Narrow Steert Parking

The Santa Anna City Council hired a police officer in its regular meeting held Tuesday night.

The new officer is Michael Montgomery, recently of the Gouldbusk area, now a resident of Santa Anna. Most recently employed in oil field work, Montgomery has a background in law enforcement with Texas Park and Wildlife and with the Blanco County Sheriff's Department. He is married to the former Denise Blair McElrath. Montgomery will begin in his work as Santa Anna police officer on Monday.

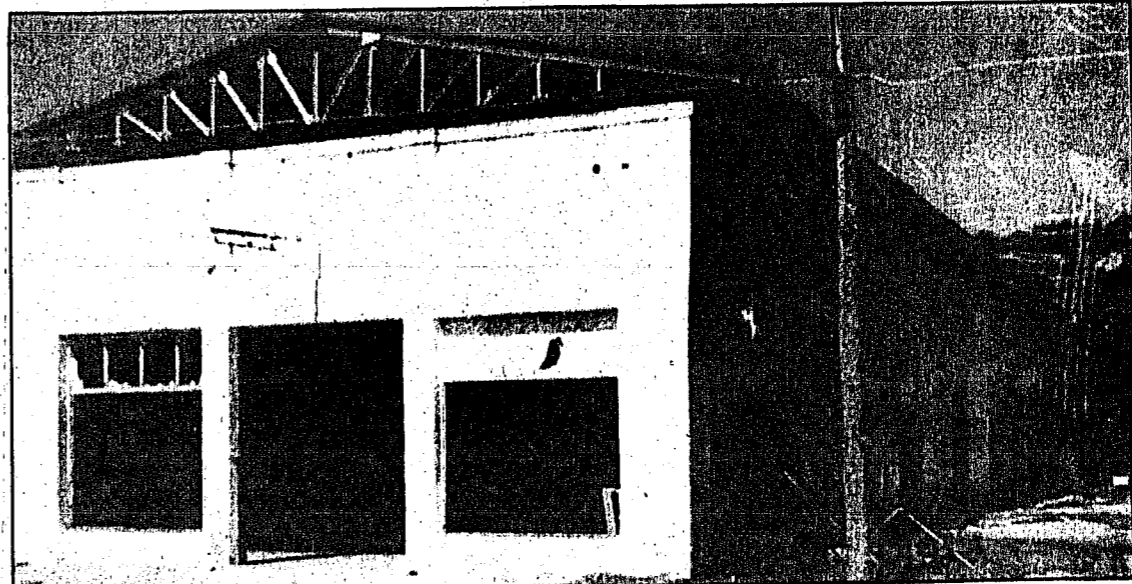

# The Secret To Long Life

## Even A Triple Bypass Couldn't Slow Him Down

*Editors Note: The following article appeared in the Pasadena Citizen newspaper on Sunday, October 26, 1997. James T. Oakes will be remembered by many of our readers and we thought you might enjoy reading about him.*

By Jeff Riggs Citizen Staff James T. Oakes, of Pasadena, is about to reach a major milestone in his life. He is turning 80 on Nov. 8. He was born in 1917 in Santa

Anna, Texas. "The secret is that I don't drink or smoke," he said. "At least, I haven't in years and years. I have lived a clean life and have been honest with people. That's the way to live a long life."

Oakes said he only had one health problem. That was in 1975, when he underwent triple bypass heart surgery.

"I was laid off for a year. Doctors told me it would be the end of my working. After a year, I went back to work."

Oakes was in the oil drilling business in all facets, from offshore to oil rigs on the mainland. His experience in oil drilling spanned from 1936 until 1970.

Then, he began working for contractors in the plants from one end of the ship channel area to the other, until he retired in 1984 at RelChem Corp. in Pasadena.

Oakes and his wife Donna have three children, all in Pasadena.

Tommy Lynn Oakes, 48, works for Exxon, Sharon Oakes and Stanley Oakes, ages 46 and 40, respectively, are educators. Stanley is an orchestra instructor at Parkview Elementary, and Sharon is a principal at Frazier Elementary.

The Oakes have five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Oakes said he and his wife will celebrate their 50th anniversary in January.

"Lots of times she probably wanted to leave me, but she went with me to the oilfields all over the country. She was very supportive," he said.

The Oakes are members of First Church of the Nazarene in Pasadena.

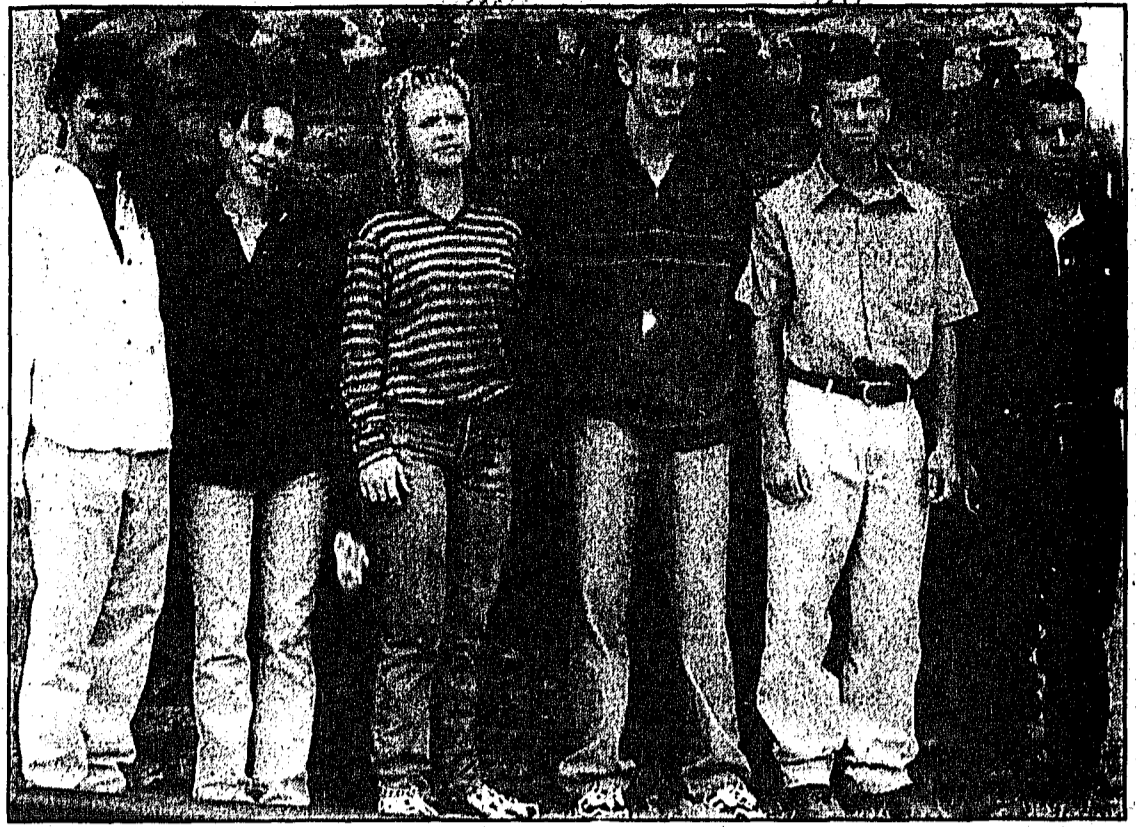

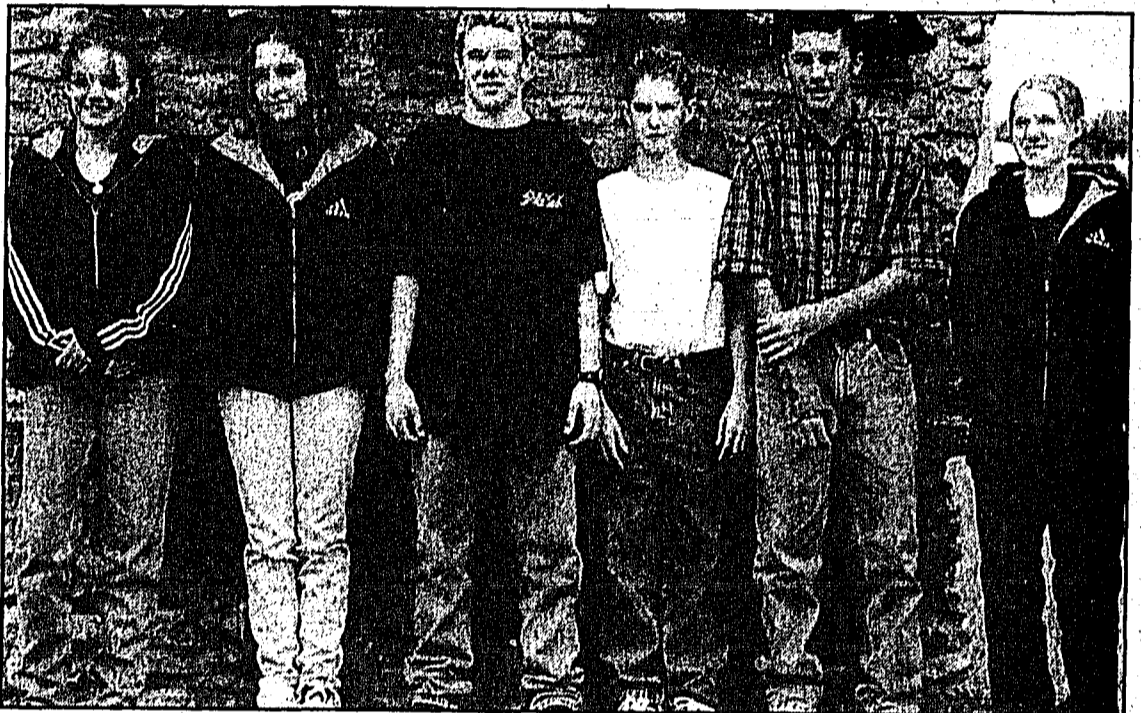

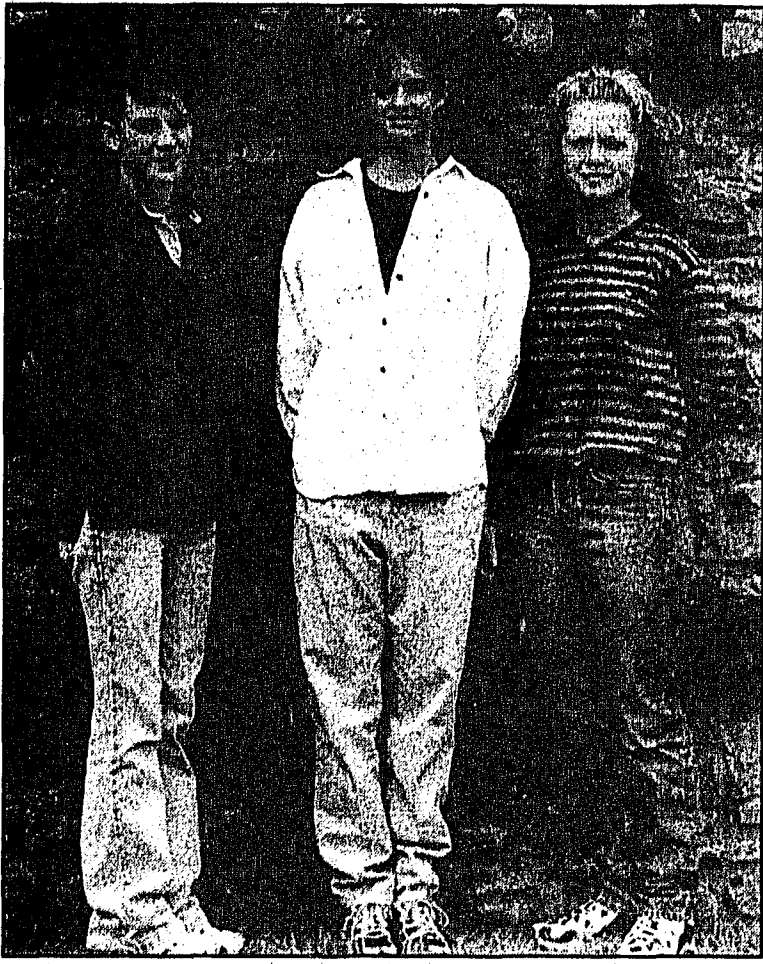

David Huggins addressed the Council concerning the need for a pumper truck for the Fire Department. The firemen are expecting asses the pumper truck they now have and report to the council next month on problems it may have. Huggins was hoping to possibly find help in replacing the truck through grant programs.

The council passed on second reading the ordinance prohibiting parking on streets less than 30 feet in width.
