## New Ordinance Prohibits Parking Vehicles On Streets Less Than 30 Feet In Width

A new ordinance was passed on second reading by the City Council at their meeting on Tuesday of last week. The ordinance prohibits parking vehicles on streets within the city limits that are less than 30 feet in width.

The ordinance cites the concern that parking on the narrow streets limits access for emergency vehicles. The ordinance states: "It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle of any kind at any time on a public street with a width of less than 30 feet or

less. Any driver of any vehicle who permits the parking or does actually park such a vehicle on a public street with a width of 30 feet or less shall, upon conviction, be fined more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

## New Police Officer On The Beat

Michael Montgomery is the new Santa Anna police officer you have been seeing around town, officially beginning his job Monday morning.

Formerly of the Gouldbusk area Montgomery actually has been living in Santa Anna for a while, since his marriage to the former Denise Blair McElrath.

Most recently he has been employed in oil field work but is not new to law enforcement. Montgomery has a background in law enforcement having worked with the Texas Park & Wildlife, as a reserve police officer with the Elgin Police Department and he

## SAISD To Offer College Courses To Community Via Computer

The start of the new year will bring some opportunities for students at Santa Anna High School and adults in the community. The Santa Anna ISD will begin offering

other colleges.

These courses will be computer internet courses offered through e-mail. Future plans include classes offered through interactive television where the student can see and hear the instructor although at this time it is not known what date these classes will begin.

Classes will be offered in the technology lab in the new library building.

Requirements to be eligible for college classes are TASP test scores; passing all three sections of the TAAS; and some colleges may have other prerequisites.

Cost will be \$75.00 tuition fee; \$50.00 on-line fee; and cost of books for the class being taken.

Although registration will be through Jan. 14, 1999, those who

wish to take college classes are urged to contact Montie Guthrie, Mark Burrell or Lee Coffman at the Santa Anna school as soon as possible since each offered course will only accept 25 students.

Those who are planning to participate by taking classes should be aware that the Santa Anna ISD is acting as a provider for VCT by allowing their technology lab to be used and are in no way responsible for classes, courses, etc.

## City's Burn Ordinance Still In Effect

You are reminded by officials that the City of Santa Anna still has an ordinance against burning within the city limits.

Since the County officials lifted the county burn ban, citizens have seemed to be under the impression that burning in the city limits is now permissible.

According to officials this is "far from the truth. The lifting of the

County burn ban has no bearing on the no burning ordinance passed by the City of Santa Anna several months ago. A number of citizens have found out recently that you can be subject to a stiff fine for burning within the city limits.

The ordinance bans all burning except in devices built for the preparation of food.

At a recent City Council meeting it was indicated that the council might possibly grant occasional variances to the ordinance if the fire marshal considered the burning to not be a threat to any adjoining property.

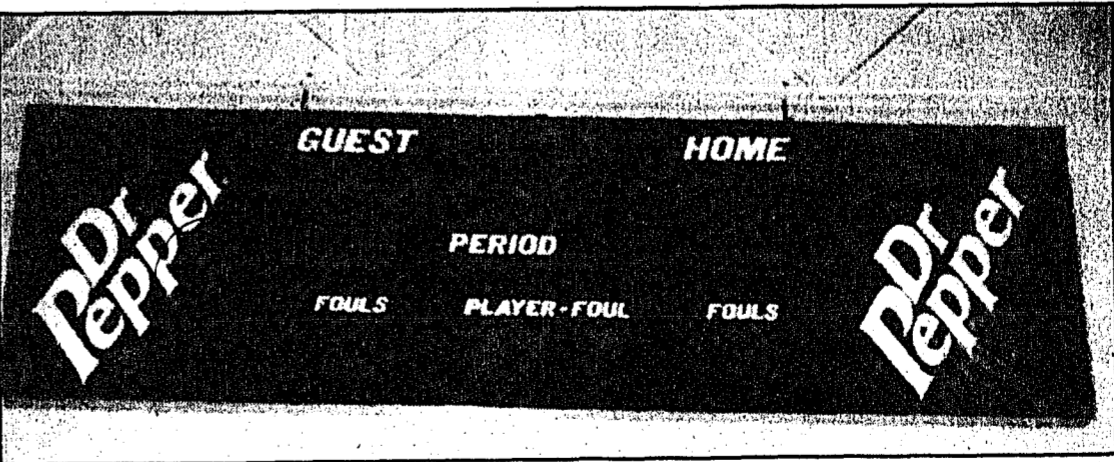

### Municipal Judge Bill Worley Presents Program To Self Culture Club

Self Culture... Club met Wednesday, November 11 at 2 p.m. at the home of Oma Dean Horner. Bill Worley, who is currently serving as the Municipal Judge in Santa Anna, presented a very interesting program. He told of many of his experiences in law enforcement and answered questions about problems in Santa Anna.

Mr. Worley believes the major problem in Santa Anna is money or lack of money. Both the City itself and most of its citizens are on a very limited budget. The streets, the sewer system and the water system in Santa Anna are old. The City crew spends much of its time and the City's money just keeping the water system working. That leaves little time and money for street repairs and no money to replace the old system. There are a lot of abandoned and neglected buildings in Santa Anna that are unattractive and do not bring in any tax money. If this property could be cleaned up, perhaps it could be used to attract new people to Santa Anna. This would be a slow process and could not be done without the full support of the citizens and the City Council.

Traffic tickets bring very little income to the City. The State gets \$41.50 from each fine for tickets written on state highways in the City. If someone pays a \$50 fine

for speeding, the State gets \$41.50 and the City only gets \$8.50.



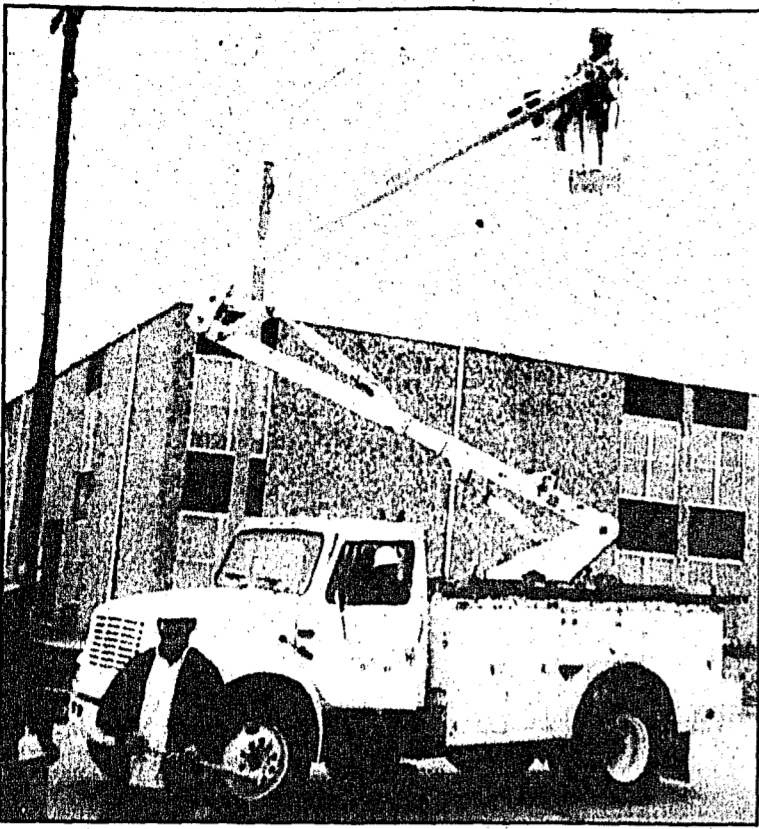
