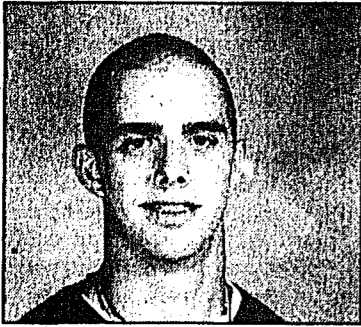

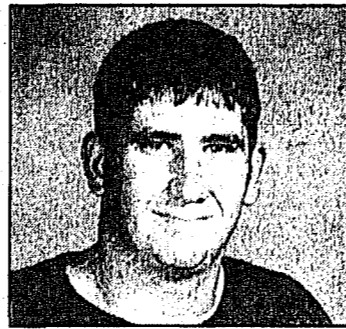

City Again Looks For Police Officer

The Santa Anna City Council met in executive session on Friday of last week to discuss information that had been brought to their attention and act on advise of the City's legal counsel.

Following the closed meeting the council voted to terminate the employment of Mike Montgomery, who had only last Monday officially started his job as police officer, having been hired by the council the previous week after weeks of search.

Mayor Karen Morris said Monday that the termination had absolutely nothing to do with Montgomery as a person, but was strictly for liability reasons. She said the council acted on the advise of the City's attorney's office.

The council planned to talk with another applicant for the position on Tuesday night, November 24.

In response to the Council's action Montgomery made the following statement:

"I believe that the Mayor and City Council members acted in what they believed to be the

best interest of the people of Santa Anna and that of legal counsel for the City, at the meeting Friday. I do not agree

and believe a further look at all facts would have resulted in a different outcome. I understand and believe one should take advice of legal counsel but find it hard to believe all the facts were known. I do not have any

bad feelings toward the Mayor or City Council members."

Montgomery said, "Chief Carlos Torres is a credit to Santa Anna. I found him to be fair minded and a professional in the week I worked with him. I regret not having the

opportunity to work with him any further. I could have learned much from him. I hope the Council will work quickly to

hire another officer to relieve some of the pressure placed on him having to work around the clock."

"I believe my being hired and terminated was not handled properly but the City Council did show concern for me and my

family. In concern for my reputation, the Council gave me an opportunity to resign rather

than to be fired, to prevent gossip. I could not see now quitting a job which I wanted so

much and had for which I had quit another job to take for which the salary was double of

this one. I took this position because I wanted to serve, protect and be a part of the community I call home. The

City terminated me officially for no reason. Texas is a right to work state but unofficially they were concerned about the fact I was once charged with a Class A misdemeanor."

Montgomery went on to say,

"I believe gossip stems from a lack of facts and the truth can prevent gossip, so I would like to lay all the cards on the table. The facts are:

*I had assault charges filed against me by my ex mother-in-law (involving custody of my children).

*The truth is I did not assault my ex mother-in-law.

*I was not convicted but did plead and get a deferred adjudication and did 9 months probation.

*I do hold a valid peace officer license from the State of Texas and am in good standing with Texas Commission on Law Enforcement.

*I believe my four years in Law Enforcement and over 10 years in public relations would have made me an asset to Santa Anna and the police department.

*I have never been fired or ask to resign from any previous position.

*City Council and legal counsel believed I would have

been a liability to the City of Santa Anna."

He said, "I was looking forward to being a part of the law enforcement of Santa Anna and Coleman County and pray that the truth will prevail so that I will have the opportunity to serve my community again."

"I would like to say thank you to my wife Denise, my family and friends for their support."

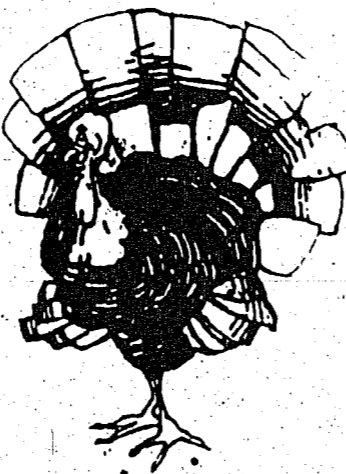

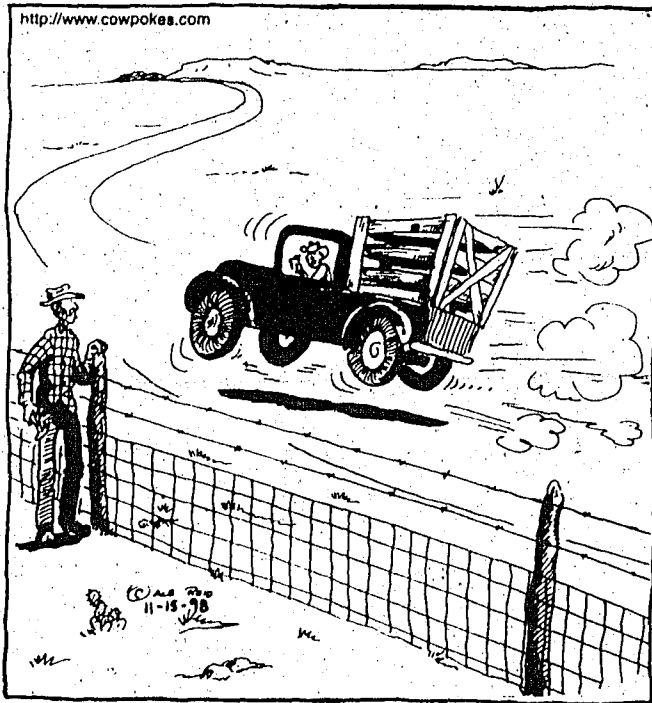
