TEXAS UNIVERSITY  
SPECIALIZING IN ENGLISH

Austin, Texas, Nov. 21.—Painstaking research in English at the University of Texas is evidenced by the articles published in the current issue of "Studies in English," a bulletin compiled by members of the English department at that institution and edited by Dr. Killis Campbell. This is the twelfth of a series published annually. The articles in the current issue include the following: "The Glosses in the current issue in English Prose Psalter" by Dr. Sarah Dodson; "A Manuscript Copy of 'The Plowman's Tale'" by Dr. Annie S. Irvine; "The Peculiar Excellence of William Tindale's Translation of the Gospels" by Dr. Lois Ware; "Notes on Shakespeare's 'Much Ado'" by Dr. R. A. Law; "The Authorship of 'The Medal of John Bayes'" by D. M. McKeithan; "An Eighteenth Century Adaptation of Shakespeare" by Powell Stewart; "A Various Text of Four Pastorals" by Dr. R. H. Griffith; "Lewis and Clark's 'Expedition' As a Source for Poe's 'Julius Rodman.'"

Designed to inform secondary schools and colleges as to the nature of the course in freshman English at The University of Texas, a bulletin has been published by the English department of that institution by a committee consisting of professors David Lee Clark, Jacob Neu, Annie Irvine and W. Payne. The bulletin is divided in two parts, the first an extensive explanation of the nature of the freshman course, rhetoric and English composition, and the second a detailed report of the freshman English examination given in September, 1931, including test results, remarks, and specimen themes. The report is tabulated according to the five phases of test showing the performance of each individual school represented by students.


**W. C. T. U. HAS PLEASANT MEETING**

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
