## Santa Anna Wins First Conference Game from Winters

First Win from Winters in Many Years

Last Friday afternoon at Ballinger at the Fair, the Mountaineers from Santa Anna met the Blizzards from Winters in the first conference tilt of District 13. The Mountaineers came off victors by the score of 7-0. This is the first game they have been able to take from Winters in more than five years.

During the first quarter the battle was about equal but in the second the Santa Anna boys began to show their superiority and came into scoring territory inside the 20 yard line twice. The strong defense of the Winters boys kept them from crossing the goal line. During the third and fourth quarters our boys kept pushing up into scoring position but could not get through Winters strong line for a score. About the middle of the last period Captain Fletcher and Clifford Wheeler, who calls signals from right end, got their heads together and the team began chunking passes. The ball was passed to the 8 yard line once when it was lost on an incomplete pass into the end zone. On the next journey up the field a pass was complete over the goal line for a touchdown.

There were no stars on the Santa Anna team unless each player could be called star. Every fellow did his part well when he was called upon whether on offense or defense. The Mountaineers' superiority throughout the game is shown by the fact that the Winters team never got within 30 yards of a touchdown.

The Mountaineers play their first game at home this week. A non-conference game with Pioneer. This may be a tough game for the Santa Anna boys as Pioneer played Rising Star, a strong Class B team, to a tie.

## Fergusons Win Election Contest

Name Will Go On Ballot  
The Supreme Court of Civil Appeals decided the election contest recently filed by Governor Sterling and his attorneys last Saturday, in favor of the Fergusons, and the secretary of state has certified the name of Mrs. Miram A. Ferguson to all county clerks as the democratic nominee for governor.

This settles the matter until after the election, but it may be brought up in the house when the Legislature meets in January.

Mr. Sterling has been classified as a "dihard" and Ferguson has been classified as "the man of bull dog tenacity who never quits."

The contest now is between Mrs. Ferguson and Orville Bullington, the latter being the republican candidate for governor, who is waging a thorough campaign over the state. Mr. Bullington will carry the largest vote of any republican candidate for governor in the history of the state, in our opinion, but Mrs. Ferguson will be the next governor.

Besides the candidates for governor and other state offices to be filled, there are 9 amendments to the state constitution to be voted upon in the general election in November.

The national campaign is waging warm, the state campaign will be an extra hot one and in all probability, the largest vote will be cast in the general election in November that has ever been recorded in the state. Regardless of who wins, the writer will have as good governor as anyone in Texas, and here's hoping matters will not get any worse.

## Black Walnuts Do Well Here

G. F. Barlett presented the editor with a sample of black walnuts this week, from a tree in his yard less than ten years old. The nuts are very typical of the Missouri black walnuts, and according to Mr. Barlett, the tree has been in bearing for two or three years, the crop this year amounting to about four tubs full.

The editor has been reading of the possibilities of black walnuts in this country for several years and many experiments have proven successful.

The nuts have a thick shell, but a very fine flavor and rich meat. Mr. Barlett thinks the black walnut would be a profitable tree on the uplands in this country, giving a fine shade in the summer and a profitable crop of nuts in the fall.

## Turkeys-Market Only the Good Ones

(By J. M. Binion)

Many farmers market their yearly flock of turkeys at docked price due to improper culling, feeding care and handling. Accepting a docked price for turkeys due to bruised carcasses, poor finish and other causes costs the turkey producer many hundreds of dollars each year.

A safe plan to follow in preparing turkeys for market and marketing them with a great deal more profit to the producer follows:

Pen all the birds and examine them for signs of diseases, worms, underweight, crooked breasts etc. If it is found that the birds are infested with worms, which are the indirect cause for most turkey ailments, give them a good worm medicine. You will find that worming is a good investment and will prevent lots of trouble about marketing time and will also cause the turkeys to be in better flesh when they are carried to market.

If they show signs of common diseases which usually creep into the flock and destroy many head before they can be marketed in the fall, the cheapest thing you can do is to vaccinate them. Prevention is much easier and cheaper than curing. It is possible to vaccinate a rather large flock for the price of one, two or three turkeys. A much more profitable procedure than losing twenty-five of thirty or even more by disease.

Cull the flock and save the strongest and best conditioned birds for the Thanksgiving market. The culls, by proper feed and care can be made into prime or choice fowls for the Christmas market. You will find that the feed cost for conditioning the Thanksgiving culls for the Christmas market will be made back many times over by the increased weight and market grade of the turkeys.

Remember when you start to catch the turkeys to bring them to market that a bruised turkey goes into a lower grade. When a turkey is hooked by a common leg hook it usually falls upon its breast and a bruise results. Bruises may be made on the turkey in many other ways, so be careful because this is a case when it pays in dollars and cents to be careful. Transport the turkeys to market in 22 inch coops.

As for the crooked breasts, group them together and sell them separately.

Every farmer has a different situation to deal with. Common sense must be annulled in each case but the same general principles are applicable in every case.

## Cotton Report Sends Prices Down Sharply

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP).—Good cotton weather in four states during September Saturday brought a Government estimate of an 11,425,000-bale crop, based on Oct. 1 reports. The cotton market reacted with a decline which brought prices down as low as 6 1-2c a pound.

This figure showed an increase of 115,000 bales, or 1 per cent above the Sept. 1 forecast, but still was 5,671,000 bales below the huge 1931 crop.

The crop reporting board said, in commenting on the report, that since Oct. 1 light frosts have occurred in parts of the cotton belt of which no account was taken in the estimate. It was added that except for the cap rock section of Northwest Texas and limited areas along the northern edge of the belt, frost at this date would not necessarily result in materially lower yields.

Released simultaneously, a Census Bureau report showed 4,835,465 running bales of cotton ginned from the 1932 crop prior to Oct. 1, compared with 5,409,657 for 1931 and 6,303,895 for 1930. This was favorable received as lower than expected and was credited with a partial recovery of prices in the day's late trading.

The condition of the crop on Oct. 1 was reported at 54.2 per cent of normal compared with 56.6 a month earlier and 69.3 on Oct. 1 of last year. The ten-year average from 1921 to 1930 was 52.8.

The department forecast an average yield as of Oct. 1 of 149.3 pounds per acre, compared with 201.2 pounds in 1931 and a ten-year average yield of 151.4.

The greater part of the increase during September was in Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Oklahoma, where the first three weeks of September were reported favorable for the maturing crop. These increases were partly offset by slight declines in Texas and Tennessee.

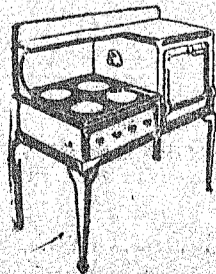
