BILL SIMMONS WINS HIS BET COLEMAN Tex., Sept. 6.-A Saturday crowd in this city witnessed the payment of an election bet in which four prominent Coleman citizens played important roles and during which Ma Ferguson received a demonstration.

Early in the run-off campaign Bill Simmons, Coleman laundry man, bet former Mayor E. P. Scarborough that Mrs. Ferguson would carry the state against Ross Sterling in the Governor's race. Both men were supporters of Sterling. If Mrs. Ferguson won Scarborough was to push Simmons in a wheelbarrow from the court house to the Coleman Hotel and back and if Sterling won Simmons was to be at the steering end of the vehicle.

The men took the count of the Texas Election Bureau, as final and the show took place Saturday at 2:30 p.m.

Scarborough was furnished anvas gauntlets by R. P. Haun. 119th district court reporter, and the wheelbarrow was greased and placed at the starting place by T. J. Allen, local insurance man. On each side of the wheelbarrow was a placard containing the word "Ma" in box car letters.


