We admit there has been a distribution of money thru the RFC to the cities, towns and communities to be spent for improvement purposes among the unemployed, but a check up on the business reveals that less than one per cent of the money appropriated for relief work has been used to relieve the really distressed, while ninty-nine per cent of the money appropriated is being used to help those big financial industries and corporations that are respossible for the existing crisis throughout the country.


