Governor Ross S. Sterling held the east Texas oil field under control tonight with troops, de lying a federal court injunction restraining State officials from interferding with operation of certain wells.

He declared the principle of 'State's rights is involved and the federal court should not be permitted to throttle the will of the people. This is the State's affair and federal courts should let the State take care of it." "Judicial Matter"

Hospital And Staff **Ranks With Schools** And Churches In Service Rendered To Community

The College of Surgeons at New York, announce its approval of a number of hospitals in West Texas, recently, according to a communication to The News from Dr. H. Martin, head of the college, including the Sealy Hospital here.

Announcement of this approval should serve to remind us that an institution of this rating isone of our greatest assets. The fact is that every approved hospital pays actual dividends to its community. Let us stop to estimate them for a moment.

It is a recognized fact that since hospital standardization was put into effect in 1918 with the first annual survey of such institutions by the American College of Surgeons, the average death rate in approved hospitals has dropped more than 50 per cent and mortalaties from surgical operations are only about one fourth what they were at that time. The average time that patients must stay in hospitals has also been reduced by half, where 15 years ago a patient being treated for appendici-tis had to spend 25 to 30 days He married Myrtle Sparks in thousands of lives saved, that 1906, who survives him. Pimiento Potatoes.

In deep fat fry two cupfuls of potato cubes; drain and oprinkle with salt. In two tablespoonfuls of butter, brown to a light color one slice of onion; remove onion and add two canned nimientos, cut in small pleces, and stir until well blended; add potato cubes and mix thoroughly. Serve sprinkled with finechopped parsley.

Chicken and Pimiento Sandwich. Drain one pimiento and put through a food chopper with one cupful chicken, one small pickle and two hard-boiled eggs. Molsten with the oil from the pimientos, then add three tablespoonfuls vinegar and one tablespoonful worcestershire sauce. Mix and spread on thinly sliced buttered bread.

Cheese and Pimiento Sandwich. Cream butter, add an equal amount of grated cheese and chopped pimiento; Season with salt and cayenne. Spread on slices of thibly cut white bread. (WNU Service.)
