DISARMAMENT EXPERT EX— POSES "561,000,000" BIG NAVY

How a \$12,000,000 to \$18,000,000 reduction in naval appropriations has been sold to the American public as a \$61,000,000 "slash" See him about your eyes, head- is one of the high lights and mysteries of the controversy between the President and the Navy Department over the application of the former's economy policy. The so-called \$61,000,000 cut has precipitated the protests, apparently, of all the "big-navy" people in the United States. It would surprize many of them to know that this \$61,000,000 myth is the Navy Department's own creation.

The current year's appropriations for the Navy Department fixed by congress last March are \$360,000,000. The estmate presented by Secretary Adams to the President | on October 19 for next year's appropriations amounted to \$342,000,000. This is, ac ut of only \$18,000,000 and not \$61,000,000. Where then does the \$61,000,000 come in?

The facts are thees. Early in the summer the President sent instructions to all the department heads calling for reductions in the 1933 estimates—that is, for the year beginning July 1 1932, and ending June 30, 1933, for which appropriations have to be made at the coming congressional session—under the current year's appropriations. The War Department accepted the instructions, submitted an Heatesr, Lined and unlined-estimate which was apparently the Budget Bureau over these estimates for several weeks preparatory to putting them in their final form. The Navy Department however, ignoring the instructions for economy, submitted a budget to the President of \$401,000,000 an increase of 41,000,000 oevr the current ap-Santa Anna News and Abilene propriations. This was on September 29th. According to the press, President Hoover sent back the estimate with the statement that it was unsatisfacory and ordered it cut to \$340,000,000, a reduction of 20,000,000 from the current 'year's figure. This is the origin of the \$61,000,000. It is not an actual cut. It represents only the difference between the increase that the Navy Department asked for and the cut which it was obliged to take. In fact, eenv this difference no long er stands at the figure 61,000,000, for the new estimate submitted to the President by Secretary Adams, according to press dispatches, was \$2,000,000 above the

> Yet the figure of \$61,000,000 still figures in the headlines of the daily press. It is true that in some cases, when one examines the text, one finds that the \$61,000,000 is correctly reported as being a reduction from the naval estimates. On the other hand, not all the reporting is so scrupulously accurate. After all the discussion over the incident, lasting nearly a month the New York HERALD TRIB-UNE of October 28 on its front pags printed a dispatch from its Washington Bureau definitely saying that the President demands "a. \$61,000,000 reduction in naval activities." Piling up inaccuracies, the dispatch continues with the following sentence: "Coming on top of a \$30,-000,000 reduction last year, fulfillment of the President's program would mean that naval p-propriations had been cut \$90,000,000 in two years." This is very far from the truth. The record shows that there was no \$30,000,000 cut last year, but merely a request for one on the part of the President.

The appropriations for the fiscal year of 1931 were somewhat over \$380,000,000. The difference petween the present estimate of \$342,000,000 and last year's appropriation is therefore \$38,000,-000 instead of \$90,000,000 for the past two years.

In the interest of the strictest accuracy, however, one must quote the figures given by the ARMY AND NAVY JOURNAL of October 24. The budget estimate it must be remembered, are considered confidential until reported to Congress at the beginning of the session. We cannot youch therefore, for the following figures, but since the ARMY AND NAVY JOURNAL apparently has some access to the Navy Department not granted to the pres in general, it is able to publish in detail the specific items in the budget estimate. The JOUR-NAL states that the new estimate sent to the Bureau of the Budget by Secretary Adams calls for a reduction of only \$51,357,900 over the original estimates submitted lest month. The first estimates, he JOURNAL says, totaled \$399,-139,836, and the total of the new budget drawn up by the Navy is

All other details were left to the Navy Department which was to determine for itself where cuts could be made to the best advantage This is another point that has been misunderstood. These were the Navy Department's own proposals. One can only interpret these proposels in the light of one of the Navy Day speeches made by a naval officer in Washington, who, quoting John Paul Jones declared: "We have not yet begun to fight."

In other words, the Navy Department has evidently determined that whatever happens to the other departments of the Government, is own funds shall not be reduced. 
