Rain Accompanied By Wind Storm

Some Property Damage Sustained; Good Crops Assured In County

A two inch rain fell in less than two hours, here, Tuesday night, breaking a short drouth and giving very substantial "drouth relief". Corn, cotton and grain crops not ready to harvest received enough moisture to make. The farmers of this section had caught up with their work and were waiting for a rain before anything further could be done. The rain that fell exceeded all expectations and was received with great thanksgiving.

The terrific windstorm which accompanied the rain did quite a bit of damage in town but did not hurt any of the crops.

The hospital was the chief victim of the wind, which must have been a small "twister" from the freak damage it did. All of the windows in the west wall of the hospital and the skylight in the operating room were blown in and the driving rain soon soaked the unprotected rooms.

A barn was completely wrecked on the John Richardson place the Leonard Jennings home, several windows and door glasses blown out at the Methodist church, Oscar Williamson's garage was torn to pieces and a scantling from it was driven into the Jesse Hunter rent house. The garage was lifted from over Earl Sparkman's car and set down several feet away leaving the car unscathed. Mr. and Mrs. Harve Melton were returning from Galveston where they had been to meet Mr. Melton's uncle, Mr. W. R. Harvey of London England who will visit in the Melton home during the summer months, when the wind lifted the car from the road and dropped it into a ditch, breaking a spring, and several glasses and blowing two casings, beside minor damages.

The sparrows were the only casualties in the territory we are glad to say. 152 little birds were gathered up from under one tree in the L. W. Hunter yard and a like number was found under the trees at the S. H. Phillips place. Numbers of trees were damaged, several signs blown down and a few small houses blown off the foundations. The Utilities Company is to be commended for the splendid effort made by its corps of workers, in keeping the lines repaired (several live wires were down) and the town supplied with electricity. The whole force was out in the worst of the storm. There was considerable excitement while the wind lasted but as there was no loss of life, Santa Anna can be grateful for the wonderful rain.

EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

Employment in Texas increased slightly during May, according to statistics compiled in the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. The number of employed workers increased 7 per cent during May as compared to April. The Bureau's figures, tabulated in cooperation with the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics show...

The average weekly wage per worker amounted to \$25.79 compared to \$25.89 during April.

Employment at refining plants which increased slightly during April for the first time since June, 1930, declined 2 per cent during May, leaving the total number of workers on the payrolls in this industry 16 per cent fewer than during the corresponding month of last year, the Bureau's report showed. Confectioneries and women's clothing manufacturing plants were the only classification in which an increase over May, 1930, was recorded. Increases over the figures for April of this year were shown in the payrolls of auto and body works, bakeries, confectioneries, ice cream factories, ice factories, meat packing and slaughtering houses, men's clothing manufacturing plants, brick factories, railroad car shops, lumber mills, furniture manufacturing plants and cotton mills.

Johnson Big Springs, Ky. All of the above were present at the service except J. G. Stacy, who was unable to be present.

Mr. Stacy was born at Hallettsville, in Lavaca County, Texas on May 11th, 1863 and died at his home in Santa Anna, Texas, on June 3rd, 1931. When about twelve years of age he surrendered his heart and life to the service of his Lord and became a member of the Presbyterian church and during the 56 years remaining of his life he was always loyal and true to the church and esteemed it a great honor and privilege to be called a follower of the Christ, being ever ready and willing to serve his fellow-man in every way possible. His religion was absolutely real and had nothing of mystery or myth in it. Heaven to him was as real a place as his home here on earth and death to him had no fears whatsoever. The community has lost one of its truest and best citizens, a man who was honest, up-right, clean and moral, and whose friendship was as true as steel. He was always progressive and up until his health failed, he assumed leadership in the affairs of his community, always appearing on the moral and religious side of every question, and when in doubt about an act

being right, he left it undone. He believed it took faith, right living, right thinking and prayer to make us what the Master would have us be.

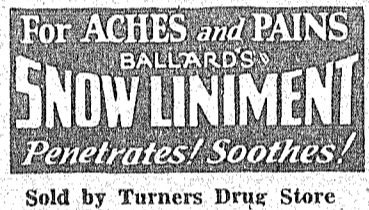
One of his favorite passages of scripture, and one he tried to practice, is summed up in the following words:

"Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Thy sight, O Lord my Rock and my Redeemer."

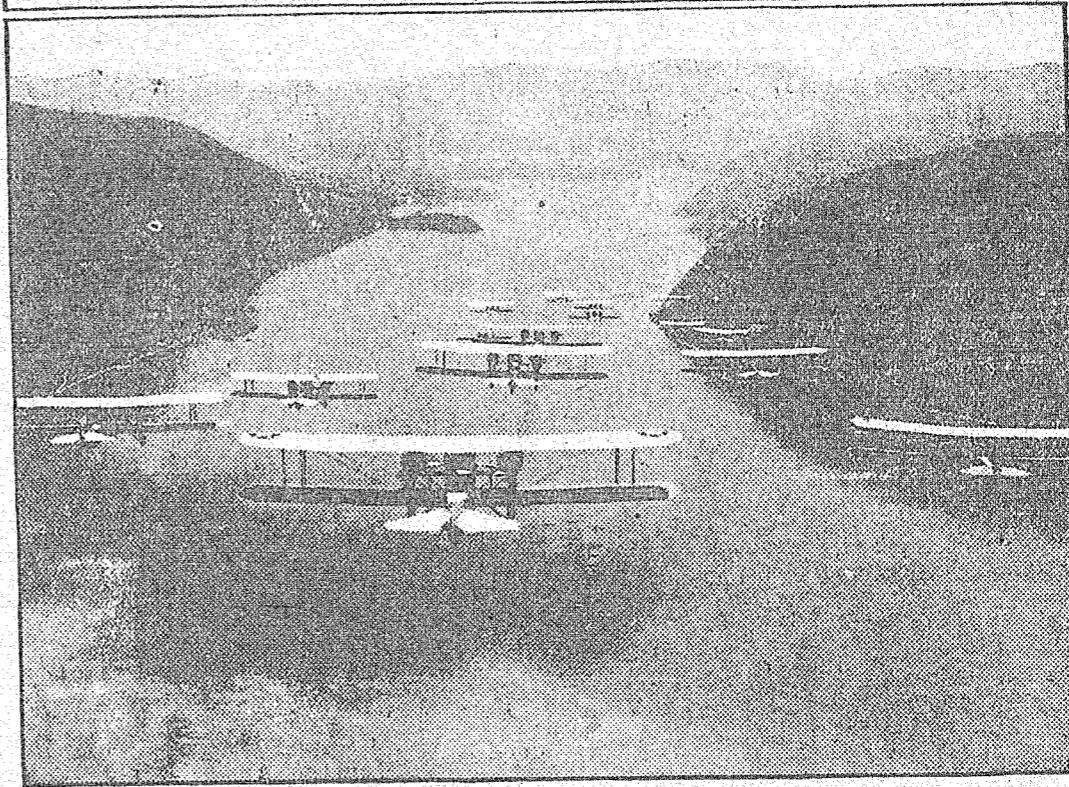
