Tax Advisory Committee — — Texas Press Association

Whereas, we recognize that the enormous increase in governmentla expenditures, State and local, has been brought about by new and varied services of government, we submit that it must be recognized at the outset in the consideration of Tax reform, that if we are to effect any considerable saving in public expenditures, we must be willing to give up some governmental services, and

Whereas, the people of Texas are confronted by the necessity of reducing the cost of government, State, County, Municipal and District, and of redistributing the cost more equitably, and

Whereas, the 43rd Legislature is under the necessity of making up for the deficiency in revenues which will result from the adoption of the Homestead exemption amendment.

Therefore Be it Resolved, That it is the sense of this committee that the economy to be effected by consolidation and reorganization alone will not serve the needs and that if the Taxpayers are to get the relief which they imperatively need it will be necessary to discontinue in whole or in part several governmental services which are now being rendered.

Resolved, second, that it is the sense of this committee that the system of common school and collegiate education should undergo a thorough overhauling to the end that without depriving the children of Texas of the education they are entitled to, the cost thereof shall be materially

Resolved, third, that it is the sense of this committee that the tax burden entailed by the courts should be reduced.

Resolved, fourth, it is recognized by the Committee that while there are large opportunities to effect economies in the State government, there are still larger opportunities that lie in the fields of county, municipal and district governments, and that therefore, it is the urgent recommentation of this committee that the 43rd Legislature provide a larger freedom from constitutional and statutory inhibitions to these several subdivisions of government to the end that they may reduce the cost thereof.

Resolved, fifth, that it is the sense of this committee that there should be no new tax levies made by the 43rd Louislature to make up existing deficies or to replace the revenue that will be lost because of the Homestead exemption amendments, but that this problem should be solve) mainly by the reduction in expenditures for the next becomium. which reduction in the estimation of this committee should not be less than five million dollars per annung provided, however, that in the event any new system of raising revenue is devised, or any new source of tax revenues is tapped, that such new system of raising revenue or such new source of tax revenues tapped shall not be in addition to but in lieu of existing systems of raising revenues or sources of tax revenues tapped.

Resolved, sixth, that this committee invites the cooperative of all organizations and individuals actively interested in the reduction of the cost of government and the formation of an equitable system of taxation.
