Heretofore, except for a few large candy fac-tories that have incldentally been shelling pecans, most of the Texas pecan crop has been shell-ed by a few concerns in Chicago and St. Louis. One of the largest of the Chicago concerns has incorporated a subsidiary company, known as the Texohola Pecan Shellers, Inc., of San Antonio, which will employ some 400 people. No doubt this will be followed by others, before many years Texas pecans will practically all be shelled in Texas and marketed from this state. 
