The Commission says that the results of the last examinations for the higher administrative posts under the Bureau of Prohibition, prepared agricultural and fivestock although not finally determined, indicate that a sufficient, number of eligibles may not be secured in a number of sections of the coun-

The entrance salaries are from \$4,400 to \$6,000 a year for admin istrators, from \$3,300 to \$4,800 a year for assistant administrators, nd from \$3,000 to \$4,600 a year for deputy administrators.

Applicants will not be required report at any place for a written examination but will be rated on their training, experience, and fitness. Experience in prohibition enforcement is not required; any experience which, in the judgmen of the Commission, qualifies the applicant for the duties of the position is acceptable. The experience requirements of the original evaminations have been material ly changed for these new examina

Personal investigations of appliants, which may include oral in terviews, form a part of the exminations. Fingerprints will nade to check the securacy of the applicant's statements as to arrest ictment, or conviction for crime misdeameanor.

Full information may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or the local board of civil service examiners at the post of fice in any city in Texas. Formal applications must reach the Com-mission at Washington by January
