He engaged in the cattle business and for a number or years was widely known through out the country, especially among cattle men. He was associated with time of his death. number of other cattlemen who, n later years became prominent West Texas affairs. these men were L. L. Shield, Will lewett, W. F. Guthrie, Judge J.

O. Woodward who is at present Judge of the 35th Judical District of Texas, Henry Vollintine and J L. Vaughn. Hundreds of buffale roamed the range just a little west of this section at the time Mr. Baxter came here and early in the winter of 1877-1878, he and some others killed buffalo in the San Angelo country and supplied their families with meat for the winter and spring. W. R. Baxter was a poince school teacher of Coleman county

for many years and was deputy tax assessor for a number of years later moving to Concho county where he engaged in the cattle and sheep business. He is now living in San Saba county near the town of San Saba, and owns and oper ates a fine irrigated farm on San Saba river. Stafford Baxter is a prominent business man of Santa Anna, being a stock holder and manager of the Santa Anna Motor Company. W. E. Baxter owns and conducts a mercantile usiness and insurance Santa Anna and is serving his 3rd term as mayor of the city.

cooperative cotton association lo not receive as much for their cotton as farmers who sell indi-vidually. Of course, there are individual cases in which non-mem ers obtain more for their cotton than members of the association. On 33,000 bales of the 195,000 bales delivered to the association year the association paid less than Houston spot prices for the same grade of cotton; while on 160,000 bales the association members were paid more than the Houston spot price. Compared to street prices, from 20,000 to 25,000 bales of asthe interior street price, while 170. 000 to 175,000 bales brought more than the average interior stre price. In other words, the ratio is about 7 to 1 in favor of the as-sociation. 


