

# Of Dimes Drive **Starts August 16**

An emergency March of Dimes campaign will get underway over the nation on Monday, August 16 and continue through August 31. The immediate need for the National Foundation is \$20 mil-

The campaign in January of this year was the most successful in polio history, yet it fell far short of the tightly budgeted needs for 1954. The need for \$20 million now is to help continue the care for 67,000 patients stricken in earlier years and unknown numbers of victims of the current outbreaks. Simultaneously the cost of increasing the nation's supply of gamma globulin and financing the polio vaccine study must be met.

Reports from the National Foundation state they are now in a state of emergency because there are more polio patients getting aid now from the March of Dimes than ever before and new victims are being stricken daily. March of Dimes funds have been wiped out paying for patients, the vaccine trials and gamma globulin.

We do not plan to conduct a city wide campaign here, but anyone who failed to contribute in the first campaign, or ones who feel they would like to contribue more, are invited to do so.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpaying voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. 1954, at which election all hallots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to pass laws authorizing the creation of countywide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 190,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax;" and

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published at required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
