I. The Meaning of the Transfigura-tion (II Peter 1:16-18).

These verses are an inspired inter-

These verses are an inspired interpretation by one who was present and knew all that transpired. The lone of the disciples was crushed. When, Christ announced His death which was to take place on the cross, they were unable to see how dectory could issue from fleath. Jesus took with Him, Peter, James and John, and they went into the mountain by themselves Before going into the mountain He declared that there were some standing in His presence who would not taste of death till they had seen the kingdom of God come with power. taste of death till they make kingdom of God come will power.

Two men from the upper world were sent to converse with Jesus about His approaching death at Jerhsulem—the very thing about which the disciples refused to talk. Then, too, God's own voice was heard in words of approach of Christ's course, directing them to hear the Master.

11. Jesus Christ Glorified on the Mountain (v. 2.3).

He took the disciples "by them selves" and was "transfigured before them." This above that the purpose of the transfiguration terminated upon the disciples and not on Christ's rebuke of Peter for his unwillingness to hear concerning fills



ST. AUGUSTINE (By Mrs. S. L. Weaver)

When a person visits Florida if he fails to see the old historic town of of the trip.

St. Augustine is the oldest town in the United States and was founded by Menendez in 1565. As early as 1513 this location was visited by Ponce de Leon when he was searching for the fountain of youth, but Menenand had foresight enough to know that if Spain accomplished anything in the new world it would have to be complished by colonization, therefore he brought over 2000 colonists and settled at St. Augustine.

To protect the town from Indiar attacks and attacks of other foreign enemies it was enclosed with a ston wall. The gateway of this wall is still standing. The old stone house built of coquina shell rock, built in the sixteenth century by Don Toledo for his Indian bride is still standing and

is used for a curio shop and museum. Here we saw a great deal of antique funiture, hand carved and very ornate and massive in structure. There was also a very fine collection of old china and numerous other antiques On the walls are some old and valu able paintings as well as some old deeds and other papers of value. the yard is the old well which is now called the wishing well which still has water in it. The old slave market still stands where the slaves were placed on the block and sold to the highest bidder. Not far away is an old Spanish cemetery where repose the dust of some of the Spanish nobility. So old are some of the tomb

stones that you can not read the in-scriptions on them. Time and weather have so effaced them. The streets in the old part of town are so narrow that automobiles can not drive down them. Everywhere are giant water oak trees wreathed in festoons of long moss, which add much to the beauty of the scene.

Among the places we visited were the old Cathedral and the underground spring which tradition claims was the fountain from which Ponce de Leon

a watch tower where the inhabitants of the fort could look out on the sea and spy any vessels which came into port. It was always heavily manned with cannon and the great doors made from heavy slabs of wood looked to

In 1763 Spain ceded Florida Great Britian and the fort was under English control until 1783 when England ceded Florida back to Spain. In 1925 the United States purchased Florida and the old Fort's name was changed to Marion in honor of Francis Marion of Revolutionary. It was in this Fort that Osceola the famous Indian Chief was kept a prisoner. Our guide pointed out to us the room in which he and another chief whose name I do not remember were kept There were horizontal iron bars over the windows and the proud chiefs had cut niches in the stone walls in order that they might climb up and look out on the land surrounding the fort. Finally they longed so for freedom that they decided to starve themselves until they would be small enough to crawl through the bars Osceola's companion managed to get through and make his escape, but Osceola failed and died a month later of

The most gruesome thing I saw in the most gruesome thing I saw in the fort was the old Spanish death cell. This had been closed up and was not discovered until some twenty years ago. It is a low arched room and has no ventillation. You have to crawl on your knees to get into it. Inside it is dark as pitch, and when discovered it contained human bones. As I looked around I thought at once As I looked around I thought at once of "Poo's Pit and Pendulum." It was in this chamber that the Spanish placed their prisoners and let them die by suffocation. 

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
