## Slayers Of Harry Grady Must Serve Sentence Imposed

It will be remembered that Harry Grady, who was reared near Santa Anna, and well known to a number of Brownwood people, and whose parents and other relatives live in and near Brownwood was murdered in a farm house a few miles from the town, of Crowell in Foard county, on November 21, 1925. The perpetrators of the deed were threeachelor brothers, Jesse, Hugh and Owen Davis. Owen Davis, the youngest of the three, was tried for the crime at the February term of court 1926, in the District Court of Foard county and sentenced to serve twenty years in the penitentiary. Soon thereafter Jesse and Hugh Davis, were, upon change of venue, tried for the crime in the District Court of Wilbarger county and sentenced to serve thirty and forty five years, respectively, in the penitentiary.

The public will be interested in knowing that all of the said sentences have recently been affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin.

The three Davis brothers were prosecuted by Judge T. C. Wilkinson Sr., of Brownwood.—Brownwood News.

## NEFF NAMED TO U. S. RAIL LABOR BOARD

Washington, Feb. 7.—Pat M. Neff, former governor of Texas, was nominated to be a member of the United States railroad labor board of mediation, succeeding Carl Williams, resigned.

Williams has served only a few months on the board. His resignation was said to have been caused by his desire to relinquish the duties on account of his health.

Neff served two terms as governor of Texas, from 1921 to 1925.

## \$1,500,000 Bonds in Archer County

Wichita Falls, Texas, Feb. 6.—By a vote of more than five to one, Archer County Saturday voted \$1,500,000 bonds for permanent highway improvements, according to word received here. It was a contest by Archer County taxpayers of a previous bond issue which later became known as the famous Archer County case, wherein the United States Supreme Court held the old Texas road bond election laws illegal.

One of the principal units of highway to be constructed under the newly adopted bond program will be completion on a concrete highway from the Wichita County line thru Archer City to Olney, linking up with the Wichita Falls highway.

Approximately 120 miles of new road work in Archer County is provided for under the bond issue.

## FRY FIELD LEASE BOUGHT FOR TWO MILLION DOLLARS

### Biggest Price Ever Paid For Similar Block

San Angelo, Texas, Feb. 7.—West Texas, long mocked and scorned by oil operators, yielded another oil fortune today when George A. Henshaw, Jr., young San Angelo independent oil operator, sold to the Texas Company, a measly little 320 acres lease on the Brown-Coleman county line for a minimum price of \$2,000,000 cash. This is said to be the largest price ever paid for so small a block of acreage in West Texas. The land is the south one-half of the George Stubblefield survey No. 622, just a half mile across the Coleman county line in Brown county and midway between Brownwood and Coleman.

### 6,000 Barrels Daily

Henshaw has fourteen producing wells on the lease and two others drilled down to the sand. The daily production is between 6,000 and 7,000 barrels a day and the oil is bringing \$2.30 a barrel at the lease. Gas is also plentiful and more than \$10,000 has been received for this product since the first well was drilled in on October 10, 1926. The lease has produced over \$200,000 worth of oil since October.

The price is based on the production of the lease with \$2,000,000 as the base. Guagers of the Texas Co., who have been at the wells for the last few days will continue there for another week, testing the production. The average production will determine in the final analysis the price. At the Henshaw offices here it is said that the production will put the price over \$2,000,000.

Hats off to George Young, plucky 17-year-old Canadian youth who won the Wm. Wrigley swimming derby and \$25,000, to help, as he expressed it, his widowed mother! The lad negotiated the swift and cold ocean channel of 23 miles between Santa Catalina island and the mainland at San Pedro, California, against some hundred entrants. This is probably the world's greatest athletic feat of endurance; at least it is one of the most remarkable. Now what will George do with his money? If he keeps his head or has it kept for him, he will make more money. It is almost a tragedy for one to fall into sudden riches unless the recipient is able to "stand the strain." But this boy is a hero to lovers of sport. His feat did not produce any necessities of life, nor did his accomplishment add anything to the national wealth, it is none the less praiseworthy. But we wouldn't advise him nor anybody else to try it again. The people of the United States showed their broad spirit when the boy completed his swim over all others who had dropped out. Sympathies of the spectators, radio listeners and newspaper readers were with him. **Sunday School Lesson**

**Lesson for February 13**

**MAKING OUR HOMES CHRISTIAN**

LESSON TEXT—Eph. 5:22-6:4.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Let us love one another for love is of God.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—The Child at Home.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—Obedience at Home.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Unselfishness in the Home.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—How to Make Our Homes Christian.

I. The Importance of the Home. The oldest and most important institution in the world is the family. It is the foundation stone upon which all other institutions are built. In the measure that the home is kept pure and strong will the church, society and the nation be pure and strong.

II. The Makers of the Home. The foundation upon which the home is built is marriage, and the makers of the home are the man and the woman united in holy wedlock.

**III. The Obligations of the Members of the Home.**

1. The husband (Eph. 5:25-32).

(1) The husband is to love his wife (v. 25). Observe—  
a. The measure of this love is the love of Christ for His church. Christ loved the church so that He gave Himself for it. His was a self-emptying love. The obligation enjoined then on the husband is to manifest that self-emptying love toward his wife.  
b. The purpose of this love (v. 28, 29). The purpose of the husband's self-emptying love is the perfection of his wife's character.  
c. The ground of this love (v. 28-30).

After all, the ground of the husband's love for his wife is his own self. He that loveth his wife loveth himself.

(2) The husband is to be joined unto his wife (v. 31).

When the time comes for a man to establish a home, he leaves his father and mother and is joined to his wife. This results in the creation of the new unity of society.

2. The wife (Eph. 5:22-24).

She is to be subject to her own husband. This is not an arbitrary matter, but it is according to the divine arrangement. It is to be "as unto the Lord." It is important to inquire as to what kind of subjection is enjoined. In order to understand this, we must grasp the figure which the apostle introduces of Christ and the church. Christ's loving the church is without ulterior motive, as true love "seeketh not its own." Since Christ gave Himself for the church, He thus lifted the church into union with Himself and became to it Lord in the power of His love. The church responds to this love by lovingly recognizing the Lordship of Christ. Just as the church graciously comes under the guidance and direction of Jesus Christ does the wife respond to the love of her husband. Headship of the man is the divine order. Headship never suggests "boss-ship" nor "governorship. Observe with reference to this subjection—

(a) The motive (v. 22). "As unto the Lord."  
(b) The ground (v. 23). "The husband is the head of the wife."  
(c) The extent of (v. 24). "In everything."

3. The children (6:1-3). The divine purpose in the union of the male and the female in the bonds of holy wedlock is the propagation of the race. When God pronounced His benediction upon the first pair He said, "Be fruitful and multiply."

(1) Obedience to parents (v. 1). The ground of this obedience is the fact that the parents stand in the place of God to the child.

(2) Honor the parents (v. 2). Obedience to parents is limited to the period of immaturity. When the children take their place in the establishment of new units in society they are no longer under obligation to obey their parents. Two gracious promises are attached to this commandment, that it may be well with thee and that thou mayest live long on the earth.

4. The parents (v. 4). Doubtless the word "fathers" was intended to be inclusive of the "mothers."

(1) Provoke not your children to wrath. This doubtless means that in the exercise of parental authority there should be avoidance of irritation.

(2) To bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Nurture doubtless means to educate and admonition means discipline.

Stephenville, Texas, Feb. 7.—J. J. Moore, a sub-boss of the Humble Pipe Line Company, was ground to pieces late yesterday under the wheels of a Missouri, Kansas & Texas freight train.

Moore attempted to board the moving train as it passed the depot at Hico, and was thrown under the wheels. The tragedy was seen by a man standing on the platform and he vainly tried to stop the train. Telegrams were sent to Dublin and DeLeon, the conductor finally being reached at the latter place.

There the train crew found bits of Moore's body, clinging to the bloody wheels. The torso, from the breast up, with the left side of the head, was found at DeLeon, while 217 bits of flesh and bone were picked up between Hico and DeLeon.

Moore was a Nebraskan. A telegram received today from his sister, in Nebraska, stated that she is on her way to DeLeon to claim the body.

**BRIBE CHARGE AGAINST PAIR IS "JUSTIFIED"**

Expulsion Is Urged

Austin, Texas, Feb. 7.—Expulsion of Representatives F. A. Dale and H. H. Moore from the house of representatives was recommended in the report today of the house committee of nine investigating bribery charges against them.

The report said that the charges were found to be "justified" and recommended that the house should impose the "highest punishment" of which it is capable.

Adoption Is Final

Recommendations were so worded that if the house adopts the report, such adoption will constitute the grounds for expulsion.

Both Dale and Moore were charged in the report with "unbecoming" and "entirely unjustified" conduct with Willis Chamberlin, Houston optometrist, who told state-rangers, house officers and members that he gave Dale \$1,000 to get an unfavorable report on Moore's bill to tax stationary optometrists.

Both in Their Seats

Dale and Moore were in their seats when the report was read.

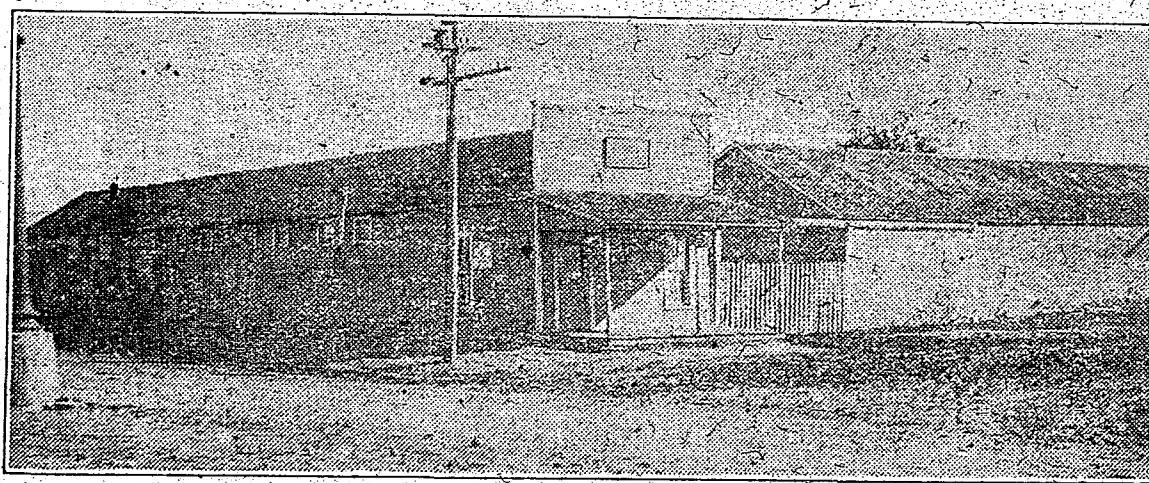

**WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS**

(By West Texas C. of C.)  
 Wichita Falls—Several hundred dollars in cash and scholarships of value will be awarded high school boys and girls of West Texas who are successful in presenting the merits of their home towns in the annual "Home Town Contest" sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in connection with their annual convention. Rules of the competition are the same as those of last year.

Stamford—Butter, poultry and eggs produced in the Lone Star State for years to come will be entirely consumed through Texas demands and other outlets with no danger of over-production according to authoritative word sent in to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce from the Fort Worth Stockyards Company.

Mercedes—A divina drink, heralded as both a health promoter and beautifier, made from ripe grapes and sun-sweetened grapefruits of the Valley, is receiving widespread recognition as a most acceptable beverage. The drink is called grapefruitade and is already being adopted in San Antonio and Houston. Fruit growers of Mercedes and surrounding sections are supplying numerous demands for shipments of crates of grapefruit to points over the state for making of the new drink and for regular purposes.

Amherst—Appointment of Judge John H. Wood of Amherst on the Executive Board of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been confirmed by President Arthur P. Dugan of the regional organization.

Vernon—A. M. Bourland of this city is acting on the state committee which is investigating possibilities of Rural Electrification in Texas. He was appointed to this service by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Childress—The Gate City Creamery located in Childress is preparing to install a modern chick feeding plant. Chickens are to be fed, fattened, frozen and dressed and shipped for eastern markets at the plant.

Stamford—The January issue of "West Texas Today" has been released. The number, originally intended as a special El Paso Edition, featured service activities of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in saving South Plains shippers a quarter of a million dollars annually, in watching West Texas interest at Austin during the session of the state legislature, and in stamping out hog cholera in afflicted areas.

Odessa—Modern and sanitary equipment is being installed in the Stewart and Bergstresser dairy recently opened here. The dairy supplies the town's needs as well as serving customers in Crane, the new oil town of the section.

Turkey—A modern bakery and ice plant have been secured for Turkey.

Wheeler—A complete modern privately owned tourist camp to be operated in connection with the Lee Gunter Hotel is to be erected here. Tourists' cottages will be equipped with electric lights, gas and water and all modern conveniences.

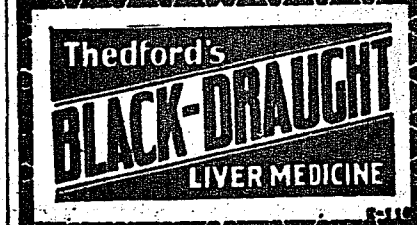

**WOMEN IN OFFICE**

Women have not fared so well in politics since they were granted suffrage. Instead of going forward, they have suffered some reverses, according to a survey conducted by the National League of Women Voters.

These statistics show that while in 1925 and 1926 approximately 130 women were elected to the legislatures of the several states, only 122 were so honored in the last election, in which they competed for seats in this year's legislatures.

This represents a decrease of eight, and it would be interesting to know just why this occurred. Any amount of speculation on the subject would not settle it. Whether the results represent a trend against women holding office, whether local influences were responsible for the setback, or whether districts were made over so that women candidates were gerrymandered out, is all a matter of speculation.

The administrations of two women governors, which have attracted the attention of the nation, ended rather disastrously, for them at least. The woman governor of Wyoming was defeated for re-election and the woman governor of Texas refused so much enmity that her chances for re-election were entirely eliminated.

The figures regarding the trend of the movement to put women in office are a bit disconcerting. Woman suffrage was supposed to be a forward movement. Whether it has had a cleansing effect on politics is a moot question. At least, women have not yet had opportunity enough to prove what they can do as office holders. But they can vote, and they should, to set a good example for the men folks who have been taking this responsibility altogether too lightly in recent years.

**DON'T GET DISCOURAGED**

When you feel discouraged and the outlook is dark, look about you and you will have no difficulty in finding someone whose plight is much worse than yours. One's situation in life, short of death, can never be so bad but that it may be worse.

There's the case of Mrs. Marie Dillard of Tacoma, Wash., three times a Gold Star mother, whose body might be lying in an obscure grave in Potter's field, but for the fact that by chance her past was discovered by the American Legion post of Tacoma.

Three sons of Mrs. Dillard died as world war officers. The first, Capt. Joe Dillard, joined the French Foreign Legion in 1914 and was killed. The other two, Hugh and John, went overseas as captains in the American air forces, were wounded and died after their return home.

With her sons gone and her once comfortable fortune lost, Mrs. Dillard went to work in a cannery near Tacoma. The work was too severe and she became a county charge. Before her death at the county hospital she destroyed all papers giving a clue to her former life. A close friend to whom she had confided her troubles informed the Legion.

**Property Rights and Wrongs**

Under international law or not, withstanding it, a foreign power may pass any sort of prosperity law to exclude alien ownership or concession. But reason steps in and says such law can not be made retroactive or unduly severe to the deprivation of acquired rights. Mexico points to the Oriental-exclusion land law passed by California as one measure of justification for her oil and land laws which she seeks to enforce against American property rights. But there is no parallel between the two cases, because California did not confiscate the acquired property of the Japanese and other Orientals, but merely provided against future ownership. Acquired property was permitted to be sold in the open market; whereas the Mexican government proposes to fix its own values and then compel American interests to sell at the appraised price.

**Utilizing Left-Overs**

Place any amount of left over grated or crushed Hawaiian pineapple in a small dish and keep it in the ice box to use as a piquant touch to deserts of salads to be made the following day. For filling the center of apples to be baked after the core has been removed, nothing is more delicious than pineapple.

**EASY TO FORGET**

The red tongues of flame sweep over a town and destroy a good section of territory. Thousands and thousands of dollars are swept away and the people rave and storm over the lack of adequate protection from loss by fire. The tumult of indignation is at fever heat for a few days, and then begins to subside. Time only is needed to send it, too, into the realm of forgetfulness; until the next fire comes along and creates even greater devastation and death. It is easy to forget.

Some one arises in a public meeting and proposes a practical scheme for development of the commercial interests of the community. He is sincere and eager to do something for the benefit of his home town. He believes in progressiveness. His scheme looks good and sounds better to other business men and citizens and everybody begins to talk in its favor. The editor backs it up in his columns and for a few weeks it is the general topic of conversation. No forgetful leader seems to be at hand, and the rest of us are too engrossed in our private affairs to assume the duties and responsibilities of leadership. Time does the rest and a practical forward movement is bogged in the mire of forgetfulness.

We might go on for hours, citing similar instances, for they are legion in number and local in application. But what's the use? You, too, would read and ponder and exclaim today—and forget tomorrow. It is our way. Americans are a great people and they perform prodigies in the commercial, inventive and intellectual world. No obstacle is too great for them to surmount, if time will only permit them to forget to forget. But time is inexorable in its flight, and forgetfulness follows in the wake of American time.

**NO DIVIDING LINE**

The U. S. Supreme Court has decided that a Senate committee may subpoena and compel the attendance of private citizens at investigations when the testimony is sought for legislative purposes. But the court apparently did not undertake to determine where the line can be drawn, or who is to decide whether an investigation is for legislative purposes. The decision draws a close line between the legislative and judicial branches of government under the Constitution.

**The Vanishing Buggy**

The national output of buggies has decreased nearly two thirds in two years, and Dobbins companion is on the last lap toward the museum. Horse drawn vehicles are listed by the federal census for 1925 as worth an insignificant million and a quarter with even the Plebian wheelbarrow holding a higher place in economic value. Three years ago more than 500 concerns were engaged in the manufacture of buggies and carriages but the past year saw the number dwindle to a bare two hundred.

Time was when the buggy had a place in the scheme of things romantic, but that was before the automo-

bile, usurped the place of supremacy. There was a day when "thanks for the buggy ride" had a literal meaning.—SWIPED.

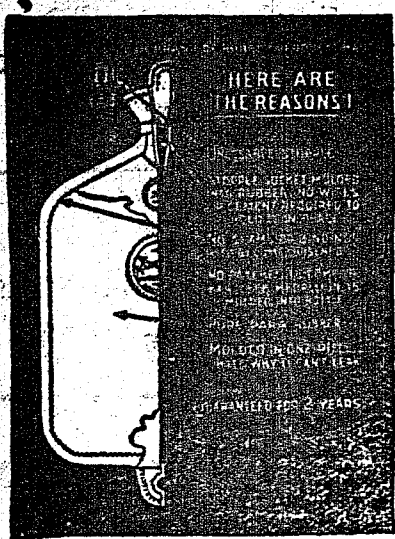

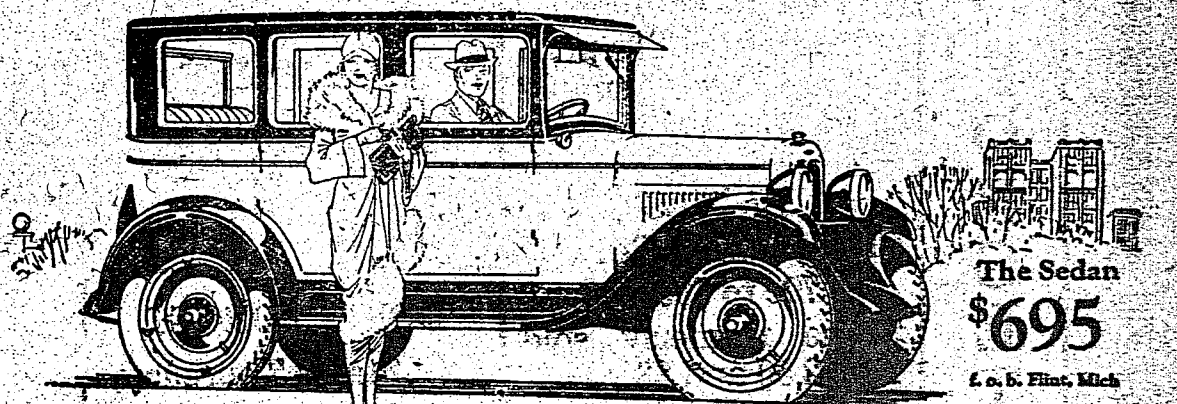

Colleges which used to have to drum up patronage became so overcrowded that now the boy has a hard time getting into the place he wants to go.

But high wages and the buying public would not alone have brought about this gigantic distribution of products, this general sharing of luxuries, this passing about of the platter of wealth. It needed advertising to create the demand.

The old-fashioned merchant thought goods would sell themselves. The modern merchant would never have been half-way to the place where he is in the world's economy if he hadn't been smart enough to recognize the tremendous pulling power and the tremendous moving power of advertising.

It is not enough that goods be made. Goods must be wanted. And advertising relationship between prosperity for the greatest number and advertising is exact and it is very close.

We are only at the threshold of our understanding of the amazing results that advertising can yield in the way of good times and a contented people.

It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to get through life without paying either alimony or pin money.

It doesn't take any more time to amount to something in this world than it does to amount to nothing.

**EDITOR'S FUTILE WORK**

Like all good community boosters, Editor Shannon of the Commerce (Ga.) News tries to aid his home merchants by advocating a trade at home policy.

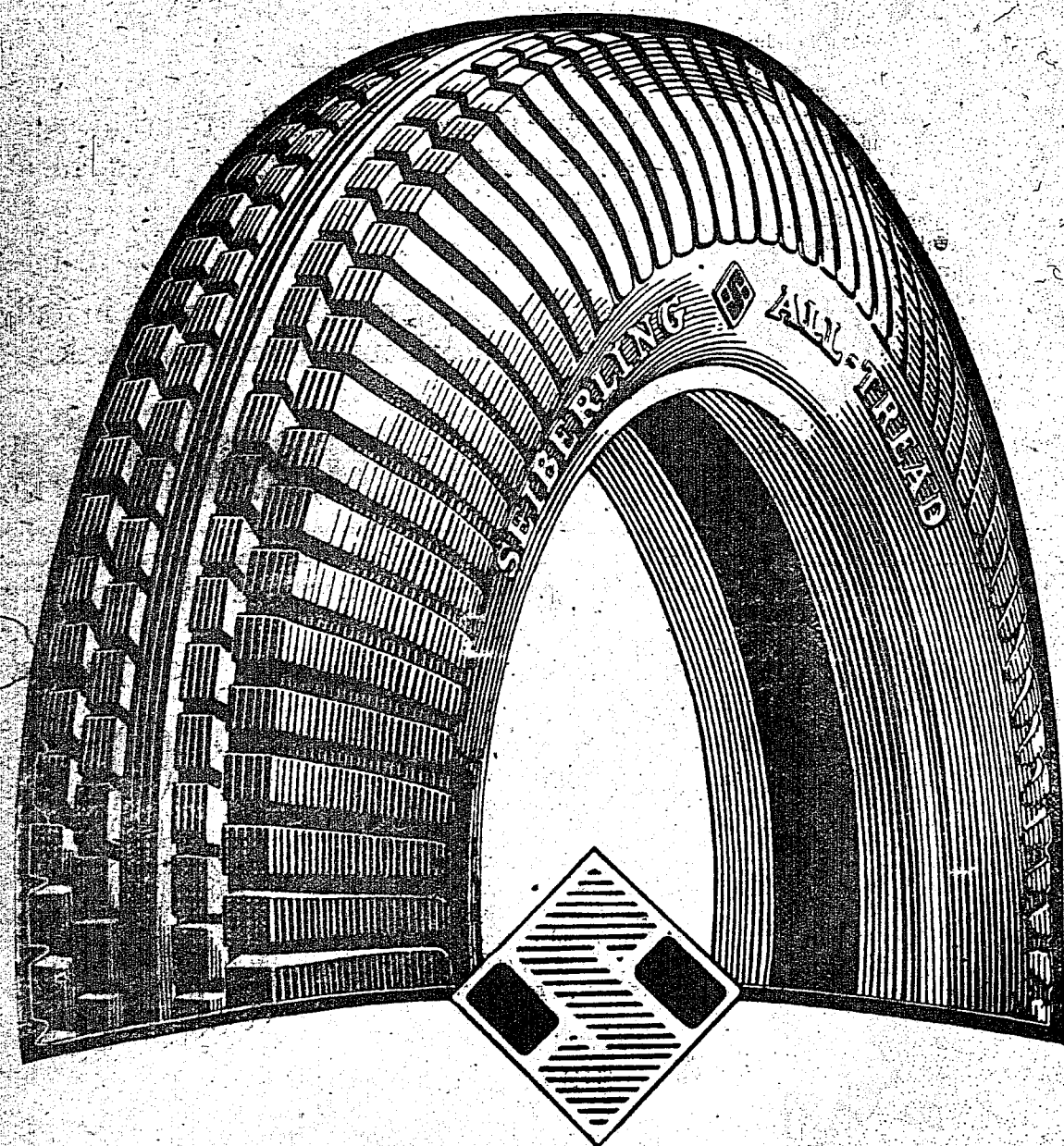

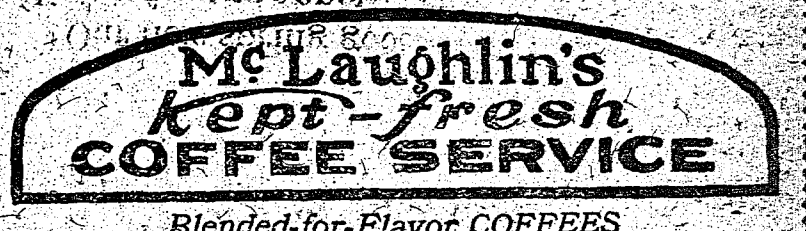
