## TEN BAYLOR ATHLETES KILLED IN CRASH SATURDAY

A tragedy of much regret occurred last Saturday morning at Round Rock, Texas, when the I. G. N. Sunshine Special crashed into the large passenger bus of the Baylor University, loaded with 22 passengers enroute to Austin to play a game of basketball with the Texas University team. The party was composed of the team, coach, and a few of the leading fans and athletes of the University. Ten of the young men were killed outright, and ten others wounded, some of them severely. The tragedy was evidently the result of careless driving.

## Dr. J. Frank Norris Acquitted on Murder Charge Tuesday

One of the most sensational trials in the history of Texas, came to a close Tuesday evening about 7 o'clock, when the jury in the Dr. J. Frank Norris case, on trial the past two weeks in the Criminal District Court in Austin, for the murder of D. E. Chipps, a lumber dealer in Fort Worth, rendered a verdict of not guilty.

Dr. Norris, pastor of the First Baptist church of Fort Worth, said to be the largest church in the world, shot and killed D. E. Chipps in his study at the church July 17, last year. His plea was self defense, or, to that effect. The strongest legal talent in the state was employed on both sides and the case was well fought out. The jury was out only a short time until it reported ready and pretty soon the minister was free to return to his large congregation.

## Eight Teams Entered In Basketball Tournament Here

With the entrance of the Coleman and Novice basketball teams during the past week the total number of teams entered in the basketball tournament to be held here Feb. 4 and 5 has been increased to eight teams.

This additional increase will make it necessary for the tournament to begin Friday afternoon, Feb. 4, at 2:30 o'clock. Two games will be played that afternoon, probably between Coleman and Santa Anna, and Burkett and Rockwood. The rest of the games will be played Saturday. The first game Saturday will be played at 9:30 o'clock in the morning.

It is hard to predict which team will come out of the tournament with the county championship as most of the teams in the county are just about on a par with each other.

Santa Anna has a fair squad, but has been hit pretty hard on account of several promising players failing to pass enough courses during the Fall term to be eligible to play. However, even with this misfortune the squad has several men who show promise of being stiff opponents to any who may oppose them.

A game has been scheduled with the Central rural school to be played here Friday afternoon. Also the Santa Anna squad will meet the Howard Payne scrubs next Monday and Tuesday night before the tournament, so with these preliminary games ahead of them the squad should be in pretty good shape for the tournament.

**Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson**

**Lesson for January 30**

**THE CHRISTIAN OVERCOMING TEMPTATION**

**LESSON TEXT—Luke 4:1-13; 1 Cor 10:12, 13.**

**GOLDEN TEXT—In that He Himself hath suffered being tempted, He is able to succor them that are tempted.**

**PRIMARY TOPIC—Obeying God Always.**

**JUNIOR TOPIC—How to Stand Against Temptation.**

**INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—How Christ Helps the Tempted.**

**YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—How to Overcome Temptation.**

Christ's temptation was Messianic. No one has ever been tempted just like He was—led into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit to be tempted of the devil (Matt. 4:1). While we are not tempted as He was, the devil uses the same methods on us. This temptation was not:

1. A preparation for His work, but rather His first conflict. In His baptism we have the symbolic act of the dedication of Himself to the work of redemption through the cross—the making full a righteousness.

2. It was not to see if Christ would stand fast, nor to see if He would fall under the most crucial test. He could not have failed.

3. It was to show Christ as an object upon which we may rest our faith with unshaken confidence. He came as the second man, the head of the new race. The temptation therefore was a demonstration of the inseparableness of the divine and human natures in the incarnation.

4. The Temptation of Christ (Luke 4:1-13).

1. The place (v. 1).  
The wilderness of Judea. The first man, Adam, was tempted in a garden with the most pleasant surroundings. The second man, Jesus Christ, was tempted in a barren wilderness surrounded by wild beasts (Mark 1:13).

2. The method (vv. 2-12).  
Christ as the world's Redeemer sustained a three-fold relationship—Son of Man, the Messiah and Son of God, therefore Satan made each one a ground of attack.

(1) As Son of Man (vv. 2-4).  
Satan made his first assault upon Him as a man by appealing to the instinct of hunger. Satan urged Him to use His divine power and convert a stone into bread. Hunger is natural and sinless. Real human life experiences hunger. The temptation was in satisfying a right hunger in a wrong way. To have yielded in this case though His hunger was desperate, would have been to renounce the human limitations which He had taken for our sins. In the incarnation He became identified with humanity, so He chose to abide in fellowship with man.

(2) As Messiah (vv. 5-8).  
Here the temptation was to grasp His rightful dominions by false means. The devil offered to surrender unto Him the world if He would adopt his methods—worship him. The force of this temptation was in the fact that the kingdoms of the world are Christ's by God's covenant with Him. God's method by which Jesus was to possess the world was the sacrificial death on the cross.

(3) As Son of God (vv. 9-12).  
Here Satan tries to induce Christ to presume upon God's care. He quotes a Messianic Psalm to induce Him to do so. To do the spectacular thing in order to get notice is to fall into Satan's temptation. 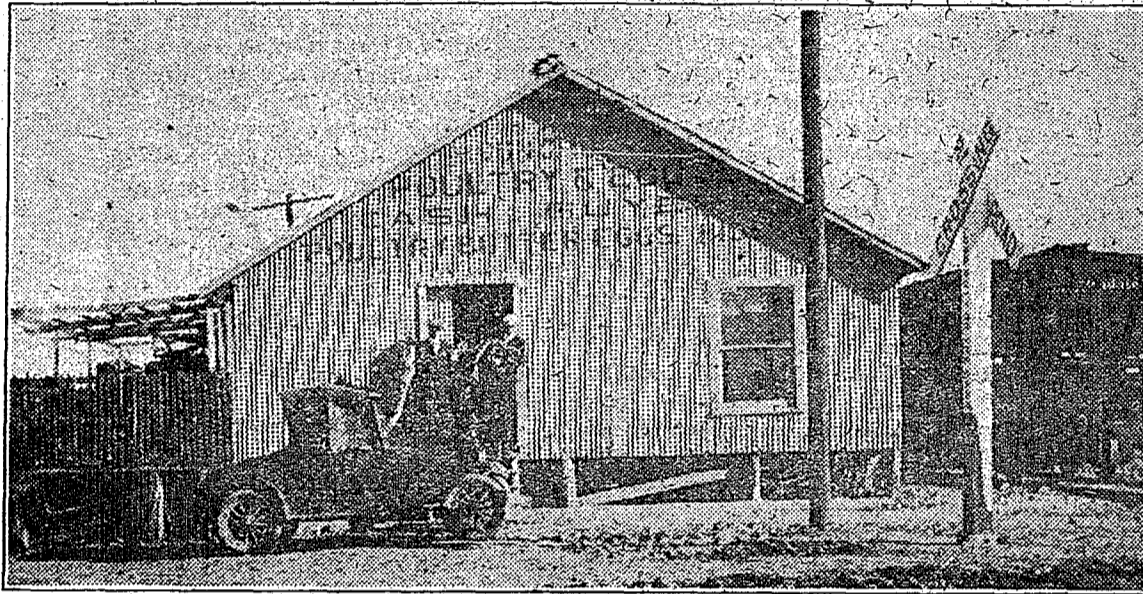

### Only Few More Days in Which to Get Tax Receipt for Voting

Only a few more days remain in which to get a poll tax receipt which will permit the holder to vote in any election in the County or in the city of Santa Anna this year. Time is up next Monday at midnight, and the tax collectors, both city and county, are not required by law to keep their offices open until midnight. It is merely a matter with them if they desire to keep the offices open. Next Tuesday is February 1. People can pay poll tax on that date and on other dates but they can't vote. In order to vote they must pay poll tax in this month. It is necessary to have a poll tax receipt for various reasons. In the first place it is a badge of citizenship. In the second place it is a sign that the man who has the receipt, or the woman who has the receipt, takes enough interest in governmental affairs to get the receipt. Everybody entitled to hold a poll tax receipt should get one by all means.

### FIRE TO CONTROL 1927 INSECTS

(By R. K. Reppert, Entomologist, Extension Service A. and M. College)

At this time of the year the farmer has presented to him one of the best means of reducing insect pests for the coming season. Very few insects are active during the winter season, but have sought shelter from rain and cold in whatever coverings are available to them.

Ideal shelter thus provided them is found in the trash along well-drained fences and along ditch-banks. Brush land, or weed patches, that catch and hold mats of dead grass and fallen leaves, are sought out as winter quarters.

Fire applied to these waste places at this time kills insects in two ways: (1) many it kills outright; and (2) others that are not actually killed by the heat are forced into the open, where unable to seek new shelter on account of their sluggish condition, they quickly succumb to the cold and damp. Since the individual insects now lying dormant multiply their present numbers by hundreds as soon as the growing season opens, it will

readily be seen how important are control measures practiced at this season.

Examples of insects so controlled are the boll weevil, squash bugs, chinch bugs, tarnished plant bugs, various kinds of stink bugs, and many others. Many of these cannot be controlled by any other means, and so the method here advocated is doubly important.

Not many insect pests hibernate in the open field under conditions that make burning there of any great ef-

fectiveness, and since burning the crop residues removes organic material that is of great value to growing crops, it is not to be advised except in particular cases. A community campaign of burning trash in waste places, however, is urged as early as possible now, and should greatly reduce insect damage next season wherever practiced.

The trouble with the five-day week is that it allows one more day to lose sleep that has to be made up during working hours.

At a meeting of the American Chemical Society, recently held in Philadelphia, Dr. David Spence, an internationally known chemist, in a paper read before the rubber division of the society, stated as a result of his experiments that all obstacles had been overcome and that a new product of the guayule shrub had been developed which vulcanized readily, matching when vulcanized, the tensile, elongation, abrasion and other tests now demanded of the best grades of plantation rubber, and that

this new product would meet all the major requirements of manufacture of tires, and especially tire treads.

The plant grows wild over a considerable portion of Southwest Texas, especially in the region contiguous to Marathon.

At Marathon, in Brewster county, Texas, is a guayule rubber factory that has been in operation for several years.

The fact that California has succeeded in taming the guayule and cultivating it like an ordinary crop is of special interest to Texans, because it opens up the possibility of a new industry for the western part of our

Laws are made for the protection of the people who live under them. This is something for legislators to remember at this season when state legislatures and congress are in session and the number of laws will be increased by several thousand.

If a law is a good one, it should be enforced. If it is not a good law it should be repealed and not be permitted to remain on the statute books and serve as one of the causes that are tearing down the respect for law.

We have too many laws that are dead letters—laws that may have been useful at one time, but the need for them has ceased to exist. They give the fanatic a weapon to create disorder and ill feeling that might be avoided if they were erased from the statute books.

This condition is well known to the public, even the younger generation just reaching maturity. It is not calculated to increase respect for law. It is the breeder of evasion and contempt for all law.

We need fewer laws, and the laws we have should be enforced.

**WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS**  
(By West Texas C. of G.)

**Stamford**—Manager Homer D. Wade of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has gone to Austin to establish the legislative bureau of the regional organization there during the session of the Fortieth Legislature, and to watch legislation of general interest. Member towns of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce are free to call upon the bureau upon any matter which they consider of interest to West Texas.

**Spearmint**—Contract for 24,397 yards of pavement to be constructed on the principal streets of Spearmint has been signed by the city. The contract calls for a pavement construction of 2 1/2 inches of Vitri-fied Brick on a four inch concrete base. The price agreed upon is \$3.47 per yard, the deal representing an expenditure of approximately \$104,000.

**Clyde**—A five mile extension is to be made by the West Texas Utilities Company to serve a number of farm houses southwest of Clyde with electricity. Some 25 houses have agreed to wire for electric lights.

**Jacksboro**—The home beef canning movement inaugurated by the County Home Demonstration Agent is showing increased interest on the part of farmers in Jack county communities. The Shannon community came out 25 strong with halves to beaves for a canning program. A number of rural citizens, in addition to those already served are planning to can beaves.

**Fredericksburg**—Construction work on "The Nimitz" Fredericksburg's new \$125,000 hotel is well underway. The structure is to have 50 guest rooms, a 100 capacity dining room, a ball room that can be converted into a 350 capacity banquet hall, several sample rooms, and free garages for guests. All modern conveniences and equipment will be included in the building.

**San Saba**—A. W. Woodruff, pecan expert, and E. E. Risien & Son, nurserymen, of this place have contributed six fine pecan trees to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for planting in front of the new headquarters building. The trees, scientifically grown by Risien, the world's only pecan breeder, are the "highest of highbrow" pecans, according to Woodruff. They will be set in front of the regional chamber's new building with fitting ceremony at an early date.

**Sinton**—Representatives from more than twenty-five Texas towns are expected to attend the first West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention of 1927 to be held here January 25. Delegates will be members from

the Midland, Colorado, Snyder, and Post. B. Reagan of Big Spring will be master of ceremonies. A number of prominent speakers have been secured for the convention, with the general trend of the program along agricultural lines.

**Wichita Falls**—W. B. Hamilton, well known oil man and city builder of Wichita Falls, has been appointed general chairman for the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held here May 18 and 17. Hubert Harrison, secretary of the Wichita Chamber, is now en route for New York and Washington to do work in the interest of the convention. He will try to interest the National Geographic Magazine to devote an issue to the convention, and will undertake to secure a staff representative of the National Geographic Society to attend the big pageant, "The Congress of Nations."

**Levelland**—Contract has been entered with the Texas Utilities Company for maintenance of fourteen street lights for the business section of the town. The lights are to be of 100 candle power and of the pole and bracket type.

**Paint Rock**—Possibilities of Paint Rock as a summer and health resort are to be exploited if movement on part of leading citizens goes through. The town believes its location near the banks of the silvery Concho make it an ideal spot for a summer playground where swimming, boating, fishing, and hunting can be had in abundance.

A city jail is also included in the building, occupying part of the ground floor in the rear of the structure.

**Plainview**—Hale County has added 16 fine registered bulls to its bull circles. The animals were brought from Ohio by Paul Huegs county agricultural agent.
