Seven hundred Texas bankers representing the Seventh District of the **Fexas Bankers** Association, meeting in Fort Worth Monday, -were practically unanimous in the opinion that continued devotion to one crop—cot-ton—by Texas farmers will forestall

all efforts to place Texas agriculture all efforts to place Texas agriculture agriculture and the second believed an increase in the cotton acreage this year will result disastrously for Texas.

increase cotton acreage, there is actually every prospect that the acre. age will be increased. Clarence Ousley, director of the "safe farming" movement projected at a recent South wide meeting of bankers, business men and farmers, declared recently that there was little prospect of success as effecting this year's crop in the campaign to reduce cotton acre-age. "The "safe farming" - movement contemplates a five-year program of education in the advantages of singlecropping, and the feeling is that all of the five years will be needed to convince farmers in the South of the folly of too much cotton at the ex-

pense of food and feed crops. Texas can not afford another cotton disaster in 1926. Yet conditions are such that without genuine leadership and genuine assistance from the bankers and business man of the cotton growing communities, farmers will be forced to stake their all on the fickle crop again. Because of conditions as heretofore have obtained in farm financing, few farmers are able to free themselves from the tyranny of cotton. They must have the aid and the encouragement of those agencies to whom they look for cred it, and they must have the co-operation of the entire community.

The Texas Bankers' Association has assumed a valuable leadership in this espect. Continuation of its logical imits will eventually make Texas the agricultural country it should be, where every farm will be able to stand independently, secure in its own resources, while cotton is relegated to its proper place as the servant intead of the master of the farm and the farm family .-- Fort Worth Star-Telegram.



How much better it would be to thoroughly thrash out one or two subjects at one meeting and take up other subjects of interest

at another. Farm and Ranch frequently receives invitations to have a representative attend agricultural meetings, and some of the programs offer enough material for a ten-day meeting, if each subject were given proper consideration. Programs of this sort are sent out to farmers, and the logical conclusion many reach is that "if I go Lwill have to sit and be bored to death with speeches for six or seven hours." As a result the audience is largely made up of county agents, farm specialists, newspaper men, and men employed by fertilizer and farm machinery companies, and it would be amusing, if the matter were not serious, to see these experts gravely make speeches at each other-speeches that all had listened to at some previous meeting.

How much more effective it would be if those who arrange these meetings for the benefit of the farmers would take up one or more important subjects in which the farmers in that district are vitally interested, and after due preparation spend an entire day discussing them. The announcement of such a meeting would give farmers something definite to think of, and one successful gathering would make it much easier to get a larger attendance at another meeting at which other subjects could be presented. The farmer can be given an overdose just like other people.-Farm and Ranch.




