HOW PROHIBITION WAS 'PUT OVER'

There is a fond story that has been diligently propagated by the wets to the effect that our National dry policy was a "war measure" that it was not intended to be permanent, that advantage was taken of the two million young men overseas fighting for the liberty of the world, and that the Eighteenth Amendment was put over in their absence, depriving them of the liberty at home for which they were fighting abroad. Much has been made of this story in effort to produce in the hearts of the young disloyalty to the law and rebellion against the authority of the government.

The main trouble with this story is that it has in no element of truth. The moral forces of America have been fighting the liquor traffic for more than a hundred years. For more than fifty years they have been fighting specifically for prohibition with a dry nation as their objective. In 1930, four years before we thought of getting into the war, the temperance forces of the whole nation met in Columbus, Ohio, and launched a drive for national prohibition. They sent a committee of one thousand to the steps of the Capitol in Washington with a petition to congress to submit the Eighteenth Amendment.

The resolution for the submission of this amendment was introduced into the Senate by Senator Sheppard and in the House by Representative Ford. It came to a vote on December 22, 1918, and in the House it received 287 votes for and 133 against. In a two-thirds majority the friends of temperance made it the supreme law of the land.

Dr. J. B. La Rose, Hindu Seer, Here

Taking the crystal out of the can, Dr. La Rose walked to the corner of the room and placed it in front of an oriental Buddha. That is where it is kept just before his seances.

The general air of the rooms is pervaded with a strong sense of the oriental, and is heightened by the strong odor of incense.

Dr. La Rose is in Big Spring for an indefinite stay.

Pecos Valley Baptists Flay Democratic Plank

ODESSA—In a resolution addressed to President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt, Vice-President-elect John Nance Garner, Senators Tom Connally and Morris Sheppard, and R. E. Thomson, Representative in Congress from the Sixteenth District, members of the Pecos Valley Baptist Association, representing Baptist churches in 11 West Texas counties, in a workers' conference here, denounced the party repeal platform and sought support for the Eighteenth Amendment by party leaders.

The resolution came as the climax of an address by Rev. T. E. Shelton of Crane, and was unanimously adopted.

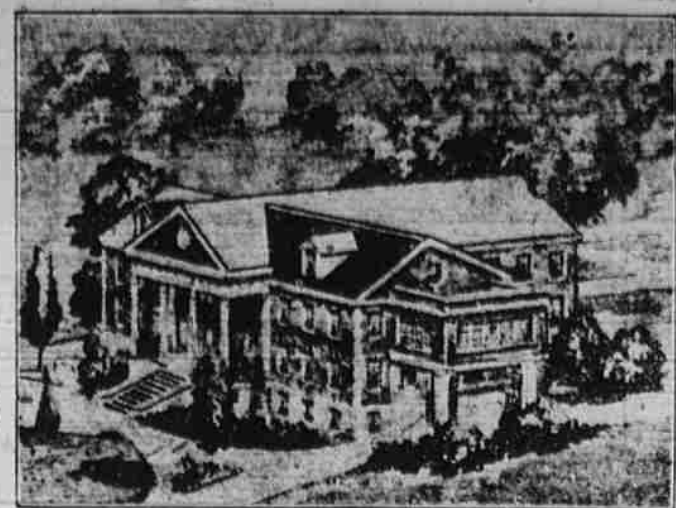

"Whereas, It appears that in the recent election the Democratic candidates won an overwhelming victory; and

"Whereas, The repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment is seriously proposed by many people; therefore

Be It Resolved, That this workers' conference of the Pecos Valley Baptist Association, representing all the Baptist churches in 11 West Texas counties, which counties have a population of 50,000, that is overwhelmingly Democratic, go on record as opposing the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

Primary Reforms

AUSTIN correspondent here that various bills designed to simplify and make effective the primary election system of Texas can be offered in the next session of the legislature.

Senator Ben G. O'Neil of Wichita Falls is reported to be interested in the preferential primary plan and may be expected to offer legislation along that line.

That the primary system is solely in need of reformation should be patent to everyone. It has broken down completely insofar as transmitting into action the wishes of the people is concerned. More often than not the minority decides the fate of candidates.

The preferential primary has something to recommend it. The plan would do away with the necessity of a runoff, thereby saving the taxpayers considerable money. It permits the voter to select a first and a second choice, the candidate getting the most of both combined being declared the nominee. If this law had been in effect this summer, the democratic nominee for governor would in all likelihood have been Tom Hunter of Wichita Falls.

A great many earnest citizens believe that certain offices should be filled by men whose nomination was made in convention, rather than by direct vote. The general breakdown of the primary system in recent years has resulted in many converts to this belief. The direct primary has now reared a

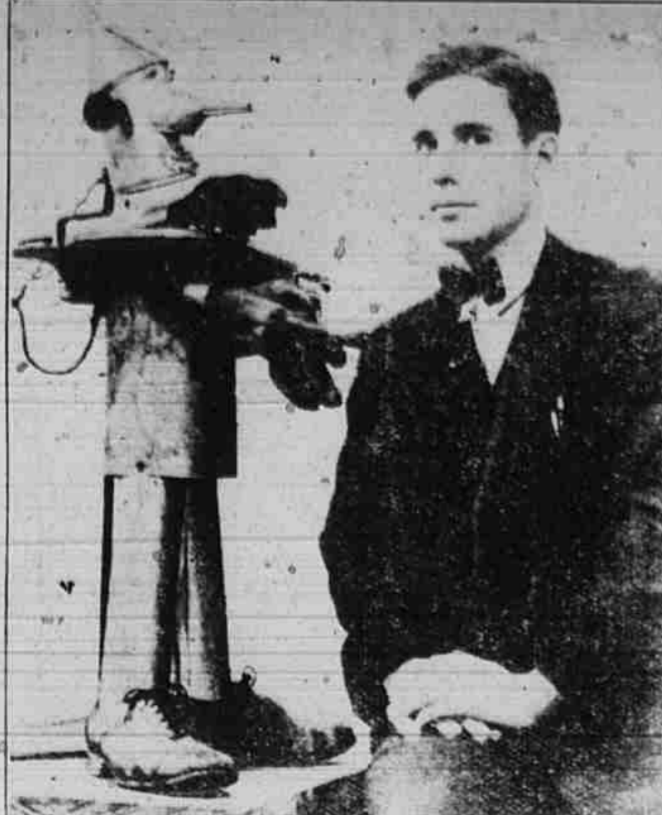
