

The above principle applies to the color of the ear lobes in breeds with yellow, creamy or white lobes. The many varieties of Leghorns can be divided by this indiction. The Rocks Wyandottes, and other American, Asiastic and English breeds have red lobes, hence this indication for these breeds is valuless. Experience has shown that Leghorn varieties with white ear lobes in the fall are better layers than those with yellow or creamy colored ear lobes.

A constitutionally strong bird, one that passes through the molt quickly and easily, is a better layer than one that develops all kinds of ailments during this period.

Hens that show the least broodiness are better layers than those that are broody a large part of the time.

A bird with worn toenails is considered a better layer than

one with long nails.
