## New Hatchery Purchased by Griffin Firm

Griffin's Hatchery has installed a Robbins Hatchery this week with a capacity of 3200 eggs, making this firm one of the

The hatchery is all electric. with separate hatching compartments, and includes a compartment for 10,000 turkey eggs. All eggs are turned by a crank from the outside, and no doors need be opened, which is a decided advantage over the old type of hatchery. Each compartment has its own thermometer and each is separately controlled. An automatic alarm. bells and lights are turned on if anything goes wrong with the machinery so that the person in charge can repair the equipment immediately.

Washingon, Dc. 8.-(UP)-A youth in the prison probation 1936 cotton crop of 12,407,000 bales, the largest since 1932, was forecast today by the crop reporting board in its final 1936 estimate.

> Production exceeds that of any years in which the Department of Agriculture has stressed crop control despite one of the most severe drouths in many years. The 1932 production was only 2,000 bales over this year's estimate.

The December I estimate exceeded that of November 1 by 7,000 bales. Ginnings to December 1 were 11,494,170 bales. Acreage harvested totalled 30.-540.000 acres.

Despite heavy drouth damage in Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma, average yield of 197.6 pounds per acre was the largest in several years.

Production this year compares with 10,638,000 bales in 1935, 9,636,000 bales in 1934 and 14,-667,000 bales for the five-year 1928-32 average.



Austin, Texas, Dec. 15.-With interest in Texas minerals increasing daily, the Texas Planning Board today again urged the Texas farmer and landowner to negotiate separate leases for the oil and gas rights and for the mineral rights on their land.

Maj. E. A. Wood, director of the planning board, pointed out that it has been customary for Texas landowners to include all mineral rights to his land when making an oil and gas lease.

"In many instances," Maj. Wood said, "the farmer and the landowner is losing additional revenue from his land through the use of a lease form which gives the lessee the privilege of exploiting not only the oil and gas rights, but all other mineral rights as well. 



No great increase is expected before 1939 or 1940.

Eudaly felt that the next year or two should be a favorable time to raise dairy heifers, because a good market would likely be ready for them. He warned, however, that dairymen should not increase the business blindly. "It is necessary to think ahead, and to plan pas-tures and feed reserves, before increasing the size of our herds," he commented, "and the reserves can be stored more efficiently and economically in trench silos.
