Tax Assessor Geo. M. Smith's rolls, just-completed, show a property tax valuation in the county of \$13,048,496, which is an increase of \$98,950 over the previous year.

### Seat Set of Rolls

The tax assessor's rolls show extreme neatness and accuracy throughout and make a creditable exhibition of clerical skill. The Commissioners' Court will examine the rolls at its next session, after which they will be forwarded to the State Comptroller's office in Austin.

#### TOM ROSS IS GIVEN TWENTY YEAR SENTENCE

Abilene, Texas, Sept. 19.—After deliberating since 10 o'clock Friday night, the jury in the Tom Ross case returned a verdict at 9 o'clock Tuesday night, finding the defendant guilty of the murder of H. L. Roberson, cattle inspector, at Seminole, Gaines county, on April 1, last, and assessing his punishment at twenty years in the penitentiary.

Ross received a sentence of thirty five years at Lubbock for the slaying of Roberson's partner, W. D. Allison, also a cattle inspector, who was killed at Seminole at the same time. Milt Goode is now on trial here in the killing of Roberson.
