PRESIDENT HARDING **DIES SUDDENLY**

The following telegram was sent out Thursday night, Aug. 2, 7:30 p.m.:

Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, died instantaneously and without warning Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock (9:30 o'clock Dallas time), a victim of a stroke of apoplexy, which struck him down in his weakened condition after an illness of exactly a week of ptomaine poisoning and pneumonia.

The disease had been conquered, but seven days of silent, though intense, suffering had left their mark and a stroke of apoplexy came without an instant's warning and before physicians could be called, members of his party summoned, or re-medial measures taken, he passed from life's stage after having for nearly two and a half years served his Nation and for many more years his native State of Ohio.

The end came after a day which had been described by Brig. Gen. Sawyer, the President's personal physician, as the most satisfactory day the President had had since his illness began. The physicians, in their formal announcement of the end, said that "during the day he had been free from discomfort and there was every justification for anticipating a prompt recovery."

WIFE GIVES ALARM

The first indication that a change had occured in the condition of Mr. Harding came shortly after 7 o'clock when Mrs. Harding personally opened the door of the sick room and called to those in the corridors to "find Dr. Boone and the others quick." At that time Mrs. Harding was understood to have been reading to the President, sitting at his bedside with the evening papers and messages of sympathy which had been received during the day.

His remains were prepared and shipped to Washington, D. C., where the body was held in state for twenty-four hours, and a very appropriate funeral service held Wednesday. Interment will be made in Marion, Ohio, to-day (Friday), at 3 o'clock in the afternoon

WARREN G. HARDING Born, Corsica, Ohio, 1865.

Worked in printing office of villiage paper and college paper finally bought Marion Daily Star of which he became editor. Elected State Senator, 1899, served four years.

Was Lieutenant Governor of Ohio in 1904-06. Republican candidate for Governor in 1910, defeated.

In 1914 was elected to United States Senate. Voted for peace treaty with reservations but was always an advocate of preparedness, supporter of woman suffrage, child labor law, minimum wage law, and other progressive measures. Elected President, 1920.






