PTA Instruction Received Saturday At County School

"Parents need to be educated to know what is best for the children and parent education will be in the foreground as much as possible in the Parent-Teachers Association work this next year," stated Mrs. F. E. Jacob of Ranger, PTA District President, who spoke at the PTA County School of Instruction Saturday, April 23 in the Baptist Educational building at Coleman.

Mrs. Jacob, who spoke on "Policies and Objects of the Parent Teachers Association," said also that welfare work for children would be carried on but that parent education would be most stressed in the year's program. Welfare of children is one of the purposes of the organization. Officers and chairman must make plans to carry on the work for the unit. Study courses for leaders of the unit and instructions for officers and committees may be easily obtained, Mrs. Jacobs said.

Mrs. Clarence Cooper of Coleman discussed "By-Laws and Their Importance." All members should study by-laws and be familiar with them to carry on the work more efficiently, Mrs. Cooper said.

"Each chairman should plan the year's work and ask financial help as they need it and should take care in selecting the right persons for committees, was the main thought in Mrs. H. D. Bishop's talk on "Committee Chairmen and Their Duties." Mrs. Bishop was a guest speaker from Ranger.

Mrs. O. B. Kitchen of Coleman talked on "Book Procedures," and Mrs. W. C. Gay of Coleman conducted a Parliamentary drill. Mrs. Rushing Wells spoke on "Programs" and emphasized the fact that good programs contributed much to the success of the work.

"The main business of the parents is to see that children have the best educational advantages possible. Parents need to be educated to know that is best for them," stated Mrs. John Saunders, county council president, who spoke on "Parent Education."

Mrs. Jacob presided over a round table discussion or the "question box" at the end of the meeting.

THE BUFFALO TRAIL-MAKERS

Some of the Trail-Makers

Note: A recent visit from J. E. Whiteside to the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Bivins, revealed a few interesting facts necessary to the history of Buffalo. When the problem of consolidation was brought before the people, the vote for it was unanimous. Only one vote was cast against the bond of \$3250. When the bond was passed, a meeting was held to decide where the school should be located. Mr. C. H. Brannan, fondly known as "Uncle Bud," owned the land where the people thought it best to locate the school. When they mentioned it to him he donated the amount of land for which they

asked. Mr. Brannan passed away on October 10, 1937. The first school term of the new Buffalo was opened in 1915. A Mr. Wynn was the superintendent the first year after the consolidation. Mr. J. L. P. Baker, the present County Superintendent of Coleman County, succeeded Mr. Wynn. Mr. Baker remained as superintendent for approximately one and one-half years when he was called away. Mr. Thompson succeeded him, but remained a very short time. The unexpired school term was left for Richard Roper to finish.

Mr. Baker's sister, Miss Effie Baker, now Mrs. E. E. Rogers, was Buffalo's first English teacher. During the second term, Mr. Baker with the assistance of his sister, coached the winning team in girls basketball. This team held the title of winners for two years in succession. The girls who constituted the team were: forwards, Allie Bennet, now Mrs. Allie Phillips of Gorman; Katie Whiteside, now Mrs. George Bivins; center, Velma Singleary, the deceased Mrs. Hays, formerly of Houston; Mildred Gipson, now Mrs. Jerry Simpson of Santa Anna; guards, Lola Archer, now Mrs. J. B. Craig of Stamford; Jewell Rodgers, the deceased Mrs. Walter Gilmore of Brownwood.

The first year of school the ball game that brought delight to Buffalo was played against Santa Anna during freezing weather. The scores were 3-0 in Buffalo's favor.

The first track team held the winning title for three years in succession, each meet having been played with Santa Anna. The team consisted of the following: Leo George, Harry Terrell, deceased, Leonard Gipson of Santa Anna, Bert Powell of Lubbock and George Tucker. Leo George won the state championship in track for two consecutive years for all Class B High Schools.

For several years following the World War, a fever and flu epidemic swept the surrounding territories. Because of the terrible illnesses among the teachers and pupils, school was forced to be closed for a number of weeks. The first teachers who taught following the epidemic included Miss Lucille Grady, Miss Lillie Rose Couch, Miss Imogene Perry, now Mrs. Will Steward of Rockwood and Mr. Charlie Perry of Brownwood.
