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Museum Fund Must Be Complete By June 16

Unless Santa Anna completes the raising of \$500 for the Texas Ex-Ranger Museum, planned for the local Ranger Park, by the time of the Reunion scheduled for June 16-17-18, plans will be abandoned...

Although the Ex-Rangers are continually sending in their pledges for their \$500 allotment on the fund, Santa Anna citizens have shown little interest so far.

The Ex-Rangers, who for many years have called Santa Anna "home" have been invited by other cities to come there.

Unless plans for the museum fund are completed by reunion time, definite invitations of other towns, who are actively interested in the Rangers, will probably be considered and the acceptance of another meeting place would mean that Santa Anna had failed in keeping another distinctive feature of our town.

Santa Anna formerly has had in years past several outstanding features which set it aside from other towns. A local industry, which was rare in Texas, and which made Santa Anna stand out, is now closed.

The committee in charge, headed by Mrs. R. C. Gay, a daughter of an Ex-Ranger, urges all who desire to pledge to the fund (no money is donated now, only a pledge to pay if needed) to contact her or the local News office.

Nephew of Former West Texas Ranchers Weds Queen's Niece

The nephew of a one-time West Texas ranchman, himself of royal blood, was married recently in London, with Queen Elizabeth being among those attending the rites.

Anne Ferelith Bowes-Lyon, 20, niece of Queen Elizabeth, was married to Viscount Anson, 25, son and heir of the Earl of Lichfield, the ceremony having been performed by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Besides Queen Elizabeth, Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret Rose were other members of the royal family in attendance at the rites.

Viscount Anson is a nephew of the three Anson brothers of

royal blood who came to the San Angelo country in 1891.

The brothers, Claud, Frank and Billie, sons of Lord Anson, Earl of Lichfield, settled first in Coleman County, near Valera.

Claud Anson later ranched on the Kickapoo, in Tom Green County, and Billie Anson bought the Head of the River ranch above Christoval for \$3.65 an acre.

Billie Anson was one of this country's best judges of horses, and was commissioned to buy horses for the British Army for use in South Africa during the Boer War, an uncle, Lord Lonsdowne, being a member of the British cabinet at that time.

The Head-of-the-River Ranch is still owned by Mr. Anson's widow, who now lives abroad. (San Angelo Morning Times)
