

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THE TREASURER'S SHORTAGE

To the Voters of Coleman County:

I have conducted my campaign for election to the office of Treasurer upon a high plane and will not now engage in mudslinging. It cannot, however, be called mud-slinging to cite facts and the official record.

Auditor's Official Report.

Foffowing is a copy of the County Auditor's Report cov-cring the office of County Treasurer (audit made June, 1922, completed July 14, 1922, by Rankin Audit Company of Houston, Texas):

'The audit of Mrs. Collin's account covers the period June 11, 1921, to June 10, 1922. The findings are presented on pages 28 to 62, the summarized result being reflected on Exhibit 1 which shows a balance of \$609.53 due to the county

"The cash in Depository is \$609.53 short of Fund Balances as shown in Exhibit J and K from which you will note this shortage occurs in Treasurer's General Account, covering July Road and Bridge. General and State Highway Funds. All other funds are in agreement with cash, in Depository after the necessary transfers have been made on Depository's books as shown on Exhibit J Schedules No. 1 page No. 35.

To further support the shortage reported, we present Exhibit L, with supporting schedules No. 1 to No. 5 inclusive, which hows that the total receipts for the Jury, Road and Bridge, General and State Highway Funds amount in \$60,457.10 and that the total deposits to credit Treasurer's General Account covering same Aunds was \$69,718.35 which amount includes \$8,392,04 properly belonging to other funds as shown on Exhibit J, schedule No. 1 and \$1,483.72 transferred to this fund to correct fund balances as per previous uudit, a total of 39,875.76, to be deducted leaving net deposits of \$59.812.59 which is short of total receipts \$614.51 less a difference of \$4.98 which the Auditors were unable to locate, leaving a balance of \$609.53: "Exhibit 'AD' is a statement of commission retained by Treasurer which reflects an excess of \$129.74 over the maximum of \$2,000.00 allowed under Article No. 3875 R. C. S. However, the Treasuger cannot be held liable for this amount due to a recent decision of the Supreme Court, of Texas in affirming the case of Harris County vs. Charlton which holds that the maxi τ mum of \$2,000.00 appiles to commissions derived strictly from County funds, and that commissions received from special district such as Road, Drainage and Mavigation Districts are to be considered in addition to the \$2,000.00 maximum. We found the Treasurer's accounts inascurate and funds badyl mixed' which required considerably more time to andit than is usually the case. THE COUNTY JUDGE'S RACE

IS IT BEST TO MAKE A CHANGE?

In last week's issue of this paper we presented to you a short sketch of the life of our present County Judge, Gid Mathews. No one has disputed the facts stated. The history of his efforts to obtains an education beginning with a barefooted boy on the farm, ought to appeal to the average fair minded voter and at least he is entitled to a fair consideration. His record as County Judge ought not to be judged from the statements by the uninformed man who goes about the County making hearsay statements which are in truth and in fact misleading, unlair and without any foundation.

For instance: It is being circulated over the County that the Commissioners' Court is paying Attorneys \$250,00 a month for legal advice. This statement is absolutely false __1: is being rumored by some who ought to know better that there is a shortage in County funds, which statement is utterry false, as shown by the report of the Rankin Audit Company recently made to the County Judge and from which report we quote you the following:

"The balance in the various County funds on June 10, 1922, , are unusually large by comparison of other Counties of the same size as yours. No surer proof of intelligent and efficient handling of County funds can be found. We are further pleased to report to you that we have found the affairs in your County unusually well administred and handled by yourself and your Commissioners' Court.

We report the County finances to be far above the average and the large balances in your current funds indicate economical management on the part of the Court."

Some people are being misled in reference to the road building program which is now under way. Some people have the idea that the County Judge voted, or rather brought about the bond issues for the building of roads. As a matter of fact, the several precincts in which roads are now being built and are to be built in the near future, voted these bonds voluntarily. The bonds being voted and having been sold, the law required the roads to be built under contracts made with the Commissioners' Court. Many people do not understand that the Federal and State Government, for every dollar voted by the several precincts and used on roads known as highways, furnish the same amount of money for the building of the roads. In other words, the Government furnishes just as much as you do.

Some people have been misinformed in reference to the salary being paid th County Engineer. They have not realized that on the several Highways which are now being constructed in Coleman County, the Government State and Federal, pay one-halt of his salary, and one-half of every expense incident to or arising out of the County Engineer's duties and expense connected on such highways.

Mr. Voter, have you stopped to consider what it means to make a change in the office of County Judge at this time? Let us reason with you as fair men from a fair standpoint and with due respect to every person who reads this article. Now listen: If Judge Mathews is defeated, it means, of course, the election of a new man who knows nothing at all about the contracts which are now outstanding and which will be executed in the near future. It means the discharge of the County Engineer. In other words, there is now an outstanding contract involving an expenditure of \$286,000.00 on the Coleman-Burkett Highway, \$25,000.00 on the Coleman-Brady Highway, \$70,000.00 on the Valera-Voss-Leaday-Stacy Highway. In a short time a contract involving approximately \$225,000.00. will be let for the building of the Highway from Coleman through the city of Santa Anna to the Brown County line and which is one of the most important projects ever undertaken by the County of Coleman and to the city of Coleman and to the city of Santa Anna in general. In a short time a contract involving approximately \$85,099.00 will be let for the building of the Highway from Coleman through Valera, which will evidently extend to the Runnells County line west of Talpa and in a few weeks contracts involving more than \$540,000.00 short county roads will be let. All of these contracts approximately involving \$1,142,000.are now outstanding and will be outstanding up to and including the time for the qualification of the next County Judge, whether it will be L .G. Mathews or his oponent. On all Highways where State aid is given, such as the Highways mentioned herein the State Highway Department must be satisfied with the County Engineer, otherwise no financial aid will be given to the County.

When the bids were tabulated it was found that the bid of Burks and Hart was low. Mr. Burks was called in and stated that neither his firm not any member of his firm had ever had any experience in handling. work of this character or of this magnitude. Neither did they have the reganization nor equipment to handle the work and would have to build so dll their organization and purchase all their equipment.

Since this was an unusually large and important job I took the stand that this firm had not shown themselves competent to handle it satsfactorily and told the Court that I would not recommend the approval of a contract awarded to them.

The firm of McCall-Moore Engineering Company, who were next low bidders, had all the required experience, organization and equiptment and contract awarded to them would be satisfactory;

I was supported in this decision by Federal Engineer F. P. Sexton and it was only after it was clear to the court that we would not recommend the approval of a contract to Burks and Hart that the Court agreed to award the contract to McCall-Moore Engineering Company.

Both Mr. Sackett and yourself objected to paying the additional price. but acted on the recommedation of the engineers in order to met the requirements necessary to secure the State and Federal aid that had been allotted to the County

Gid Mathews is committed to a business administration. He realizes that Coleman County needs better roads and the people having voted the bonds to build these roads, he is committed to carrying out the contracts let. and to be let, and to the completion of the road building program which is now on in this County. He is not willing to forsake at this time the tremendous project undertaken. We believe it unwise to jeopardize the rights of the people of Coleman County by making a change at this time in the office of the County Judge and the discharge of the County Engineer, when we believe that such action would result in the State Highway Department taking over the supervision of the road work at the expense of Coleman County, or withdrawing any further aid, leaving us with uncompleted roads, unfinished roads, a squabble with contractors and a multiplicity of lawsuits with the contractors and confusion on top of confusion all to the detriment of Coleman County and her citizenship.

Since Gid Mathews has been County Judge, the tax rate has been reduced from 35 cents to 31 cents on the \$100.00 valuation-a reduction of 4 cents. Don't blame him because the State tax rate has been increased. He had nothing to do with the State tax rate.

Some people are not acquainted with the true facts relating to the injunction arising over the bond issue in the Santa Anna Precinct. The true facts are: That a petition was presented to the Commissioners' Court requesting an election to be ordered on the cancellation of the bond issue which had therefore been voted by the people in that Precinct. The law required that petition to be signed by two-thirds of the qualified property tax paying voters of the Precinct as shown by the records in the of-fice of the County Tax Collector. The Commissioner's Court upon exam-ination of the petition, ascertained that it was not signed as required by law and it was their legal duty under such circumstances to refuse to order the election, because the petition was not legal petition. A suit was filed asking the District Court to issue an injunction to restrain the sale of the bonds and for a mandamus to compel the Commissioners' Court to order the election. This case was called for trial and the evidence introduced showed that the petition was not signed as required by law and the District Court refused to grant the injunction and refused to issue an order to compel the Commissioners' Court to order the election. This case was appealed to the Court of Civil Appeals and was recently dismissed.

In the case of Coleman County the Federal Government and the State Government has approved the work of the present County Engineer. He is acceptable to the State and Federal Government. IT IS THE LAW that where government aid has been given such as it has in Coleman County and when the Commissioner's 'Court discharges the County Engineer, such as will be the result if Judge Mathews is defeated, then the Federal and State Government will have the power and can exercise the right to withdraw the aid given, or take active charge of the work or require the County to employ another County Engineer acceptable to the State Highway Department. In other words, the defeat of Gid Mathews means nothing but untold confusion and would perhaps result in the State Highway Department taking charge of the roads being constructed and building them without the supervision of the Commissioners' Court or the County Engineer. These are facts which are not explained by the opposition. In fact, they do not want you to know what the result will be to make a change at this particular time.

Did you know that some of the contractors who are now building these roads are using their efforts to defeat Gid Mathews and do you know why? Did you know that some of the contractors now building these roads want to get rid of the present County Engineer and do you know why?

The present County Judge and the present County Engineer are on the job every minute insisting that the roads and roadwork be completed according to the contract entered into and are compelling a strict compliance with the contracts.

Do you believe it a wise business policy to put directly in charge of the County affairs, one who is not familiar with any of the contracts which have been let and which are to be let in a week-or two and defeat the man who is familiar with evry contract entered into and who is keeping track of the work being done? Do you think it a wise busineess policy to make a change at this particular time when contracts involving \$381,000.00 are outstanding and when contracts involving approximately \$761,000.00 are to be entered into within the next few weeks.

It has been told in this county that the Commissioners' Court committed a grave error in not awarding the bridge and culvert contract on the Coleman-Burkett Highway to Burks & Hart. The following letter is self explanatory and ought to make clear the action of the Commissioners' Court in awarding that contract:

As a matter of fact another petition, legal in form, was presented to the Court and the Court ordered the election and the bonds were not voted off. Notwithstanding the true facts, there are some people who have blamed the County Judge, who, as a matter of fact, only followed the law as he was sworn to do.

If you re-elect Gid Mathews County Judge, he will compel the contractors to comply with their contracts. He will see that the roads are built according to the plans, specifications and contracts entered into. Some of the contractors are wanting him defeated and this at least ought to cause you to reflect before you cast your vote against him.

Since he has been County Judge a rest room for ladies who come to town from the country has been built. It was not built for the town people for they have their own conveniences in their homes and in their stores. The present quarters for jurors is entirely inadequate. Men serving on juries are compelled to sleep on the third floor of the Courthouse with no conveniences whatever, crowded together under unhealthy and unsanitary conditions and Gid Mathews pledges himslef for the convenience of the jurors who are compelled to serve on juries, to provide better accomodations for them.

The public ought to be concerned in the election of the County Judge about the dispatch of legal business and certainly ought to inquire whether or not Gid Mathews is qualified to sit in the trial of cases, both civil and crimnal. There are many cases pending in the County Court, cases are being filed all the time and certainly the public is interested in having business disposed of. The records show that Gid Mathews has been successful in the trial of his cases: His record in the Courts shows that he has dispatched the business with faithfulness, promptness and in a satisfactory manner.

Mr. Voter, may we ask you in all fairness before you cast your vote against Gid Mathews, stop and consider what effect his defeat on the road building program which is no wwell under way. Will it be a detriment to the County? Will it bring about confusion over the contractors? will it delay the work? Will it result in lawsuits with the contractors?

Contracts are outstanding, work is progressing, the money is being spent in compliance with the law and in compliance with the contracts. Not one dollar is being illegally spent. Not one dollar is being grafted. The Audifor's report has just been filed and he has reported not one nickle of shortage in the road funds or in the funds arising from the sale of the bonds. We submit the above for your consideration ... Think it over and do what you think is best for Coleman County and the people who live here and who will receive the benefits of the splendid work now being done in this County,



I favor equal distribution of the bond money over the precinct where bonds are voted. I believe in a maintenance fund to maintain the roads after built. It is useless waste of money to build roads and have no money for maintenance. Out of the bond issues. I believe that all the roads designated can be built and a reasonable amount set aside for maintenance. I favor the 15 cent road tax remaining in the precinct from which it is paid.

I have no malice against any one who voted against me, nor will I at the next primary. I want your friendship, I feel sure of my election and want your cooperation if elected, and will promise you that I will do right as I see it, having at all times the interest of the people of Coleman County at heart, and will keep the County expenses to the minimum.

When the Brazos River started rising and floods seemed imminent, the Division Disaster Rellef Director was noiffed and as soon as it was found necessary to send relief, a night letter was sent to chapters in the vicinliv, of the dooded district but outside of the flood area. The call asked for clothing principally, and in less than seven hours in one case and twelve hours in others, supplies were on their WHV.

Dallas replied at 4 p. m. following the cuil received in the morning: that clothing had been shipped. Waco not only responded to the first request. but sent a second supply of clothing. Houston sent 883 garments which had been cleaned and sterilized. Other towns in the adjacent territory sent more than their quota within the next two days and the result was that by the time a sufficient degree of order the health of the nation. had been created to look after the the stricken inhabitants of the flooded area, there were supplies on hand sufindent to meet all the needs of the laination.

A feature of this worsterfully ready. responsed it is stated, was that all the i arments sent were usuable and were the type needed. This showed that the chapters sending the ar considered the character of the disaster and the conditions of the people needing relief. making their contributions accordingly, and did not use the "hit or miss" meth od of collecting supplies so frequently seen in cases of similar catastrophes. 
