Our local correspondents have been falling down on the job here of late. We would be glad to hear from each one of them every week. Let us have the news if it is only brief, for a few brief items are better than no news at all.

We never realized until last week just how muddy water could get. Since the heavy rains that fell first of last week the water in the city mains is so muddy one has to put on mud masks to drink it. A filtration plant of sufficient capacity to filter the water for this town would not cost very much, and would be a good investment for our health's sake.

The recent heavy rains have done considerable damage to such crops as were planted, and the greater portion of the crops in this part of the country were planted. Corn, maize and other row crops were practically ruined and most fields will have to be planted over, is the opinion of most people. Such will cause the crops to be late in maturing, but in our judgment we have plenty of time yet to make good crops.

Some of the old times, when rains descended from the elements above and folks had to either stay at home or come to town in wagons, etc., were brought back to memory last week. Texas passed out from under the strain of the long drought, much mud and water was in evidence everywhere. From reports all Texas was drenched and other states were also recipients of heavy rains. All the big rivers in the state reached the high water marks, and much damage was done. Hundreds of lives were lost and the property damage was great, reaching into the millions. At last Texas has got a season and other things being favorable, crops will be made throughout the state this year. Coleman county got her share.

Trickham and Santa Anna played a real game of base ball on the local diamond here Friday, and from all reports the game was an interesting one. The final score was 3 to 4 in favor of Trickham, counting some scores that should not have been counted, according to reports. The score, according to those who witnessed the game, should have been 1 to 2. If the strict rules had been complied with, the editor missed the opportunity of seeing the game, but if they do it again we will try to see them.

Ablene Reporter: Childress is out after a three-billion water supply, having voted bonds last week in the sum of \$300,000 to put the project under way. That splendid little city on the Plains will install a big pumping station and filtration plant, and its future water supply will be sufficient for a city of 10,000 people for four years. The West Texas town that is not doing something to solve its water problem is a back number, and will surely be overtaken and surpassed by smaller towns that have permanently removed the menace of water shortage. It is the one big problem that must be solved and solved right, if a town or city expects to continue its growth—or to hold it.

The News has just received the program of the Fourth Annual Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held at Plainview, Texas, on May 22 and 23. The program embraces a wide field of work and some of the best speakers in the United States are on it. This convention promises to be one of the most interesting sessions ever held, and much good is expected to follow. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is doing some good work for West Texas, in fact, unless one is in touch with them you cannot imagine how they are working to bring about great things for West Texas.

Sometimes the writer sits up late at night, and takes advantage of every opportunity in the daytime, trying to say something that will be helpful to our town, or make a suggestion that will meet with the approval of the business men of the town, and the harder we work the less effect our efforts seem to have. We would never tire if we could only get the co-operation of the town in a commercial way, and support of the merchants in a business way, but trying to publish a newspaper in a town without either is a darn slow business. Some tell us they believe in the newspaper, and hope to see it do well and continue to hold up for the town, and keep its name before the world, but when it comes to helping support it they flatly refuse.

The News editor had planned to spend the greater part of the month of May attending duties and meetings of importance out of town, but due to such a big slump in business during the month of April, we will not be able to make any of our contemplated trips, but instead, will stay right here and make the best of things we can for a while longer, and if any of our delinquent subscribers have a dollar or two that you can't use any other way, slip in and pay it on your account.

In Lubbock this week is being observed as "Physical Culture Week." The campaign being conducted by the Chamber of Commerce. It is a question that vitally concerns everyone, and should be observed everywhere. Setting up exercises and properly balanced diets are among the things being stressed. Their program for these exercises is as follows to be executed daily: Spend ten minutes in setting-up exercises; sleep with windows open, and secure what sunshine you can; spend a minimum of ten hours during the week in the open air; walk at least three miles a day; balance your meals with fruit, treat your stomach with respect; eat meat not more than once a day; drink at least eight glasses of pure water daily; completely relax for at least 15 minutes each day and conserve your energy, cultivate happy thoughts and think in terms of health. You may think you would not be interested in such program, but you should be just the same.

Recently a district federation of womens clubs was held at Haskell, Texas, during which, work of mothers and club women was discussed and women were urged to prepare themselves for the new responsibilities placed upon them. The editor of this paper does not take the position that he wishes to dictate to the good women of this country as to what and how they should do, but we would like to offer words of encouragement to the good mothers who are bringing up children to take their places in life after they have served their time and passed into eternity. As a parent, we believe it would be impossible to place too much stress upon setting the right example before the children, and at all times knowing where the children are. Parents should manage to keep the confidence of their children, encourage them in doing right, teach them the importance of clean living and clean habits, encourage them in shunning wrong, oppressing crime and obeying the laws of the country as well as the laws of nature and health. Parental feeling and pathetic sympathy often creates great mistakes by parents letting children do things they should not do. A mistake once made is often hard to over come. It is best to know your child, know yourself and be governed accordingly. If your child has aspirations to do something that is wrong, it is not the best to correct the child by telling it that it cannot do such without explaining the reason why. Parents should not take for granted that a child knows a thing just because the parent knows such, and if a child is inclined to want to do something the parents know to be wrong, the reason should be explained to the child in the same way as the refusing to grant the privilege. Children pattern after their parents more than parents think they do, thus, it behooves parents to be very careful as to their conduct before their children. Little habit forming things in the minds of children may not be noticeable but very often becomes obnoxious. "Bring a child up in the way it should go and when it gets old it will not depart from it," may not be scripture, but it is good doctrine. It seems to us that when we was a child parents controlled the children, now we have a bunch of our own and the children try to control the parents; wonder where we will ever come in it unless we let it be known that it is the duty of the parents to control the children? Love will help control, but often it becomes the duty of parents to resort to a little physical punishment in correcting children. Abuse is

not necessary in correcting children, but often a little punishment is. When love fails, there is only one resort left and that is punishment, which is often neglected. Parents may think they love their children too much to punish such cases. Parents should know where their children are and not permit them to go to places where they have no business, in fact, small children should not be sent or allowed to go, but should be carried.

MERCHANT DIES
AFTER SHOOTING
J. C. Stephens, Groceryman of Abilene Slain On Main Street Early Monday
ABILENE, May 1.—J. C. Stephens, 76 years old, was shot and almost instantly killed at 9:30 o'clock this morning. His grandson, Wiley A. Stephens, is under arrest. Alleged threats against the younger Stephens and his wife by the elder Stephens are said to have been the cause of the shooting.
The younger Stephens is said to have fired seven times with a 45 automatic pistol at his grandfather, all taking effect. The older man lived only a few seconds. He died without making a statement.
Wiley A. Stephens surrendered to the local officers and a charge of murder has been placed against him.
The shooting occurred in front of the victims place of business on South First street. Wiley Stephens is married and one of the proprietors of a restaurant near the establishment of his grandfather.
The dead man moved to Abilene from Aften, Texas, about a year ago, and was formerly the proprietor of the Commercial hotel of this city, but was later engaged in the grocery business.


