When I went in office the sheriffs in this section of the State were receiving only \$500 a year ex-officio salary and were allowed only 50c a day for feeding prisoners. The office barely paid actual expenses and feeding of prisoners was done at a loss. I was one of a committee of sheriffs sent to Austin to confer with the Legislature to get relief and we succeeded in getting the ex-officio salary raised to \$1,000 and a raise to 75c a day for feeding prisoners and fees in misdemeanors raised about one third.

Under the present arangement it is possible for a sheriff to make a little money out of the office and I feel that I should have the office another term to, in a measure, make up for the lean years I have served. If you feel the same way about it I would appreciate your vote, and if elected I will give you the best service of which I am capable.
