Franco's Men Expected To March In Shortly

HENDAYE, France (At The Spanish Frontier), Jan. 25 (AP) - The insurgent command reported today that its troops had penetrated the southern section of Barcelona and by noon had extended a ring of steel around all the city except the northern coastal portion. Refugees Pour Out

From emplacements along s tuge are nearly enclosing the third capital of the Spanish republic insurgent artillery was reported shelling the city, while a steady stream of refugees poured out northward along the coastal road.

Insurgent dispatches said an advance guard of one column entered Barcelona from the south but was waiting in the outskirts rather than risk further penetration until stronger forces had been brought up.

The main body of troops followed by forced marches, said the insurgent command, and was expected to begin arriving Barcelona by nightfall.

ABOARD THE U.S. CRUIS-ER OMAHA, NEAR BAR-CELONA, Jan. 25 (AP)-Fifteen Americans, fleeing the beleaguered Barcelona area, had to run a gantlet of bombs today before they reached safety aboard the Omaha and the United States Destroyer Badger.
