



Expressing the highest regard for their humanitarian work. Rev. Boone pointed out the deep responsibility the nurse has in the world in saving and caring for humanity and in extending her Christian influence in the homes, rich or poor, where she administers. He referred to the work as a sacred calling and advised them to follow the leadership of Florence Nightingale, whose services during the Crimean War for the first time proved that nursing was best done by women rather than men. It is the one field or profession not desired by men, because it requires a patience and skill few men have.
