SMOKE FROM THE MOUNTAIN

Please read the editorial this week and assist in carrying out the advise given. It will help you and your town.

This week the News, as well as other papers in the county, received a resolution from a church group which the papers were requested to print, stating the opposition to recent advertisements run, the primary subject of the ads being law enforcement of the sale of beer. If the News had received this resolution some weeks ago, we might have been more agreeable on the subject, although that would still not change the fact that we are in the advertising business and believe we have a right to use our own judgment in managing the paper. However, the county newspapers and particularly the News, have been the object within the last two weeks of a campaign, carried on by a petition, the purpose of which was cancellation of subscriptions and advertisements in any county newspaper which carried another such advertisement.

That first petition left a rather sour taste, particularly since the columns of this newspaper have always been open for free publicity to the church group which instigated the petition. The News wished to print the petition with the names as a news item but was refused permission. The petition reads:

"We the undersigned subscribers to newspapers or a newspaper published in Coleman county, a county in which the majority by their votes have declared themselves opposed to beer hereby respectfully request all newspapers published in this county to cease immediately from advertising beer, and we stand ready to back our request by immediate cancellation of any and all subscriptions and the withdrawal of all advertising from any paper which we now patronize, upon the appearance of any beer advertisements in any future issue of such newspapers or paper.

Signed If any group or individual opposes the advertisements, may they be reminded we are in the newspaper business and will accept advertisements from that group or individual at regular advertising rates as long as the ads are legitimate and not slanderous.

Much praise has gone to the Clyde telephone operator who stood by her post for 18 hours, contacting other cities for help and sending death messages. Another example of fast work and efficiency was shown by the crew of the West Texas Utilities from Abilene who, when they received the call, rushed out to Clyde, repaired the broken lines, despite splintered poles and wires and had all service on again in 32 minutes.

Several have asked us to make a comment on the enthusiasm the audience showed Tuesday night. Surely the class deserve applause, but there we have a handicap. We are talking to and guess we were all waiting for some one else to start it. Which doesn't excuse our neglect in the least.

Softball Season Opens Monday At Athletic Field

Ernest Thompson States Policies

Ernest Thompson, candidate for governor, brought his campaign here Saturday, speaking to a crowd of about 250.

Thompson, for the past six years a member of the railroad commission, urged his plan for permanent prosperity for Texas, declaring that he would foster a plan as governor which would conserve the soil and improve conditions of the farmer and ranchman to bring them a price for their products equal to the cost of production plus a fair profit.

He also promised a program of attracting new industries to the state to use Texas products and employ Texas labor.

"As your governor," he said, "I'm going to see to it that the people from whom we buy manufacture in Texas with Texas raw materials and Texas labor at least as much as we consume."

Thompson pledged a program of state economy and use of the blue pencil on foolish and wasteful appropriations that would save the state five or six million dollars a year.

"I'm going to win this race," he declared, "I can just feel it in my bones. I may not be reelected for a second term because I really mean business about cutting down these expenses and doing something for the people."

On the matter of old age pensions, Thompson said that he would ask the legislature to change the law to provide that whether needy aged had children should not be considered in determining eligibility for pensions.

"I believe in having some heart in administering the pension law, and I'm against cutting grandma or grandpa off the rolls because a son or a daughter makes a little above the cost of necessities. I'm opposed too to making the old folks go and live with their children unless they want to."

Thompson was introduced to the audience by Mayor Leman Brown.

NORMAN H. DAVIS, newly appointed chairman of the American Red Cross, has assumed active direction of the nation-wide organization with headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Mr. Davis, named chairman by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, following the death of Admiral Cary T. Grayson, has been active for twenty years as a Special Ambassador of the United States to international conferences, dealing with world peace, finances, and disarmament.

He has represented the United States in this official capacity by appointment of Presidents Wilson, Hoover and Roosevelt.

A native of Tennessee, he engaged in banking in Cuba as a young man, and first came into active public service during the World War. He formerly made his home in New York, but since assuming his new post with the Red Cross has bought an historic residence in Alexandria, Virginia, across the Potomac from the nation's capital.

Rev. Boone Is Commencement Speaker At Sealy Hospital School of Nursing Graduation Tuesday; Ten Get Diplomas

Rev. Leslie A. Boone, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Brownwood, delivered the commencement address Tuesday night when ten nurses received their diplomas from the Sealy Hospital School of Nursing. The program was given at the high school auditorium.

Expressing the highest regard for their humanitarian work, Rev. Boone pointed out the deep responsibility the nurse has in the world in saving and caring for humanity and in extending her Christian influence in the homes, rich or poor, where she administers. He referred to the work as a sacred calling and advised them to follow the leadership of Florence Nightingale, whose services during the Crimean War for the first time proved that nursing was best done by women rather than men. It is the one field or profession not desired by men, because it requires a patience and skill few men have.

The Florence Nightingale pledge was taken by the ten graduates, led by Mrs. R. R. Lovelady. Diplomas were presented by Dr. R. R. Lovelady following presentation of the class by Miss Olga Niell.

Others taking part in the program were Elder Hoover of Goldthwaite who pronounced the invocation; Misses Hyla Teel and Mary Evelyn Willy, who played a piano duet, "Love's Dream" by Liszt. Dr. Lovelady made the introduction of the speaker, Rev. Boone, who also gave the benediction.
