Texas voters go to the polls Tuesday

Bailey County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, March 8 for the election primaries.

Candidates will be chosen in both county and state-wide races.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m. at seven locations throughout the county.

Voting places include: voting box #1, Bailey County Courthouse in Muleshoe; voting box #2, the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe; voting box #3, the ThreeWay School; voting box #4, the Bailey County Extension Office in Muleshoe; voting box #5, the Bula Community Center; voting box #6, the Needmore

Community Center and voting box #7 will be at the City Hall in Muleshoe.

All Republican voting primaries will be held at the Earl Ladd Fire Station in Muleshoe. There are no Republican candidates running in any county races.

Voters in Tuesday's primaries will be choosing candidates

they want placed on the election ballot for the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 8.

However, if one candidate in a race that is contested does not receive at least 51 percent of the votes on Tuesday, an election run-off will be held on Tuesday, April 12, according to the Bailey County Clerk's Office.

Three races in Bailey County are contested and at least 10 county races are uncontested.

Candidates running uncontested include: District Judge, 287th Judicial District, Jack D. Young; County Judge, Marilyn Cox; District Clerk, Nelda Merriott; County Treas-

urer, Dorothy Turner; and County Commissioner, Precinct #2, C.E. Grant, Jr.

Bee.

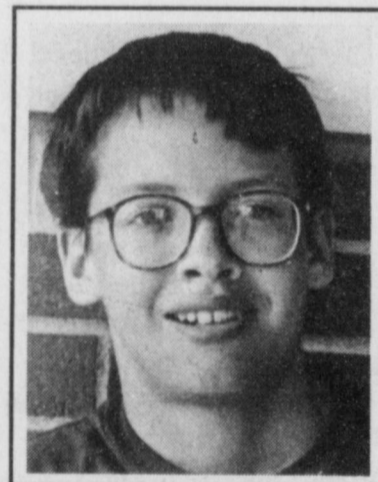

The first subject on the agenda, following the call to order and the invocation, will be recognition of visitors, and special recognition of students.

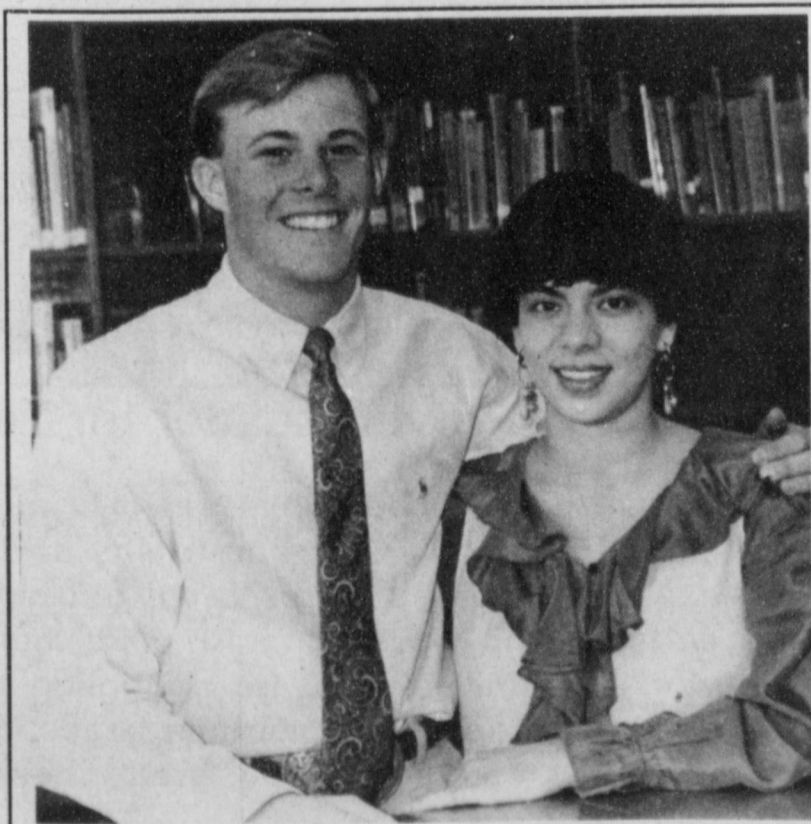
Approval of minutes of the regular meeting held on February 21 will be the next item on the agenda, followed by an open forum and audience participation.

Search for new coach underway

The search has begun to locate a new boy's high school basketball coach to replace Leon Hagerman.

Hagerman recently submitted his resignation, effective at the end of the current school year. His resignation was accepted by the Muleshoe Independent School Board of Trustees at a meeting about two weeks ago.

Hagerman, who has coached basketball at Muleshoe High School for five years, said he plans to move to Lubbock and continue coach-

ing.

Hagerman will be leaving Muleshoe High School with a 46 and 103 record overall. The Mules finished the 1994 season 6 - 20 overall and 2 - 8 in District 2-3A.

In leaving Muleshoe, Hagerman said, "I have enjoyed the people (in Muleshoe); the small town atmosphere and getting to know everybody."

Bill Moore, superintendent for Muleshoe Schools, said, "We've started receiving some letters of inquiry from coaches and Randy Adair, athletic director, has begun contacting different schools to let everybody know the job is open. So the search is on more or less."

Moore said he hopes to have the position filled before school lets out for the summer, although the school board

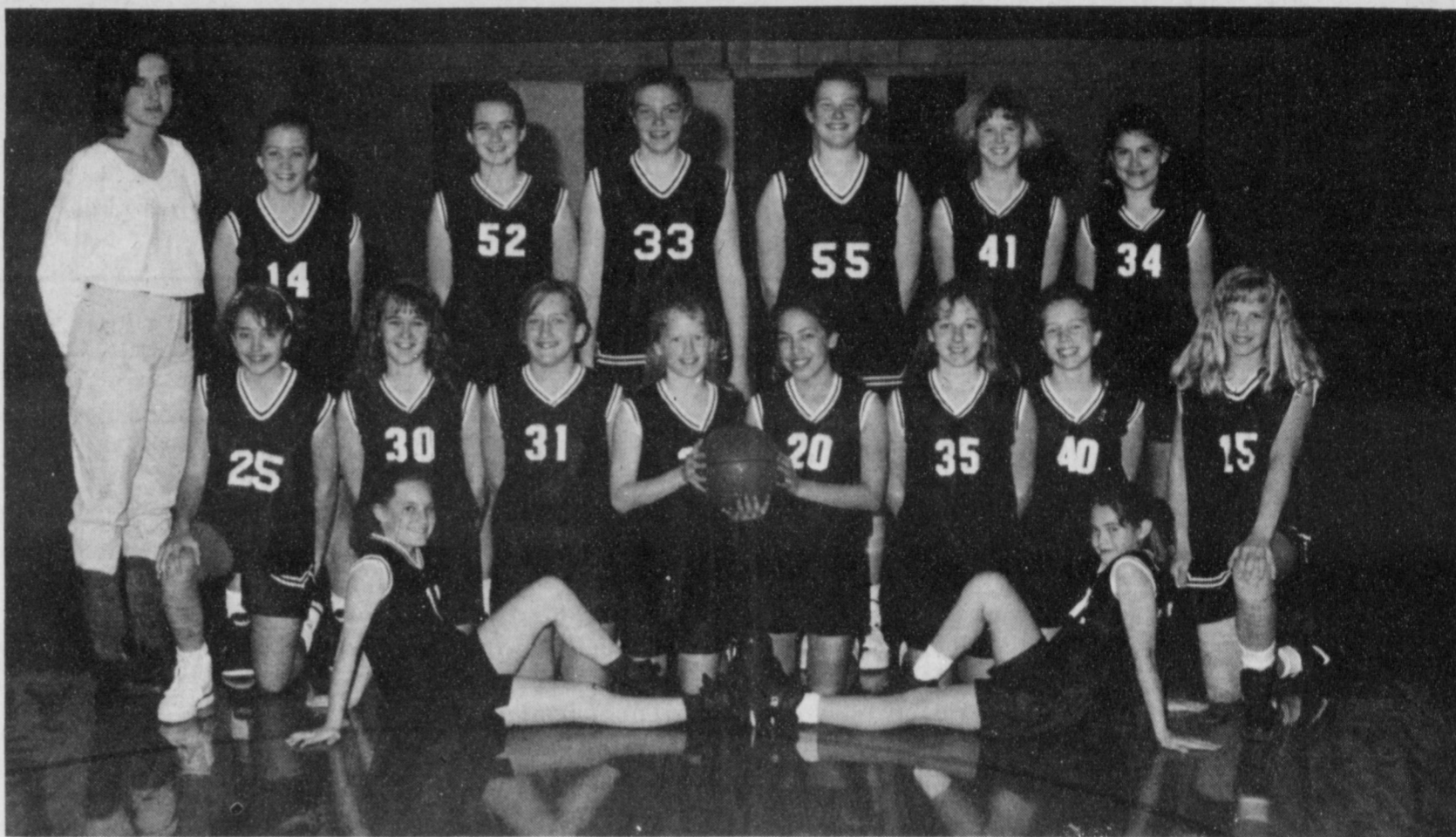
has not set a definite deadline.

"If we can find the right person, we can go before the school board in May. And if not, we will continue to look throughout the summer," Moore said.

"I am leaving it (the search) up to Coach Adair. He will do the first interviews and then I will interview the top candidates, and then we will make a recommendation to the board."

In searching for a new high school basketball coach Moore said the ideal candidate will be someone who has had high school experience and a successful program.

He said the candidate should also be student-oriented, a good motivator and a person who can work with all levels, from junior high through high school.

Mules make progress during off-season workouts

After recent testing on February 7, the strength and conditioning program for the boys athletic program at Muleshoe High School has proven to be very much improved. Especially when compared to previous years the male athletes show to be stronger, quicker, and faster.

Improvement in the athletes is a result of several different concepts incorporated into this year's strength and conditioning. This is a term that includes a series of activities that increase neuromuscular efficiency. Jumping rope, stationary jump, dot drills, running ropes, cone jumps, multiple jumping, box jumping, depth jumps, agility, and bounding are all types of plyometric exercises.

These exercises were developed extensively in the Eastern Block European countries for their Olympic athletes. As a system it has evolved over the years and is currently accepted worldwide as a unique, highly successful program for speed and power development.

According to Coach Adair, "Probably the other most important concept we have introduced into our program is the total body development theory. After watching and listening to several very successful conditioning experts over the past years or so, we are convinced we are absolutely on target with what we are trying to get accomplished with our boy and girl athletes. We are not very sport specific, but we are very athlete specific with total improvement and continual improvement our focus.

Most of our athletes are involved in anaerobic power and speed games such as basketball, baseball, tennis, and football. However, aerobic conditioning must occur as a base for all training.

The bottom line being: the athlete who is faster, quicker, stronger, and aerobically fit is

better.

In addition we are working hard as coaches to teach work habits and a better overall attitude. Our mental status is probably more important than anything we are doing.

Our expectations are higher, much higher than ever before. Our kids and our coaches must work harder than ever before.

We must be state-of-the-art, organized, and good teachers as coaches. The kids must know exactly what to do and how to do it and with more effort and greater enthusiasm. Our kids must learn how to work hard and how to work hard on their own.

All the experts agree that a

trained athlete should never take off more than 2-3 weeks. Once some degree of conditioning exists it should never be lost.

Our weightroom and facilities will be open all summer to enable our kids to keep up with their development." Research indicates that it could take up to eight weeks to recover from a six week layoff.

Recently, several boy athletes received award T-shirts for improvement in every test area. The athletes were tested on Dec. 15 and were retested Feb. 7.

Winners of the shirts were Edward Rodriguez, Ray Rincon, Riley Byers, Jesus

Flores, Mark McGuire, Adam Graves, Americo Aguirre, Jose Lopez, Leo Gallegos, Pedro Marrufo, and Russell Reyes. Each showed improvement in the bench press, squat, vertical jump, 10 yd. shuttle run and 40 yd. dash.

The girls program recently began their strength and conditioning program. They were tested the week of Feb. 23. They, along with the boys, will be retested at the end of track to measure the improvement of all athletes.

All Muleshoe fans and parents are encouraged to support all the spring sports and all the athletes as they seek improvement and excellence.

T.S. Eliot once wrote a poem entitled "The Waste Land." Early today as I "channel-surfed" through the morning shows, I began to wonder if he wasn't referring to American television.

I whizzed by ESPN which featured one of those look-at-my-skimpy-outfit exercise programs. (Somebody should tell these people that most heart attacks happen in the morning hours!) As I consumed my sugared cornflakes, the hyperactive pseudo-athletes on the screen sweat through their gerbil activity mouthing pep-rally style encouragement to the cameras. My mother's primary reaction would have been horror at their brazen immodesty. My primary reaction was amazement that so much of the gray matter between their ears had turned to muscle!

Working out the muscles of nimble fingers, I deftly punched the remote control. NBC's "Today" featured one of those thirty-second, go-too-long-and-we'll-cut-you-off-with-a-commercial-debates--this one a squabble between a New England landlord (a young and devout Roman Catholic lady) and potential tenants (sadly overdosed on their "rights") who'd been politely informed that she'd rather not rent to live-in lovers. It evidently is now national news when a landlord gives preferred

status to folks who remembered to say "I do."

Working the buttons, I "surfed" on up the channels. VH1. Country star K.D. Lang singing a very moving romantic ballad, moving almost to the point of nausea. She was singing to an actress obviously portraying a lesbian lover. That's when I worked the OFF button.

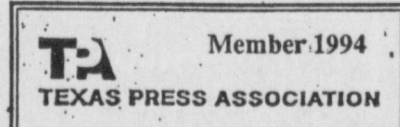

Candidates to face off in Tuesday primaries

Three seats are contested in the Tuesday, March 8 election primaries in Bailey County.

Contested races include slots for County Clerk, Justice of the Peace, Precinct #1 and County Commissioner, Precinct #4.

The three open seats are all for four-year terms and all of the candidates are under the Democratic Party affiliation. They are no Republican candidates listed on the county election ballots.

Candidates for Justice of the Peace, Precinct #1 include incumbent Jack Bates and opponent Jaime A. Olivarez.

Bates came to Bailey County in 1927, where he has lived for 67 years. He has served as Justice of the Peace for the past 12 years.

Bates was born in Davidson, Okla. He and his wife Peggy have a son, Toby Tucker and a grandson.

Bates is a member of the Justice of the Peace Association of West Texas.

He expects to retire from farming this year.

Bates finished high school at the old Fairview schoolhouse in 1933.

He said, "I have served as Justice of the Peace for 12 years. I might as well go ahead and serve another if I can."

Bates added, "I will strive to run this office the way I have run it in the past, by treating everybody the same."

Jaime A. Olivarez is another candidate for Justice of the Peace, Precinct #1.

Olivarez, age 22, has lived in Muleshoe all of his life, with the exception of four years when he attended college.

Olivarez received a bachelor of arts degree in criminal justice from St. Edwards University in Austin. He plans to eventually attend law school and become a lawyer.

Olivarez is the son of Lupe and Rosa Olivarez of Muleshoe. He has two sisters, including one in Muleshoe; and four brothers, three of which live in Muleshoe.

Olivarez is a 1989 graduate of Muleshoe High School, where he was football captain and involved in track. He is also a member of First Baptist Church.

This is Olivarez's first time seeking election to a public office. He said he plans to remain in Muleshoe for as long as his education will allow.

During his spare time, he enjoys writing poetry.

Olivarez said he wants to run for judge because he wants "to better the community, work with the people's interests and deal with issues which arise in the community to the best of my abilities."

Candidates for county clerk include incumbent Barbara McCamish and opponent Billie Redwine Downing.

McCamish, age 55, has worked in the county clerk's office for 23 years and has been county clerk for 12 years in Bailey County.

She was born in Los Angeles, Calif., and has lived in Muleshoe for 33 years.

McCamish and her husband Clark have three children, Sheryl Altman, and sons Terry and Darryl. They also have three grandchildren.

McCamish graduated from Morton High School.

She said, "With more than 20 years of experience in this county clerk's office, I believe I understand the duties and functions of this office."

She added, "I believe I am in a position to execute those duties in a timely and efficient manner."

Billie Redwine Downing is also running for county clerk.

She has been the secretary for the Bailey County Extension Office for more than two years.

Downing has about 25 years of experience in insurance. She worked for the Bailey County Tax Assessors Office and County Clerk's Office for two and a half years.

She also managed the Credit Bureau of Muleshoe for three years.

Downing moved to Muleshoe in 1948 from Littlefield. Her family farmed in the Progress Community.

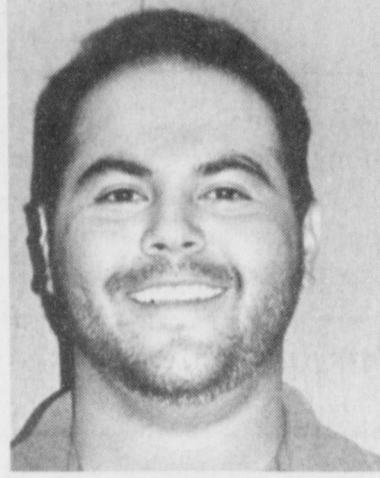
Downing is married to Elmer Downing, a farmer. They have a daughter, Twila Kervin and two grandsons.

Downing is a graduate of Muleshoe High School. She is a member of the Progress First Baptist Church and is the Women's Missionary Union director and leader of Acteen organization. She has served four years on the Association W.M.U. Council as Mission Support Director.

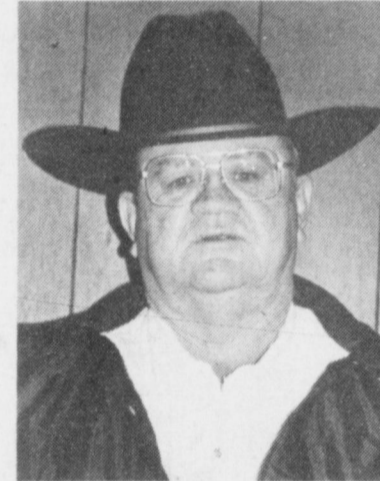

Downing said that her goals if elected county clerk would be, "to keep the County Clerk office open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. as all the other county offices are."

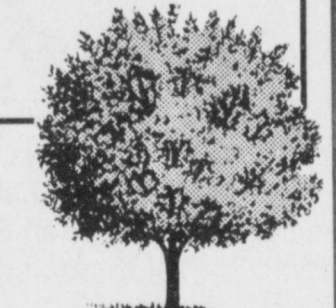

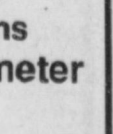

The OM program is about teamwork, risk-taking, cooperation and the development of thinking skills.

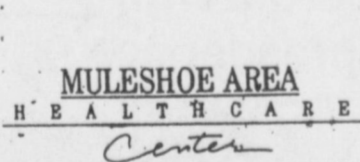
