## THE AMERICAN COTTON ASSOCIATION

The South has long needed an organization in which all interests could unite for her supremacy.

The American Cotton Association Offers This Opportunity. This the first time in the history of the South that a complete organization of every interest has been attempted and it will be carried out in Texas as in other cotton states, so that the South will absolutely control her cotton.

In the past eleven years the cotton crop of the South has been sold for \$13,236,000.00. If the cotton growers had been banded together with their merchants and bankers, as they are now doing, these crops would have probably brought to the South twice as much more as the price obtained, and the privations that have been forced upon the people by low prices and the domination of those who profit at their expense, would have been eliminated.

We have at last learned that cotton is not only the farmers' crop and that we have prosperous conditions only in proportion that cotton brings fair prices above the cost of production.

Cotton has brought wealth untold to every country where it is used commercially, but has brought to the major portion of the people of our Southland, want, illiteracy and poverty. These unfortunate conditions have resulted from uneconomic methods of production and marketing, which faults in turn have been largely due to a lack of effective organization on the part of the producers themselves and the failure of the producers and their allied interests to make common cause for their protection.

**Organization**  
We appeal to the leading citizens of each county to call mass meetings at once, appoint county organization committees and inaugurate a progressive campaign.

1. For sane and intelligent marketing of this crop.
2. For reduction of next years acreage fully one-third.
3. For the erection of sufficient bonded warehouses to protect the crop from country damage.
4. To discourage the gathering of extreme low grades and "bolies."

**Action**  
This is the time for immediate action by every one who stands for the best interests of our county.

This crop will prove to be no larger than that of last year and there will be a demand for every bale produced.

The market continues to decline account of Bear raids upon the market, but they cannot deliver, nor can spinners use paper contracts.

The whip handle is in the hands of the farmer and business interests of the state and South, if they will only stand solidly behind the cotton for a fair price, it will be obtained.

Why permit this crop to be taken at prices below the cost of production, when unity of action and singleness of purpose throughout the state and South behind this program, will add millions of dollars to present prices for this crop and bring permanently a system of self protection.

**Financing**  
Let each farmer carry every bale possible, the local merchant extending his credits and bank accepting bonded warehouse receipts as security for rediscout, as far as possible.

The Federal Reserve Bank of this has never refused to rediscout on an eligible note for a member bank on such security when offered in the light of the necessity of the offering bank to rediscout, and our resources in the handling and marketing of this crop are sufficient on thousands of thousands of future

## SANTA ANNA HIGH BLANKS-COLEMAN HIGH

Santa Anna High School eleven defeated Coleman High School 40 to 0, last Friday in a very easy game, at no time was Santa Anna in danger of being scored on. The Coleman bunch had a very good little team, which was not much lighter than the local team, but failed to have any success on any style of play. Santa Anna after losing to San Angelo the week prior, patched up the bad places and were loaded to beat the County Seat bunch, which they did. Santa Anna used everything in the way of plays and subs and then never give an inch to the opponents. The spectacular work of the line, that always held and put in the right sort of punch when it was needed put the whole Santa Anna back field on the list of stars, gaining any way and any where they wanted to go.

Allen at half made the first touch down on a long end run, and last one on an intercepted forward pass for about a 30 yard run. Lowe at quarter, used his head when necessary to put the team to scoring.

McClelland at end played a good game until he was forced out of the game on account of muscle bruises in the arm. Gipson played center in great style getting into the play at all times.

All the Seals family were in the field picking cotton when the man made his entrance into the house and got away with clothing and jewelry to the amount of about \$150.00.

When caught at the depot that night he had all the goods in his possession and in addition was all dressed up in one of the six silk shirts that were taken from the house. The young man says he is 22 years old and that his name is John Stapp. He came here from the Estland County Oil fields and claimed to be looking for his father and mother who are somewhere in this territory picking cotton. He claims this is his first offense. He is now in jail with a case of burglary filed against him. The examining trial has been set for Saturday of this week.—Democrat-Voice.

## SANTA ANNA SHIPS TRAINLOAD OF COTTON

A whole trainload of cotton was shipped out of Santa Anna last Sunday. This the first trainload of that has been shipped at one time this fall. A steam loader has been here most all week loading and there are some four or five hundred bales now on the platform to be loaded.

Santa Anna has always had a reputation for being a good cotton country, and this season they are breaking all records.

Weigher Watkins reports that up until noon Thursday they had weighed 7850 bales and that they had all they could do and were employing more hands most every day to take care of the cotton that had been brought here from various places to be weighed. It is predicted by some of the old timers that there will be more than twenty thousand bales weighed here this season.

## SERB WOMEN ARE TAUGHT HOW TO CAN VEGETABLES

American woman "stock" has been boosted several points in Serbia, where American Red Cross workers have been teaching women of that nation the knack of putting up vegetables for winter, which American housewives have.

And, as a result, Serbian menus this winter are going to boast green peas, beans, tomatoes, asparagus and all sorts of good things, which usually are had in their homes only in the summer time.

"Not just meat and bread, but vegetables too, all winter? Ah, what wonderful women those of your country are, to do this," a Serb husband remarked to one of the American Red Cross workers after he had viewed his cellar with rows of the canned vegetables, peering out from their glass containers.

There are no canning factories in Serbia and the people of the country, not knowing how to "put up" vegetables and other goodies have just gone along each winter, with meat and bread their principal diet and expectantly looking forward during the cold months to summer and its green fields—the time limit on a more varied menu, heretofore.

The Red Cross workers found some difficulty in teaching the women, for not as many containers as were needed could be obtained. Enough were gotten, however, to assure each of the families from which a housewife attended the classes, having vegetables this winter.

So great an impression has the canned goods made on the young Serbs, that many of them are wishing they could be American youths just so they could get a wife who would positively assure the canned goods all winter.

## THIRTY-FIVE MEMBERS SECURED FOR W. T. C. C.

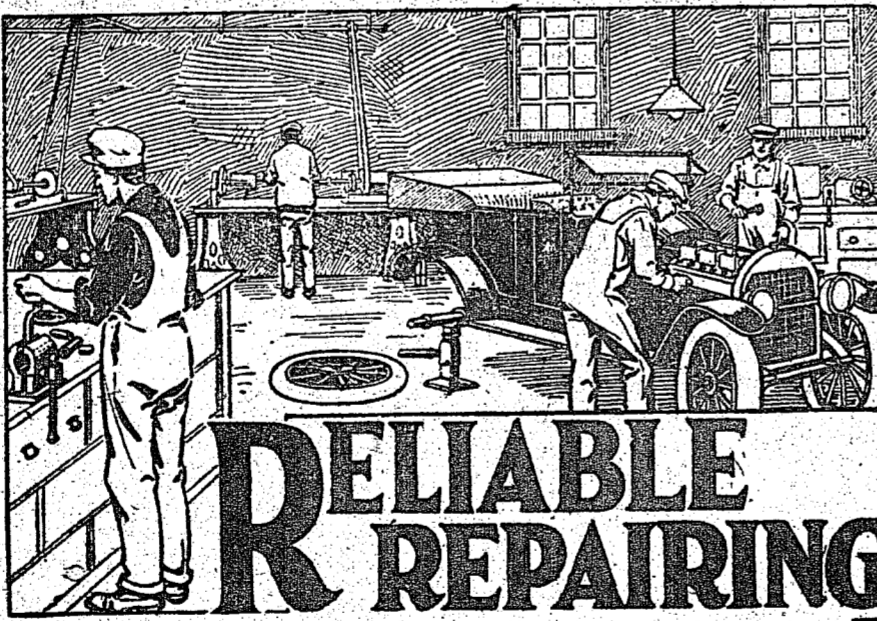

### NEFF APPROVES THE SCHOOL AMENDMENT

Waco, Texas, Oct.—Pat M. Neff, Democratic candidate for Governor of Texas, on being asked for an expression concerning the educational amendment to be voted on Nov. 2 in the general election, made the following statement:

"As citizen of Texas I always have been, am now and shall continue to be interested in the promotion of the cause of education. The education of the masses of the people being, in my opinion, our best safeguard against Socialism, Bolshevism and Anarchy, and our best guarantee of sound, democratic government and industrial prosperity.

"I believe all our public schools rural and urban, as well as insti-

tutions of higher learning, should be adequately financed and wisely and economically administered. I am particularly interested in the country public schools of Texas, upon which the farm girls and boys are largely dependent for educational opportunities. I want to see rural high schools established at suitable points in the rural sections of the state, so that our farm girls and boys may attend good high schools in the country organized and conducted under rural environment. This is one means of stopping the rapid movement of the people of the country to the city. Such rural high schools should, also, be made social centers for all the people, being common property of all the people of the community. I shall vote for the proposed amendment of the Con-

stitution in the general election, because the said amendment will give the right to the people of the rural communities of Texas to provide financially for better support of the public free schools for the education of their own girls and boys."

### ORDINANCE NO. 62

An ordinance Providing for the cleaning of closets or privies within the corporate limits of the city of Santa Anna, Texas, and keeping same in a sanitary condition, and prescribing the

way said closets or privies shall be constructed and maintained, fixing a license tax and making penalties.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, that the cleaning of all closets or privies within the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna shall be done exclusively by the Sanitary Department of the said city of Santa Anna and that it shall be unlawful for any private citizen to do said work.

Section 2. That a scavenger shall be appointed by the city Board of Commissioners whose duty it shall be to visit each and every closet or privy in the city once each two weeks and remove all fecal matters therefrom, using therefor a metal lined vehicle, to be furnished and approved by the city authorities, and after the removal of said fecal matter, the scavenger shall disinfect said closets or privies, which said disinfectant shall be furnished by the city.

Section 3. That the scavenger

in removing the sewage and fecal matter, shall drive the vehicle in which it will be removed as close to the closets or privies as possible and practicable and in such a manner as will attract the least attention, and shall remove it to a place beyond the city limits, and shall dispose of it in the manner as may be dictated by the city Health Officer and approved by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners.

Section 4. All privies or closets located near or over any ditch, drain, ravine or branch, are hereby declared a nuisance, and the owner thereof shall be given five days notice to remove them at least five feet from such ditch, drainway, ravine or branch, and upon failure to remove the same such owner shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars, and each day the same shall remain after notice, shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to bury within the corporate limits of the city of Santa Anna any sewage or fecal matter removed from any closet or privy, and any person so doing shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars.

Section 6. Be it further ordered that it shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation to procure a license for the privilege and right to maintain or permit the use of any closet or privy, owned, occupied or leased by them, or under their control or superintendence, and to pay the Chief of Police the license fee prescribed herein.

Section 7. That the Chief of Police on payment of the proper fee or tax shall issue a license for the right and privilege to use of any closet or privy, which license shall state the name of the licensee, the amount of the fee or tax paid and the period of time for which same is issued.

Section 7-a. That the following fee shall be paid quarterly and in advance for the license required herein, and the following prices shall be required for the right and privilege to maintain or permit the use of any closet or privy in the city of Santa Anna.

For each closet or privy of a private family \$1.50 per quarter; for each business house or hotel \$3.00 per quarter.

Section 7-b. Be it further ordered that the person or persons exercising the privilege of using and maintaining said closets or privies, who shall fail or refuse to pay the license as herein provided, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars.

Section 8. Be it further ordered that all closets or privies now in existence in the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, and all closets or privies to be erected in the future, shall be provided with a hinged cover over the seat and a hinged door in the rear, which shall be kept closed at all times except when in use, of wood or wire gauge, and shall be otherwise so constructed as to prevent the ingress or egress of flies or other disease breeding insects and, shall be so situated as to be easily accessible to the scavenger for cleaning. All rubbish that cannot be burned shall be placed in boxes or barrels near the closet or privy convenient for the scavenger. Any owner or occupant of premises who fail to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars; PROVIDED that each days failure to comply with the provisions herewith shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 9. The person who shall be appointed to the position of city Scavenger by the Board of Commissioners is hereby empowered to enter all buildings, lots and yards for the purpose of inspection of the closets or privies and removing sewage and fecal matter in compliance with this ordinance and any persons refusing to allow the Scavenger to enter such buildings, yards or lots for the purpose named, or who shall in anywise hinder him from the performance of his duty shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon con-

viction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars.

Section 10. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after the 15th day of November A. D. 1920 and all ordinances and clauses of ordinances in conflict therewith on that date are hereby repealed.

Passed by a unanimous vote of the Board of Commissioners at a regular meeting thereof held on the 5th day of October A. D. 1910.

**TESTS OF SHIPS' CABLES.**

The total length of chain cable tested during 1918-19 at the public proving houses in the United Kingdom, all of which are under the superintendence of Lloyd's Register of Shipping, was 599,094 fathoms, and a quantity of miscellaneous chains and samples. The number of anchors tested was 9,783.

**UNLIKE THEIR RED BROTHERS** Indian Tribe in Southern Peru Have All the Outward Appearance of White Men.

In the Andahuaylas valley, in southern Peru, there is a type of "white" Indian who is apparently without an admixture of European blood, yet with a very light skin and delicate pink cheeks. The barefoot pater reigns supreme here; the heavy woolen socks and hairy sandals of other regions being unknown. The aboriginal is cringing and timorous in manner, yet he has more than once been known to sneak up to a sleeping "gringo" and smash his head with a rock. The Indians of this tribe will not "squeak" on others of their race, even if put to torture.

The Indians are beasts of burden, as everywhere in the Andes, it being not uncommon thing to see a rather small man feet from the market place to the railway station with half a bullock on his back. The wooden-headedness of the Indian, as well as his lack of strength for labor except carrying, is often in evidence. Harry A. Franck tells in the Wide World Magazine of an Indian who was ordered to move an iron wheelbarrow from one part of the city to another. The Indian removed the wheel and bound it on his wife's back with a llama-hair rope and slung the rest on his own shoulders in the same manner, and trotted away.

**TO REMOVE TATTOO MARKS** Two Methods Recommended by Physicians as Insuring Obliteration of These Disfigurements.

A physician in Syria writes to the Journal of the American Medical Association asking how tattoo marks may be obliterated, the special occasion for the query being the "thousands of Armenian girls and children who were taken by Turks and Kurds and their faces tattooed." The answer he receives is that tattoo marks can be removed by the use of chemical irritants that will destroy the superficial layers of the skin.

Variol retattoos with a strong solution of tannin and then rubs a silver nitrate pencil over the spot until it is blackened by the formation of silver tannate. Brault tattoos the surface with a solution of 30 parts zinc chloride in 40 parts of water. After these operations a slight scab forms. This comes off after about two weeks, leaving a pink scar that gradually becomes of normal color.

**OPTIMISM OF YOUTH.**

Two Delaware county farmers, one of whom is seventy-two and the other eighty-two years old, were sitting side by side in a Muncie barber shop, waiting their turns in the chairs. The elder of the two is of a jovial disposition, while the younger is of a more serious turn, and was saying that some of his crops last year had not turned out as well as he had expected, but that it did not make much difference, as his active life was about concluded anyway.
