MARKETING ASSOCIATION FOR COLEMAN COUNTY

The organization of a Marketing Association for Coleman County has just been completed and incorporated under the Market and Warehouse Laws of Texas, with the following officers and directors in charge:

J. B. Atkinson, Pres., W. C. Henderson, Sec.-Treas., H. Sackett, Vice Pres., J. J. Arthur and G. K. Redding.

This organization is being perfected for the purpose of assisting the farmers of Coleman County in marketing all farm products and the co-operative buying of all essentials for the farm.

There are to be no profits in the transactions between the farmers and the association other than to defray actual expenses of such transaction of the association.

This association has been organized with about 100 charter members and others may come in as they choose, it is hoped that the organization may spread over the entire county, thus giving the farmer direct buying and selling powers of all farm products.

Shipping dates will be established from time to time as demanded, livestock including cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry are to be sold cooperatively by the car and delivered to where best prices can be secured.

It is advised that all farmers who expect to offer any farm product for sale to list same at once at County Agent's office.

Notice of all things bought from time to time will be mailed to all members.

You are hereby Commanded to summon Mrs. E. J. Marcus, a widow, Floyd Marcus and Melvin Marcus, by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Coleman County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Coleman, on the 8th day of November A. D. 1920, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 24th day of September A. D. 1920 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 2438, wherein Mrs. V. A. Marcus, a widow, is Plaintiff, and W. A. Marcus, Abe Hood, Walter Hood, Ralph Hood, Mrs. Willie Heine and husband, Heine, whose initials to Plaintiff are unknown, Mrs. Dollie Phillips and her husband, Phillips, whose initials to Plaintiff are unknown, Mrs. E. J. Marcus, a widow, Floyd Marcus and Melvin Marcus, are Defendants, and said petition alleging in substance:

That heretofore, to-wit: On or about the 1st day of September, 1920, she was lawfully seized and possessed of the following described land and premises in Coleman County, Texas, holding and claiming the same in her own separate right and as her sole and separate property and in fee simple, to-wit:

All that certain tract of land described as follows: 64.66 acres, beginning at the N. E. cor. of said block No. 1 on North line of Survey No. 719, in name of James Diell, a stone mound from which a L. O. bears S. 49. 3/4 degrees W. 84. 1/2 v. s. Thence West with North line said survey No. 719 409.4 v. s. to its N. W. cor. on East line of G. H. & H. Section NO. 4 a stone mound from which a cluster of L. O. stumps (burned) bears N. 17 degrees W. 52 v. s. a L. O. tree N. 71 degrees E. 290 v. s. Thence South with West line of Survey No. 719 at 360 v. s. cross branch at 99.1 v. s. in all to a corner in channel of Indian Creek. Thence down said creek with its meanders to a corner from which an elm tree on South bank of said creek bis. S. 45 degrees E. 4 v. s. Thence South 87 1/2 degrees E. 140. 4-10 v. s. to the E. line of said Block No. 1. a stone mound from which a Messrs. Mrs. N. N. 35 degrees W. 17. 3-10 v. s. Thence North at about 100 v. s. crosses Indian or Hog Creek 512 v. s. to the place of beginning. Bearings marked X.

SALVATION ARMY AID AT GALVESTON

Dallos, Texas.—"To the rescue; now let us help our own," the slogan carried by the Salvation Army in its Rescue Week Appeal during the week of Oct. 4th to 11th, was put to a practical test Thursday during the fire at Galveston, which swept the water front area for a depth of seven blocks and for a time threatened the entire city.

Salvation Army officers from Houston, San Antonio and other surrounding towns were on their way to Galveston a few minutes after news of the fire became known. Adjutant E. J. Robb of Southwest Division headquarters at Dallas was on the way a short time later to take personal charge. Ten corps of officers were with him and relief workers throughout the states of Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana were held in readiness, prepared to leave at a minute's notice.

The Galveston workers were also on the job early, caring for the homeless, sick, injured and distressed. Lieutenant Colonel George Wood, who was in Chicago at the time, immediately sent a wire to Mayor Sappington at Galveston placing at his disposal the entire group of Salvation Army workers in the Southwest Division, providing they were needed.

MANY VICTORY MEDALS BEING DISTRIBUTED

Ex-service Men! Bring your discharge certificate with you to the Dallas Fair and apply at the Army Recruiting Station, 1514 Main St., Dallas, for your Victory Medal. If you cannot bring it, send it and papers will be furnished the person presenting it for you to mail the Victory Medal Office.

The records of the Victory Medal Section of the U. S. Army Recruiting Office show a greatly increased demand by the veterans of the Great World War for their Victory Medals. This probably due to the former soldiers intention to be fully equipped with their badges of service on Armistice Day, November 11th. Many of the Posts of the American Legion are doing their members a real service by assembling their discharge certificates and sending them in to the Dallas Office along with the members' application for the Medal.

Preparations are being made at the Victory Medal Office for the expected rush of applicants during the two weeks of the Dallas Fair. Two additional Army Field Clerks are being added to the staff that already numbers five persons. The office will be open daily from 8:30 a. m. until 5 p. m., except Sunday, it being closed on that day.

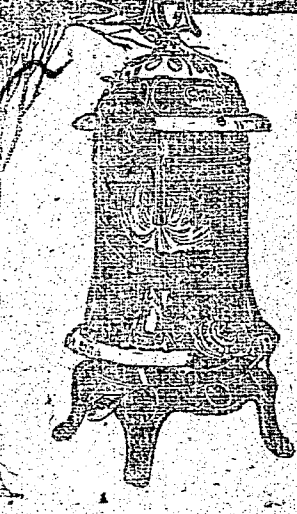
