BRILLIANT METEORT
PASSES SANTA ANMA
Numerous persons in Santa Anna witnessed the flight of a very brilliant meteorolite in the southern, sky, Monday night about $10: 30$ o'clock, or perhaps a

The meteo itself was only visible for a few seconds, but the illumination in its wake remained an unusua length of time and assumed a fantastic shape, forming the let ter Lin the sky.

People indoors saw the sudden flagh of light, and Cliff Meador who works at the Santa Fe station got a full view of the meteor.
