

TROUBLE WITH THE MEXICAN

Antonio Rodriguez, a Mexican, killed a white woman near Rock Springs, Texas. 'This was crime number one. The enraged citizens of Rock Springs arose as one man and burned the guilty Mexican at the stake. This was crime number two. 'On hearing of this burning of one of their countrymen a mob of Mexicans assaulted American citizens in the streets of the city of Mexico. This was crime number three and others have followed.

We doubt that it is ever wise to repay crime with crime. Doubtless Rodriguez was guilty and richly deserved his dreadful fate. But no community can afford to outrage the finer feelings of its citizens with the awful spectacle of, a human burning at the stake. At least those who are guiltless can afford to wait and let the law take its course, and certainly there never is excuse for lynching until the courts have failed to mete out justice.

In this instance, Rodriguez, if left alone, would have died upon the gallows, the citizens of Rock Springs would have been spared the evil and the odium of mob law, the hundreds of Americans who are resident in Mexico, would have gone about their respective vocations unafraid and unembarrassed, and withal the demands of justice would have been met as thoroughly through the courts as through the mob.

A FELON OR NOT A FELON?

Caleb Powers, of Kentucky, who was thrice convicted as an accomplice in the assassination of Governor Goebel, was elected to Congress last week. It will be remembered that at the time of the murder of Governor Goebel someten or twelve years ago Powers was the retiring secretary of state for Kentucky and that he and the retiring governor, both of whom were' Republicans, 'refused to admit their defeat claiming that fraud had been used in the election. An attempt was made to hold their offices by force and in the heat of the controversy Goebel was killed. With this crime the opposition went to pieces and many of the Republican officials fled the state. but Powers was arrested on charge of having conspired toward the assassina-tion.

He brought to his defense some of the ablest legal talent in America and the case was fought out in court three times. Powers being convicted each time and lying in jail between trials. Always there was some pretext for an appeal, a new trial or a change of venue." Last year a Republican was elected governor of Kentucky and one of his first official acts was the pardoning of Powers, whom he believed to be unjustly. persecuted for political purposes.

Immediately on his release from prison Powers began planning to run for Congress, with the result stated above. But while he has been elected he may never take his seat in Congress. The constitution provides that no felon may sit in Congress and thrice has Powers been convicted of felony." However, he has been pardoned in a legal if not in a just way and this in the minds of some people will remove his disabilities. Anyway, it is an open question and most people will decide it according to their prejudices in the case. It will be crushing defeat will make of him a contest promises to be, fast and furious.

HOW IT HAPPENED

Various influences contributed to the results, but there is no doubt that the predominating one arose from disappointment at last year's failure to make the promised downward revision of the tariff. His stooping to violent personalities in the contest has lowered him in the respect of the people. and impaired his prestige, but more serious and more injurious in the estimation of the judicious has been his advocacy of an extreme policy of concentrating power in the Federal government and giving the executive a dominating influence over the other departments. In this he may not have been animated by a selfish personal ambition, but to many it had that appearance.-New York Journal of Commerce.

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The other underlying motive that has prompted this crushing rebuke is his too evident design to seize upon the presidential nomination of his party two. years hence. That the people of New York and the East will not have. The great Democratic victories of last week were due, at least in part, to the exceptionally clean and able men who led the fight in most of the states, and the election should be a lesson to both the parties that it is easier to win with honorable and efficient men at the head of the ticket. The Democrats could have won in Nebraska just as easy as they won in New Jersey if they had had such a man as Woodrow Wilson at the head of the ticket. But even a Democratic landslide couldn't carry such a fellow as Dahlman to victory.

New Mexico has a constitutional convention at work, preparing, a constitution for that territory which is to be accorded statehood. This convention has decided that all state officers, except the land commissioner and the superintendent of public instructions, shall be elected for four years and will then not be eligible to succeed themselves. This idea commends itself to us as being an excellent provision.

MATTER FOR CONSIDERATION AT NEXT SESSION OF CONGRESS

One of the fights to come up in the next session will be over the congressional representation. The census returns will be in. and should there be no change in the apportionment of representatives the greatly increased population, would make a tremendous increase in the membership of the house of representatives, already unwieldly with a present membership of 391.

The present pro rata of representatives is one congressman to 194,000 population, but probably the fight will be to increase the apportionment to 225,000, which naturally would be fought by such states as Missouri and Iowa, where there has been no increase in population, as an increase in the apportionment would cut down their representation.

The same thing came up ten years ago when an increase in the apportionment was proposed, the two states then in danger of losing some of their representatives being Virginia and Maine. Those informed seemed to be of the opinion there surely will be an /increase in the basis of representation. 1.







MORE GRASS CROPS

In an address at Macon, Ga., Dr. Knapp, of the Bureau of Plant Industry, made some striking comments on the changing character of farming in countries as population increased. After describing the value of tilling a farm and the benefits accruing from the better drainage secured, he said:

Farming cannot be successfully carried on in any country without live stock. I have noted how the nations, as the lands have advanced in price, have changed from tillage crops to grass crops. When I was a boy three-fourths of England was under tillage. Today less than one-fourth is under tillage, and the population has multiplied many fold. The same is true of Holland. ... It is almost entirely a grass country, and lands are worth on an average \$500 per acre. The same is true of Denmark. If it has been the experience of these nations that as land advanced and life became more strenuous they turned toward grass, it seems that the same will follow. in our case. In other words, they made up their minds that they could get more out of land from grass and live stock than they could by cultivating it. They only use the cultivated crop as a means of rotation, but the main crop is the grass crop. What are they doing with their grass crops? In Holland and Denmark it is the dairy problem, and they have been able to develop a cow that is almost a perfect machine for manufacturing those fine have and fine pasture grasses into high priced butter and cheese. Their registered stock will average to produce for the farmer 1,000 per cent net profit more than the ordinary cow.

My Dear Son: I regret to learn that you have lost some money by reason of the payment of a bill in cash to an unauthorized collector. The mere fact that he presented a printed bill head was no assurance that he had any authority to make the collection and receipt for your money.

You have a bank account with the First State Bank & Trust Co., and I cannot understand why you did not pay the bill by check drawn payable to the party to whom you were indebted. You would then have been safe in giving it to the collector, inasmuch as you would have been under no obligation to examine into his credentials, for the bank is responsible to you for the full amount if the check falls into the hands of a dishonest person. When your check is returned to you at the end of the month it must bear the endorsement of the party to whom you made it payable, and is then a legal and indisputable receipt for your money, which you should file away with other youchers for future reference.

Hereafter deposit all money you receive and pay all of your obligations by check. The bank will attend to your bookkeeping without any expense to you.

I regret that you had to pay the above-mentioned bill again. Let this be a lesson. Affectionately,
