## GLADYS BELLE OIL CO. BEGIN WORK ON 55,000 BARREL TANK

The Gladys Belle Oil Co. began the construction of the big, 55,000 barrel storage tank, out on their lease Tuesday. The work will be rushed to the limit. They are expecting some more workmen any day. They have many good producing wells that are waiting on a tank to determine their real value; others going down. This company has one of the best pump plants in this part of the state, and have about ten or eleven wells tied in now.

## Brown County Farmers Will Hold Cotton Seed for \$40 Ton Minimum.

The Brown County Farmers' Association completed its labors late Thursday evening and adjourned. The following board of directors was elected: George McHan, W. B. Tongate, Will Allgood, L. N. Evans, J. H. Kennedy, George McHan was re-elected chairman of the Board of directors and W. B. Tongate was re-elected secretary. These proceedings took place after the business of the organization, which had been completed and adjourned.

"The Situation which the Cotton Growers Face at the Present Time," was one of the questions discussed by the organization and many interesting features were presented by different speakers in this regard.

A resolution was adopted requesting all cotton farmers to store and hold their cotton seed for \$40 per ton minimum.

The question of cotton picking came up for consideration and was discussed from various angles. It was decided that advertising for cotton pickers should be the means adopted to secure help in harvesting the crop and the price to be paid for picking was left over for future solution.

Cotton classing was explained some length by Mr. Williamson, the official classer for Brown county. The fee for classing was fixed at 50 cents per bale and it was decided that when the funds thus accruing went over \$3,000 that it should be placed in the treasury and refunded to the cotton raisers whose cotton had been classed.

## SANTANTA CHIEF OIL CO. SPUD IN KINGSBERRY NO. 2 MONDAY

We were informed by the management of the above company, of the new location made on the Kingsberry lease. This will be Kingsberry No. 2 and will be located three quarters of a mile west of No. 1, on the hill. Kingsberry No. 1 is a good producer and this well is expected to be better still. They are moving the rig to the new location this week and expect to spud in about Monday.

## Goldthwaite is Much Excited Over Finding Oil Well.

Citizens of May who still have faith in the ultimate development of the oil industry in this neighborhood may find encouragement in the fact that oil has been discovered in an abandoned well in Mills county, about ten miles from Goldthwaite.

It seems that Mills county is somewhat like Brown—people know there is oil there, but have been unable to locate it in any considerable quantity. A number of wells have been drilled. One in particular was drilled on the J. N. Weatherby place. After futile efforts to find oil the company drilling the hole gave the owner of the land \$2500 and the derrick and drilling outfit to secure a release from their contract. And so the hole was abandoned. This was a year and over ago. A few days ago the owner of the land who now lives in Brownwood, decided that he needed a water well on his land and sent a man down to investigate the advisability of using the oil well rig. Arriving at the well, curiosity prompted him to see what was in the hole. To his surprise it was full of oil. He began bailing the well, and after he had drawn out seven or eight barrels without apparently diminishing the supply, went to Goldthwaite and telephoned Mr. Weatherby what he had found.

The news leaked out and now Goldthwaite is going through another oil excitement, with everything at fever heat among the local citizens.

Several people from Brownwood went down, Mr. Weatherby among he number, and they report the facts as above stated.—Brownwood Bulletin.

## FIRST BALE OF COTTON THIS YEAR BRINGS FARMER 230 DOLLARS

J. L. Simmons who lives four miles south of Whon is the Cotton King of Santa Anna. Early Tuesday morning he had J. Frank Turner up before breakfast starting the fire under the boilers of his gin, to gin the first bale of cotton coming to Santa Anna. Mr. Simmons stated that he only had to pick over eight acres of his Mebane cotton to get it. He expects to have several more bales out this week.

S. W. Childers Co. bought the bale, paying him 28 1/2 cents per pound, three cents over the market price. The bale weighed 450 pounds. Mr. Childers made up a premium amounting to more than \$100. He picked over 22 acres to get his bale, it weighed 546 lbs. and S. W. Childers & Co. paid him 30c per lb., as he was so near the first bale. No premium was made for the second bale. This Sherfield farm has been getting first bale for a number of years.

Turner's Gin ginned both bales free of charge.

Last August 26-1919 S. W. Childers bought the first bale from Jap Halford, raised on the Sherfield farm and paid 30 1/2 cents for it.

## Driller in Shallow Field Claims Record for One Day's Work.

Z. G. Kemp, drilling a shallow oil well on the Alexander tract offsetting the Drinkard tract near Brownwood believes he has established a record for a single daylight tower's work in the shallow oil belt by hitting 87 feet in a day. An ordinary light drilling rig was used, and the formations drilled were similar to those found in most of the shallow field drilling.

## Hole Being Drilled For Water Near Gorman Develops Oil.

Gorman, Texas.—The Gorman Home Refinery Company, drilling a water well, had a showing of oil at eighty feet and after drilling six feet deeper got a ten-barrel well. This well is five miles from any other well and is expected to open a new shallow field.

The company has started its second well and will complete it in two days. It had one water well ruined ten days ago by oil, but thought it seepage from the waste trap.

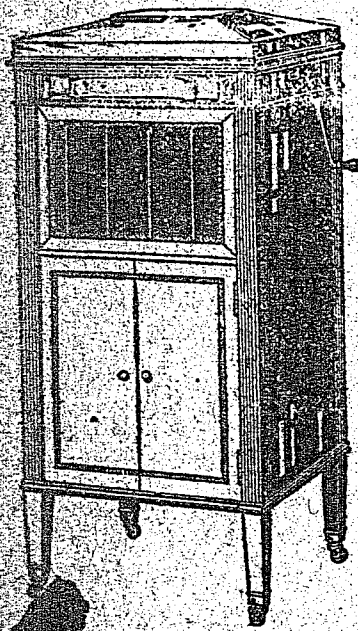

Dove Season is to Open Sept. 1; Fifteen is Limit.

The open season for doves begins Wednesday, Sept. 1.  
They may be killed up to Dec. 15, fifteen constituting the legal bag limit for one day.  
The seasons for other wild birds and for deer are as follows:  
Quail and Mexican pheasants, months of December and January, bag limit fifteen.  
Ducks, geese and sandhill cranes, Oct. 16 to Jan. 31, bag limit twenty-five ducks and plovers, eight for all species of geese and sand hill cranes.  
Turkeys, March and April. The limit is three gobblers in one year.  
Deer, November and December. The limit is three bucks in one year.  
Birds and animals which it is unlawful to kill at all during a period of five years ending June 18, 1924, are woodcock, woodduck, prairie chicken, pheasant (except Mexican pheasant or chacalaca), pinnated grouse, antelope and Rocky Mountain sheep.

It is unlawful to shoot deer, ducks, geese or cranes between sunset and a half hour before sunrise, and to kill them only with a gun held to the shoulder. It is unlawful to use traps, snares, deadfalls or any other trapping device to take them. No other kind of game bird can be legally trapped except by written permission of the game, fish and oyster commissioner. Using a deer call, whistle or decoy is prohibited, except that the rattling of deer horns is allowed.  
In order to hunt outside the county of one's residence, it is necessary to make an affidavit that the shipper killed it in person for his own use and not for sale, and to attach a list of the game so shipped, which is not to be removed during passage.  
Game may be brought into Texas from Mexico at all seasons

### School Children

Will very shortly be at their work. It is claimed by competent authority that at least thirty per cent of all children who attend school need glasses to work to advantage; and of those only a very few of the extreme cases wear glasses. Furthermore, the children with good eyes are held back unduly. Probably fifty per cent of the headaches of school children, which are far from uncommon, are the result of eye-strain caused by unsuitable ocular efforts required in school work.

No child should be handicapped in its school work; if they need glasses they should have them, such children show their gratitude by their increased advancement. It is cruel to deny such a child an equal chance with its more fortunate companion. It is equally cruel, indeed criminal, to put glasses on a child which does not really need them. Only a very skilled practitioner is capable to determine an error and its magnitude in a child, they do not understand questions ordinarily put by eye examiners, the refractionist must be able to discover such errors and the amount without questioning the child; such examination is the only scientific method.

### Children Do Not Get Proper Care in Texas.

Austin, Texas.—Most children of today do not get enough variety of food, do not take enough time to eat their meals, and do not get enough sleep. This is the statement made by Miss Pearl N. Hyer, R. N. public health nurse of the Texas Public Health Association.

In her physical examinations in the public schools Miss Hyer has discovered that these three things are responsible for fifty per cent of Texas children being underweight. To help remedy this defect among the children the Texas Public Health Association recently sent an article by the public health nurse to a number of Texas mothers.

"Children should eat a variety of food," said Miss Hyer, "not so much at one meal, but it must be seen to that the meals of the day are balanced. Three things, and not over four, at a meal are all that are necessary.

"The following foods give the elements of nourishment necessary for almost any age, work or climate. I advise that all mothers should see that their children eat daily: (1) Cereal, whole grain, well cooked; (2) Eggs, once a day when no meat is used; (3) Milk, one pint to one quart; (4) Potatoes and leafy vegetables such as spinach, onions and lettuce; (5) Fruit; (6) Meat not more than once a day, avoid fried meat; and (7) Bread and butter with every meal, whole wheat bread is best."

"Diet for children should be upbuilding," declared the nurse, "and should give reserve strength and energy. Any kind of food which will not do this is not worth eating, regardless of whether it tastes good or not. Beware of too much candy. It is hard on the teeth and not good for the system. Children who crave sweets when they are not eating right, there is a lack of some element of nourishment. If they must have sweets, they are best eaten at the end of a meal, not between meals. Sweet fruits like raisins, figs, and dates are good, while honey is an excellent sweet."

Miss Hyer declares that a child needs food that will supply building materials such as milk, eggs and cereals; and those which give energy, such as cereals, fats green vegetables and fruits. The nurse tells the mothers of Texas that these rules, if followed, lessen the cases of underweight among Texas children and build up bodies strong enough to throw off disease.

One of the most important things is the care of the eyes. See that they are in good condition.

### SUGAR AT 10c OR 11c BY JANUARY PREDICTION

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 21.—Sugar will be 10c or 11c a pound by January, Russell J. Poole, secretary of the City Council's high cost of living committee, stated in submitting the result of investigation today.

The country's beet crop will be from 30 per cent to 40 per cent larger than any ever before produced, he also predicted.

The report states that the new Cuban crop will be about 4,000,000 tons, or three times the 1914 crop.

Mr. Poole said that "if consumers will begin now to buy as little sugar as they can get along with, we will have 10c or 11c sugar by Jan. 1, as there is no shortage."

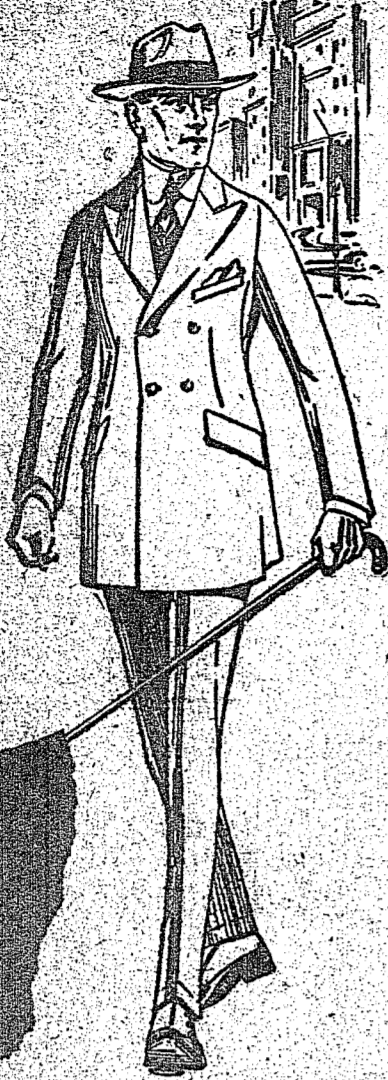

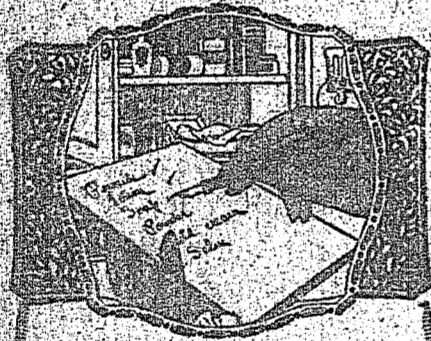

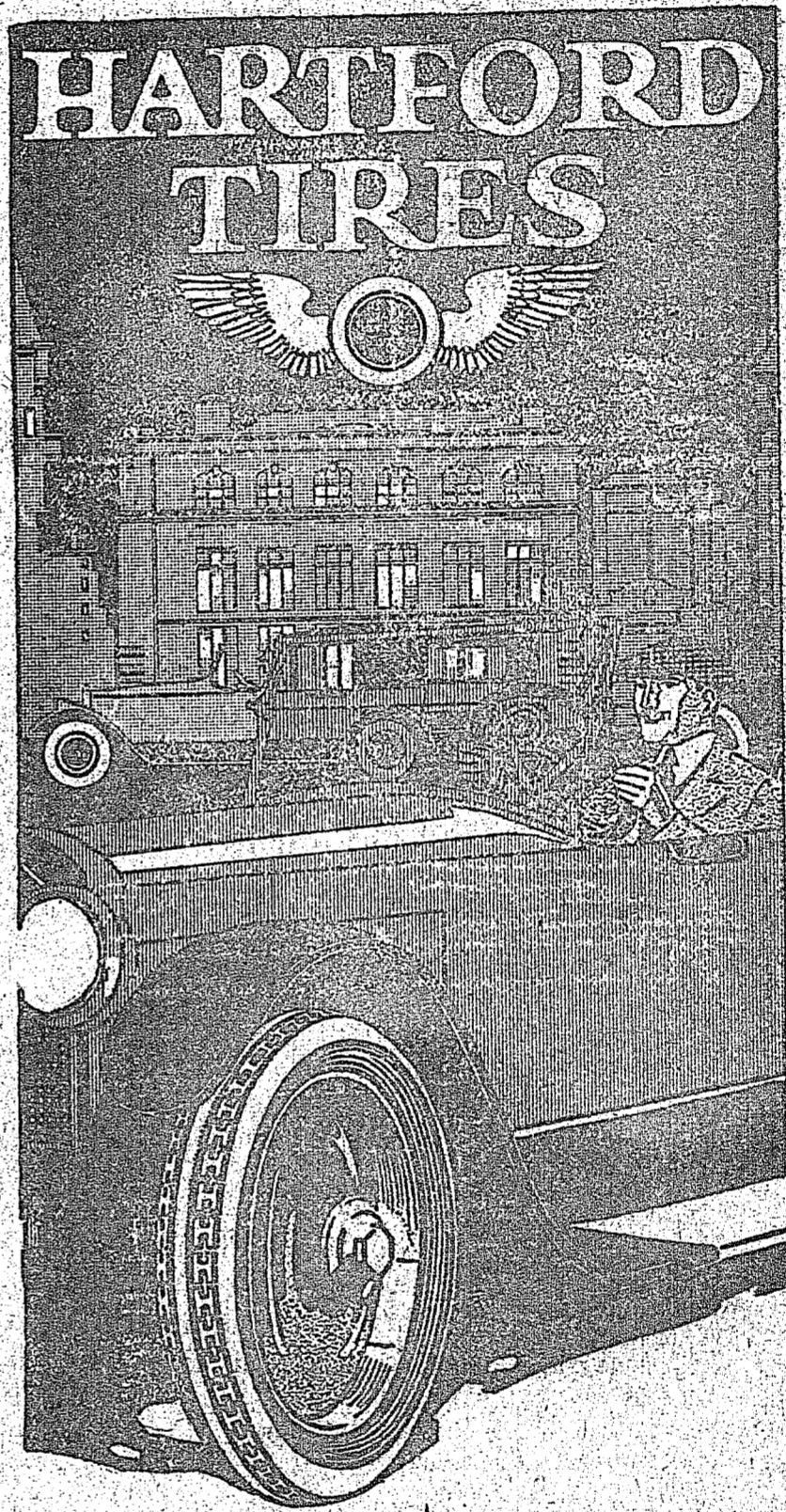
