WARNING TO HEALTH SEEKERS HANDED OUT

Austin, Texas—A poster of warning to health seekers has been sent to all the other states in the union by the Texas Public Health Association. It will be widely distributed over the United States by the state anti-tuberculosis association.

This poster warns tuberculous persons of other states that climate is only one-tenth of the cure for the white plague, and that unless they have sufficient funds for self-support for some time they will be saved suffering and worry if they do not attempt a long railroad journey. The warning declares that there are no free tuberculosis hospitals in Texas for the care of non-residents, that there is very little so-called "light work" so that the tuberculous person with low funds may support himself while seeking a cure, and that treatment at home with proper care is beneficial.

"It will spare many people from other states a great amount of worry and financial strain," said D. E. Breed, executive secretary of the Texas Public Health Association, "if we warn them before they start for Texas. Many of them believe that climate will cure tuberculosis, but doctors say that it is only of minor value in the cure of the disease."

"There are many tuberculous people wandering through Texas who are penniless, and we have found that the larger portion of them are from other states. It is most unfair to their own health, and to the people of Texas that they should come from other states into the Lone Star State and be thrown on the charity of our citizens. This problem of the indigent migratory consumptive is one which we are trying hard to solve."

PERRY OIL & GAS CO. HAULING RIG TO LEASE

We have been informed that the Perry Oil & Gas Company are hauling rig and material to the Thornton lease, one and a half miles southeast of town. The location is 900 feet south of the north line and 900 feet east of west line.

The Sanger tract is being drilled by the Garner Oil Company of Garner, Iowa. The contract was let by Raney, Whiting and others. This work will be rushed right on and will be spudding in the very near future.

Santanta Chief Oil Co. are making ready to move to the Kingsberry No. 2, which will be located about 500 feet north of Kingsberry No. 1, which came in good for about 250 barrels. The pump has been placed on this well and the tanks filled, they are waiting on cars to ship. Oil cars are very hard to get hold of right at present.

The Gladys Belle Oil Company have shipped several cars of their oil this week. And the tanks are all full waiting for cars. The first few cars of steel that have arrived for the big 55,000 barrel tank have been placed on the lease by the Meadow Freight line. The balance of material is expected any day. This tank is going to be the largest in this part of the state. The production of these people is rapidly increasing, for new wells are coming in all the time.

LOCAL GRAIN BUYER TAKES GRAIN FROM COLEMAN

One of our local grain buyers was in Coleman, this week buying oats from the main street of our neighboring city. He stated that the neighboring buyers were only paying 51 cents for oats in new bags and that Santa Anna buyers were paying 80 cents.

He spent the day buying grain and landed some of the most prominent grain raisers in that part of the county. Some of the parties who brought their grain here were J. L. Crump, J. M. Grimes, Tom Wheeler and J. C. Copeland.

Santa Anna has always been a fine market for grain and cotton and buyers pay the top prices at all times. The Coleman farmers will be making their headquarters in Santa Anna, in the near future. Quite often we see parties from Coleman, buying groceries and other supplies for the home and the farm.

A good grain crop was harvested over the county and this city is buying it's share, and then some. Oats made all the way from 40 to 60 bu. to the acre, and the wheat made in the neighborhood of 20 bushels per acre. We take great pride in mentioning the grain and cotton in this particular locality, for the community that puts it over Santa Anna in paying the top market prices and selling goods for less money, will have to get up before breakfast, to outclass us.

Strong For United States of America

The propaganda germ came with the war, along with the flu and other things—and just now the crepe-hanger is busy with talks of "panics that are to be" and other things likely to depress the weak of heart.

Some wise fellow has said that the only way to fight bad propaganda is with good propaganda, and we take pleasure in passing on to you some rather inspiring statistics from the address of John Fletcher, Vice-President of Fort Dearborn National Bank, to the Chicago Association of Commerce and the meeting of bankers at Kansas City.

"Our national wealth has increased from seven billions at the time of the civil war to something over 225 billions at the present time. The nearest nation that compares to us in wealth is England with about 80 billions. This country produces in manufactured and agricultural products in a single year more than the national wealth of France.

"Of the total agricultural products of the earth we are producing more than 22% of the wheat, 35% of the oats, 60% of the cotton and 80% of the corn. Of all the farm animals upon the earth we produce 25% of the horses, 27% of the cattle, 40% of the hogs, while our dairy products amount to 25% of the dairy supply of the world.

"We are taking from the earth 50% of the world's production of pig-iron, 56% of the copper and 60% of the petroleum. Likewise in manufactured products we excel any nation in the world.

"We are producing 22% of the total earth's products of woollens, 25% of the linens, 25% of the cotton cloth, 45% of the paper, 25% of the glass, 36% of
