SURVEY MADE FOR MACHINERY OF THE TEXAS BEST PLANT

This work is going to be rushed to the limit and soon the smoke will be coiling from the huge smoke stacks, and the Santa Anna people will be able to burn their own gasoline from their own wells. The production is rapidly increasing and the demand for the refinery is growing stronger every day. This is going to be one of the best plants in the state when it is completed. REPORT ON SANTA ANNA OIL FIELD IS IMPROVING

Tipton Petroleum Company, on the Holt estate have made location 200 feet from the south line and the same distance from west line of the lease. Drilling to begin at once.

Cameron No. 1 is being rigged up by Rogers & Gannon, this company will likely spud in this week.

Jim Ned is pulling casing making ready for a shot sometime this week at 2600.

Santanta Chief Oil Company have finished a four million feet gasser and have sold the output to the local Gas Company. As soon as they pull the casing and finish up this well on the Henderson lease, they will drop back on the Kingsbury lease and put down Kingsbury No. 2 500 feet north of No. 1, which is now on the pump and making good.

Woodward No. 1 is looking good after cleaning out after shot. As soon as storage is completed it will be put on pump and given a thorough testing. Many oil experts say this is one of the best wells in the field. The oil is of a very high grade.

Campbell No. 2 are setting 12-inch casing at 1200. The crew on this well are making splendid progress and are promised a good well.

Fox & Lamb on the Mathews tract spudded in Saturday and are making rapid progress.

Dodwell-Whiting & Teatswell on the Melton tract spudded in Tuesday. This company have a number one rig and will put the hole down in a hurry if no bad luck befalls them.

Franklin spudded in on the Garrett No. 7 Monday.

Keller spudded in on the Schmacher No. 3, Gladys Belle Co., Monday.

SANTANTA CHIEF OIL CO. HAVE MEETING DIRECTORS

After the bringing in of the four million feet gas well on the Henderson lease, the following directors of the above named company came down from Plainview to hold a meeting. Judge H. C. Randolph, R. W. O'Keefe and M. P. Garner.

Their Henderson well was drilled by Keefer & Leadford and the well was finished in 14 drilling days, going three feet into the sand at the depth of 1437. These fellows are making a record that is hard to beat.

55,000 Barrel Storage Tank to Arrive Anyday; Foundation Ready.

The Gladys Belle Oil Company have been held down for some time on account of not having storage for the oil. Their new 55,000 barrel tank is expected any day, and the foundation is ready. When the tank is completed they will clean out all their wells, shoot them and then will see the real value of the field. They are shipping some oil every week, but the shortage of the cars keeps them full up all the time. Development work is going right on and wells are coming in rapidly.

SANGER BROS. LETS CONTRACT FOR OIL WELL NEAR CITY

They are putting the timbers on the lease this week. The location was made 550 feet west of the east line, 175 feet south of the north line.

A location has been made on the Blake lease one mile south-east of the city of Santa Anna. Drilling to begin at once.

YOUNG MAN GETS RESULTS FROM PROGRESSIVE FARMING

One of the most entergetic and progressive young farmer boys reports a good wheat crop from 10 acres. This may not be as good a yield as some others have made, but it shows what a boy can do on the farm if he is made of the right stuff. Jasper McClellan, who lives three miles north of the mountain, stated to the News man that he had 10 acres and it made 192 bushels. He also said that he had a fine cotton patch, a good stand and that he believed there was at least a quarter of a bale of cotton per acre on it now. He expects a bumper crop and you will see his report in this paper after the cotton is gathered. Who's next?

JUDGE GRISHAM SPEAKS TO LARGE CROWD.

Judge Grisham spoke in Santa Anna on the 19th inst. He pointed out the absurdity of the statements of his opponent that he had saved the country anything on his points of order, saying the senate restored the items which Blanton struck on the bonus bills, restored the item that he struck from the Agricultural bill, and that all the clerks and departments which had been abolished were war time departments and had been abolished by a republican congress and by majorities and not by one man over the consent of 434 congressmen.

Judge Grisham declared that the union labor issue was injected into the campaign by Blanton to detract from his true record, that Grisham had not received any contributions from labor, that he had been accused by Blanton who had said that union labor had spent money to advance his candidacy. He said that he had offered Blanton one thousand to prove his false charges but that Blanton had failed to claim it. "I have never belonged to a union, and would not accept a cent from them if they should offer it. I do not think that some of their demands are just and I do not propose to be under financial obligations to them but will sustain them only when I think their demands are right, and turn them down when I think they are wrong. Judge Grisham called attention to the fact that Blanton has solicited and accepted campaign funds from the east and especially the manufacturing associations of New England. Mr. Grisham said that this class had burdened the people with high cost of living, were seeking favors from congress, and that a congressman from this district should not be under obligations to them. He pointed out that Mr. Blanton had been condemned by congress and had his speech struck from the congressional record, that he had made numerous false charges against departments of government during the war, that in all these charges he had been exposed, one being based on an anonymous letter, and that he had wholly destroyed his influence in congress, and saying that without the cooperation and respect of his colleagues no congressman could accomplish anything for this district."
