GOOD ROADS FOR COLEMAN COUNTY ARE ASSURED

Judge L. G. Mathews, County Engineer W. E. Dickerson and C. L. Curry, Commissioner Precinct No. 2, returned from Austin last Thursday. They appeared before the highway commission in the interest of Highway No. 7, which passes through the county from east to west, coming in by Santa Anna, passing through Coleman and going out by way of Goldsboro.

The highway department granted \$90,000 on this road, a distance of 18 miles, beginning at the west line of Commissioner's Precinct No. 1, which is 2.2 miles northwest Coleman on the Abilene road and extending to the Brown county line on the east, a distance of 18.4 miles.

County Granted \$215,000 Aid.

The \$90,000 aid granted on Highway No. 7, coupled with previous grants, makes a total of \$215,000 that Coleman county will have received through the State Highway Commission upon recommendation of County Engineer Dickerson.

The State Highway department is of the opinion that at least \$300,000 will be available for Coleman county in 1921. This will greatly aid in the construction of Highway No. 23, from Santa Anna to the Waldrip Bridge on the Colorado river and Highway No. 7 from 2.2 miles northwest of Coleman to Goldsboro or Taylor county line; also Highway No. 7-A, Coleman to Runnels county line through Valera and Talpa. With the exception of the Valera district (road district No. 1.) bonds have not been voted to complete the highway to the Taylor and Runnels county line.

Engineering Cost Less Than Three Per Cent of Aid.

County Judge Mathews states that the entire engineering work of the county will, in the end, have cost less than three per cent of the State and Federal aid that has been allotted to Coleman county, not taking into consideration its relative value in connection with the expenditure of the more than one million dollars that have been voted for road construction in the various precincts of the county.

All roads will soon be surveyed and construction work can begin at once after the road bonds are sold. Persons who may be impatient at the apparent delay in construction should bear in mind that the surveys have to be made before construction work can begin and before the county can receive State and Federal aid.—Democrat-Voice.

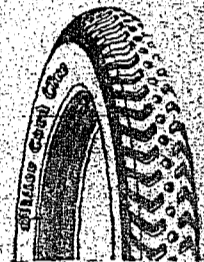

NOT TROUBLED BY CURIOSITY

According to Traveler, Natives of Easter Island Are in a Class by Themselves.

If a daily train were ever operated on Easter island, 2,300 miles off the coast of Chile, the natives never would gather at the station to see it come in, according to Dr. William A. Bryan, professor of geology at the University of Hawaii, who arrived at New York recently from South America after a scientific exploration of the South Sea islands.

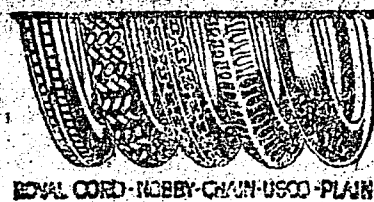

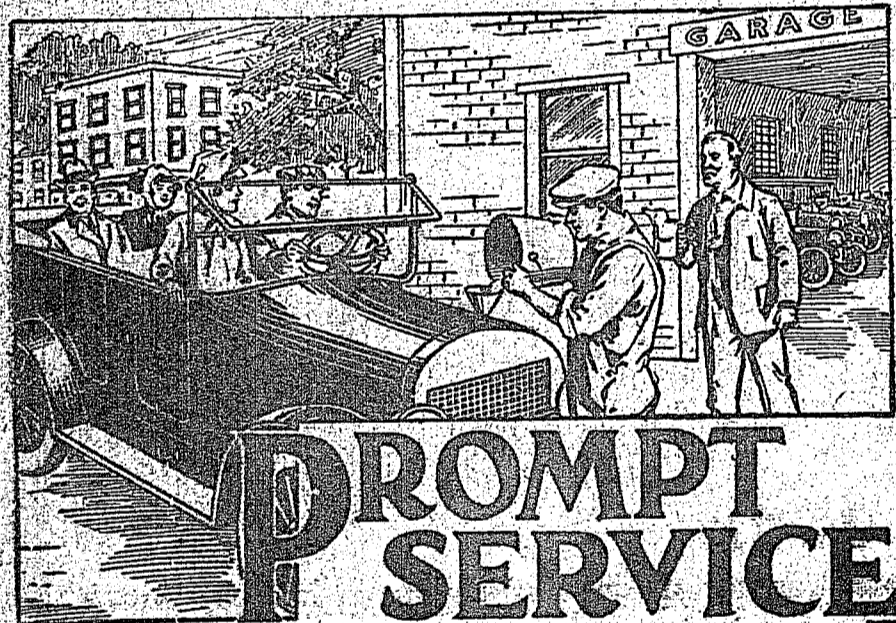

DEATH TO THE RATS; GET IN LINE PEOPLE

Austin, Texas, July 1.—Dr. C. W. Goddard, state health officer, has sent the following bubonic plague regulations to every mayor and health officer in the quarantine area as follows: 50 miles inland from the Gulf coast and Rio Grande and Sabine borders and a radius of 100 miles around Galveston and Beaumont).

In accordance with the modified quarantine proclamation issued by the governor of this state and becoming law June 27, 1920, you are hereby officially notified that your city is considered within the prescribed area and subject to the general rules and regulations promulgated by the Texas State Health Department, viz:

A complete rat extermination campaign must be inaugurated at once in each incorporated town and city within the said prescribed quarantine area.

Dr. Goddard suggests that all towns and communities in Texas, though not included in this area, employ every known means to eradicate rodents, including poison; but in case poison is used it must be placed in such a manner that children cannot possibly get hold of it.

The rat menace is one of the big problems confronting the people of Texas at this time. The plague-spreader, the rat, is a de-

structive, filthy animal and spreads other diseases than the plague, which is the most terrible of all pestilences, which have afflicted man, as a high percentage of the cases prove fatal. Europe alone lost over 25,000,000 people during the fourteenth century and India has lost several million during the last few years. Public safety demands the destruction of rats. It is costing Texas millions of dol-

lars every year to feed her rat population.

Holding Quality.

Holding a quantity of 1916 atmosphere successfully imprisoned within its sidewalls, a Fisk plain tread automobile tire is yet rolling over the roads of the Lone Star State, according to a Clayton, Texas, dentist who happens to be the owner of the long-lived casing.
